THE PEACH BOWL BOARD OF DIRECTORS AND THE PEACH BOWL COMMITTEE

The Peach Bowl Board of Directors is made up of nineteen outstanding business, civic and sports-minded leaders throughout the State of Georgia. All of them are active in Lions International and in the Georgia Lions Lighthouse Foundation, Inc.

The Peach Bowl Committee is made up of dedicated civic and business leaders who are particularly interested in sports.

The Lighthouse, commonly known as the Lighthouse for the Blind, is an organization supported by all of the Lions Clubs in the State of Georgia. It works with all needy people who need eye care. All monies generated for the Lighthouse go into sight conservation and eye research efforts.

CHAMBER OF COMMERCE INFORMATION CULTURE & RECREATION

Atlanta, (population; 1,242,000) established as the South's cultural and recreational center, continues building upward and outward at phenomenal speed with prodigious expansions in the entertainments and arts.

Atlanta Stadium is the new \$18 million home of the Atlanta Braves baseball team, and the new NFL pro-football team — the Atlanta Falcons.

Downtown are the two big hotels, the Regency-Hyatt House is Atlanta's largest with 800-plus rooms. The second largest hotel in Atlanta, the Marriott, is adding 300 additional rooms. Add these to the 25 hotels and 82 motels which already handle 13,000 guests at a time and it's easy to see why the 700 conventions of last year which brought 350,000 is bound to grow.

Parallel to the hotel-motel phenomenon is Atlanta's restaurant business. Suddenly Atlanta has emerged with so many exquisite dining places it challenges any city in the country.

Atlanta Memorial Cultural Center is a seven-million dollar home for visual and performing arts which houses a 1,800 seat concert hall, a repertory theatre, art library, restaurant, expanded exhibition space and art school.

A new \$9 million Civic Center (Auditorium-Convention Hall) has 110,000 square feet of exhibit space, capacity of 11,500 for meetings or 8,000 for a seated banquet.

A dependable climate is a great plus for recreation and leisurely living in the Atlanta area. An altitude of 1,050 feet gives the city less than three con-

secutive days of 90 degrees in warmest summer and the mean temperature is 61.2 degrees. Nights are uniformly cool and annual normal rainfall is a comfortable 49.3 inches. Located high on the Piedmont plateau, it is no wonder Atlanta is a city of beautiful homes with its rolling terrain, scattered and dense stands of trees. Holiday Magazine says, "Atlanta has the most beautiful residential suburbs in the world."

Natural resources are another advantage. Within an hour's drive from downtown there are lakes of all sizes offering boating, fishing, skiing and camping thrills.

The people of Atlanta are both aggressive and friendly, and the community itself is dynamic. Atlanta has an art association, symphony orchestra, pops orchestra and music club of considerable stature. The public library has 643,000 books in its main and 15 additional branches. There are 159 parks and greenways with 23 more coming off the drawing board soon, totaling over 5,000 acres. More than 700 churches represent every creed and denomination with total membership of half a million.

TRANSPORTATION

The Peach Bowl Committee will be responsible financially for transporting your team from the airport to your hotel, from your hotel to the stadium on Monday, December 30, from the stadium to your hotel following the game, and your return trip from your hotel to the airport. All other necessary transportation will be the responsibility and expense of your school . . . to and from daily practice sessions . . . any outside entertainment, and so forth. It will be the financial responsibility of your school to transport your equipment, luggage, and so forth, upon arrival and departure.

An additional six cars will be provided without drivers and you may assign these to your coaching staff.

It is suggested that the Business Manager make arrangements for housing and feeding of a Police Officer who will be assigned to each school. He should be housed in the hotel with your team. This will greatly expedite your transportation problems.

TEAM ENTERTAINMENT

The entire Peach Bowl Festival is built around the Peach Bowl Classic which will be played on Monday night, December 30 at Grant Field. The stars of our show are the Football Players, the Coaches and the Athletic Directors. The Peach Bowl Committee wants to do everything possible to make your stay in Atlanta a most pleasant experience. We are aware that the young men who have been playing football all fall still have one more tough game to go before they hang up their football gear for the year. We do not intend to interfere with your training, and at the same time, we want to do everything possible to make the entertainment for the squad, Coaches, and Athletic Directors the best that Atlanta has to offer.

