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

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# Today's Game

Today's Florida State-South Carolina contest has an interesting angle. The Gamecocks, boasting a 3-1 record, hasn't had a touchdown scored against them through the air all fall.

On the other hand, all but two of the Seminoles' TDs have been through the airlanes.

This is Coach Paul Dietzel's second year as Gamecock boss and South Carolina, which won only once in 1966, is on the way back.

The Seminole opponent opened with a 34-3 victory over Iowa State and followed with victories over North Carolina (16-10) and Duke (21-17) before bowing to powerful Georgia last Saturday 21-0.

Even in defeat, the Gamecocks held Georgia to a pair of first downs in the opening half, one being an 87-yard touchdown run on a busted play.

This is Florida State's second home game. The Seminoles picked up their first victory last Saturday night with a comeback 19-18 thriller over Texas A&M at College Station in the rain.

Florida State depends primarily on a passing game, although the Seminoles' running game was vastly improved against the Aggies. South Carolina's pass defense is one of its stronger suits so this pits strength against strength.

The Seminoles have been up near the top since the Alabama game in passing offense and quarterback Kim Hammond is near the leader in passing and total offense.

This will be the second meeting between Florida State and the Gamecocks, the Seminoles taking last year's tussle 32-10 at Columbia, S. C.

Fullback Warren Muir, a transfer from West Point, has made the big difference in South Carolina's attack this season. The 197-pound fullback, who dropped out of the Academy to get married, has picked up 391 yards in 91 carries. During the entire 1966 season, South Carolina fullbacks were able to gain only 70 yards.

Wingback Ben Garnto is a name the Seminoles should remember from last year's game. He sparked the Gamecocks to their only touchdown and finally carried it over from the one.

The Gamecocks should recall Seminole fullback Billy Moremen since the Daytona Beach senior counted three times in last year's victory.

Florida State's chances ride with its defense — which showed a big improvement in last week's triumph over Texas A&M.



# FLORIDA STATE

is a coeducational, state-supported institution of higher learning.

Founded in 1857, Florida State has transformed in the one short score of years since it became coeducational (1947) from a strong liberal arts college for women to a University of demonstrated national stature.

Nearly 16,000 students are presently enrolled in the university's 10 Colleges and Schools (Arts and Sciences, Education, Home Economics, Music, Librarianship, Business, Social Welfare, Nursing, Engineering Science, and Law). By 1975 this figure is expected to reach 28,000.

Characterized by phenomenal growth in new programs, enrollments, and constant physical expansion of the campus the University's spirit of excellence has led to Florida State's great pride in All-Americas (Fred Biletnikoff, 1964), its share of the 1966 Nobel Prize Winner in Chemistry, (Dr. Robert S. Mulliken) and its contribution to the U.S. Astronauts (Dr. Anthony Llewellyn). It is this same spirit that makes every football game and every research project a testing-ground for innovation and a proving-ground for the time-honored theories of education.



DR. JOHN E. CHAMPION PRESIDENT

One of a growing number of young university presidents in America, Dr. John E. Champion at 45 is the youngest of 10 chief executives in the University's 110-year history, and the fourth distinguished educator to serve as fulltime president of the University since it achieved university status in 1947.

Before ascending to the University's presidency on June 22, 1965, Dr. Champion had served as a professor in accounting, assistant dean of the School of Business and as the University's first Vice President for Administration.

Among the expanding list of honors accorded to Dr. Champion in his teaching and administrative careers at the University of Georgia (1948 to 1956) and at Florida State are memberships in Phi Beta Kappa, Phi Kappa Phi, Beta Gamma Sigma, Omicron Delta Kappa, Gold Key, Alpha Phi Omega, Beta Alpha Psi, Delta Sigma Pi and Kappa Delta Pi. Active in numerous campus organizations at Florida State, he served as president of the Alpha of Florida Chapter of Phi Beta Kappa in 1961-62.

A recent honor to come his way is the Republic of Panama's award of the Grand Cross of the Order of Vasco Nunez de Balboa—recognizing his contributions and leadership in Florida State's student and faculty exchange program

with the National University of Panama.

#### CONDENSED RULES FOR RECORDING FOOTBALL STATISTICS\*

(Originated by the N.C.A.A. Football Rules Committee's Sub-committee on Football Statistics)

(Continued from back of Form 347-A)

#### SECTION 6 - PUNTS.

Article 1: Punts are measured from the line of scrimmage to the point where the receiving team first gains or loses possession of the ball, or if untouched by the receiving team, to the point where the ball is downed by the kicking team or goes out of bounds.

Article 2: When a punt goes over the goal line (touchback), distance of the punt is measured from the line of scrimmage to the goal line.

Article 3: A blocked punt is recorded as a "team" entry, and not charged against the individual kicker. Thus, in the case of a blocked punt which does not pass the line of scrimmage, enter the word "team" in lieu of kicker's name and charge one punt for NO yards, so the blocked punt is included under "Times Kicked" in team totals.

If the ball travels toward the kicker's goal and is recovered by the **blocking** team, the yardage is treated as a punt return by the player who blocked the kick. If the ball travels toward the kicker's goal and is recovered by the **kicking** team, the yardage is treated as a punt return by the player who blocked the kick—and the blocking team is charged with a fumble lost, except on fourth down.

#### SECTION 7 - KICK RETURNS.

Article 1: Only the number of punts and kickoffs which the receiving team actually attempts to return are included under kick returns.

(Exception — Blocked kicks which travel toward the kicker's goal. See Article 3 of Section 6.)

**Article 2:** Returns are measured from the point where the returning player first gains or loses possession of the ball to the point where the ball is declared dead or is lost by fumble.

Article 3: The return of an attempted field goal, which falls short and is returned by the defending team, is treated as a punt return.

#### SECTION 8 - FREE KICKS.

Free kicks are recorded as kickoffs if made from placement and as punts if the ball is punted. The receiving player is credited with a kickoff return or a punt return, respectively.

#### SECTION 9 - GOALS FROM THE FIELD.

Successful goals from the field are measured from the point where the ball is kicked to the goal posts (to the goal line plus ten yards, since the goal posts are ten yards behind the goal line). The distance of such kicks is recorded on form 347 only under "principal individual plays". If kick is unsuccessful, show yard line from which kicked, in lieu of distance.

#### SECTION 10 - POINTS AFTER TOUCHDOWN.

Article 1: A player attempting a try-for-point-after-touchdown by kicking is not charged with an attempt when a bad pass from center or a fumble by the ball holder, precludes an opportunity to kick. Such an unsuccessful attempt is charged to the "team," rather than to any individual player. However, if the ball is momentarily fumbled and then kicked, an attempt is charged to the individual kicker, regardless of the success or failure of the effort.

Article 2: The try-for-point-after-touchdown is made while time is out and is not recorded as a play from scrimmage (rush, pass or kick).

When a try-for-point-after-touchdown is by forward passing, the passer is charged (under SCORING) with the attempt, whether successful or not. If successful, the receiver is credited under SCORING with the conversion and points scored, and the passer is credited with a conversion under FORWARD PASSING.

Such a passing effort is recorded as a PAT attempt and is NOT recorded as a pass attempt or a pass reception.

#### SECTION 11 - SAFETIES.

No individual credit is recorded for any player on either team when a safety is scored. The team benefitting from the score is credited.

#### SECTION 12 - FUMBLES.

On any play **terminated** by a fumble, the yards involved to the point of recovery are credited or charged to the player who fumbled, regardless of which team recovers the fumble.

(Approved Ruling — On rushing play, ball carrier of Team A fumbles at the line of scrimmage and the ball travels 5 yards toward Team B goal line, before it is recovered by Team B. Player of Team A who fumbled is credited with rushing gain of 5 yards and Team A is charged with a fumble lost.)

#### WILD PASS FROM CENTER.

Any loss resulting from an **obvious** wild pass from center is charged to "center pass," and not to any individual player.

Quotes from Coach Peterson:

"I was especially pleased with the defense. I thought they found themselves last week. The sain's defense was the thing which pleased me most.

"Paul has done a wonderful job at South Carolina. They were tough out there today. You'll hear more about South & Carolina in the future.

"He used a lot more players than they did. He got some of our young kids in there today. And it helped at the end.

T thought Gunter was great. He has great quickness. Pajcic did a fine job. He moved the club but he still lacks just a little of that quickness which he had last year.

We told our kids at halftime what they had to do. We knew the run markings was there and we took it in the second half.

"Hammond Has a Charley Horse and 1t bothered him. Blatt has a srained ankle and Sellers has a knee injury which I don't think is serious.

"South Exreum Carolina played well despite some of their kids who were hurb.

"It please me that we could get so many kids in. That first play was a special which we put in just for South Carolina.

"Larry Green had hurt his knee a little against AdM, but being the type of kid he is he didn't tell us. Gunter did the job.

"We knew they were going to use the spread formation, we just didn't know when. That spread is tough when you've got plenty of running room. But you have to go back to your regular stuff when you get close. Thank We came up with the big play when it counted.

"I thought our secondary was just great. Five interceptions!"

The squad presented Coach Peterson with the game ball in the locker room. COACH PAUL LIETZEL:

"We didn't do a good job of getting the ball into the end zone when we got close. we threatened, but we couldn't get it in, and that always takes the spark out of an offense. I prefer to give the credit to Florida State for doing a good job, because they really did give us a lacing. However, when you lose your right hand man, it does cost you (fullback Warren Muir suffered a hip pointer midway in the second period and missed the remainder of the game. Safety Wally Orrel twisted a knee getting off the bus after the movie lastnight and didn't dress and left defensive halfback Toy McCord was left home with an injury. Linebacker Bob Cole sprained an ankle on the thirdplay of the game).

"Florida State has a great passing attack and we knew that no one is

going to stop them from completing passes. We concentrated on keeping them from throwing deep and we did a good job. However, when we had the ball, we threw it to the wrong man(the FSU defenders) too many times and it was a case of missed opportunities for us.