Entertainment for the two teams is intended to include, primarily, the football players and the coaching staff up to and including the Athletic Director. Most events, however, include the wives of Players and Coaches.

The teams will be met at the airport on arrival and a member of the Team Entertainment Committee will be available for consultation and assistance at all times until your departure from Atlanta.

While practice sessions of the teams do not constitute entertainment, any problems that should arise in this field may be taken up with the Chairman or members of this committee. Should a solution to a problem be outside the area of responsibility of this Committee, the Chairman will contact responsible officials of the Peach Bowl Committee to see that a satisfactory solution is worked out.

Within the Atlanta area there are many varieties of entertainment available to the players and the coaching staffs. Naturally, the Head Coach must determine the amount of entertainment which he considers proper for his squad. A complete kit of interesting things to see and do will be provided to each school.

TICKETS

An initial allotment of more than 10,000 tickets for the Peach Bowl game is set up by the Committee for immediate shipment to the two participating schools as soon as the teams are selected and bids accepted. As soon as the teams are announced, the Peach Bowl office will contact the respective business manager of athletics to arrange for shipping of the school allotments. Tickets are allocated in accordance with agreement with the N.C.A.A. which provides for each school to draw seating up to one-sixth the total capacity of the Peach Bowl. The alloted tickets exceeds this requirement.

The contract between the Peach Bowl and its participating schools provides that the tickets which are not sold by the schools from their allotment must be returned to the Peach Bowl no later than *December 15*. This enables the Peach Bowl to make these seats available to the public early enough to be more certain of a complete game sell-out. Any tickets not returned by either of the respective schools by *December 15* are the responsibility of that school and shall be charged against that team in the settlement of accounts.

WELCOME TO THE PEACH BOWL!

To get started off in fine fashion, we need the following from the Sports Publicity Director of the two schools:

- 1. Numerical and alphabetical rosters of your squads.
- 2. Publicity Directors will later be asked to send flip cards.
- 3. Pictures of campus scenes, your President and the Football Coach and his staff.
- 4. Background resume on your Football Coach.
- 5. A five hundred word wrap-up of your season.
- 6. A page on your previous bowl record, coaching staff, and so forth.
- 7. Press headquarters will be at the Regency-Hyatt House on Peachtree near Baker. Press headquarters will open on December 26 and remain open until December 31. Hours will be from 10:00 AM 12 Midnight. All Press Credentials will be picked up at the Regency until the day of the game. On the day of the game, Press Credentials will be available at Ga. Tech Athletic Office, 190 3rd St., N.E. (adj. to Grant Field's Gate 32) starting at 12:00 Noon on December 30.A Press Conference will be held daily following the day's practice. It is anticipated that the Home Team Head Coach will be at this Press Conference each day at 5:30 and the Visiting Team Head Coach at 6:00 PM.
- 8. The Sports Publicity Director at each school is asked to submit a list of his attending press, TV, and radio. These people will be tendered invitations to the various Peach Bowl functions. Also, we will need soonest a list of attending press, TV, and radio people so that they can be sent press brochures.
- 9. We would like very much to have the Sports Publicity Director in town a week ahead of the team. This would greatly facilitate pre-game publicity and over-all coordination with the press.

GOACH BILL PETERSON OF FLORIDA STATE

"Good football teams win the close ones and ISU is a good football team. I thought the big plays were ISU's punt return in the first half and the catch on their last drive.

"I was real proud of the way our kids kept soming back. We hurt curselves in the first half with kex lots of mistakes. We just couldn't get any consistancy in our offense.

"We weren't hitting our passes and didn't make the big eatches.

"The LSU pass rush was the best we faced all year. Capplemen was dropped for losses at least seven or eight times and that's the most he has been dropped all season.

"We made some catches in the second half and it helped our offense get started. We moved Sellers to flanker and it opened him up. It gave the ISU defense a little more trouble.

"Our game plan was to go try and get out front quick so that they wouldn't be able to play ball control and keep ramming it at us. I thought we did a good job when we had that 13-0 lead.

Then that punt return picked them up.

"I was worrhed at the half that we wouldn't be able to keep up with their substituting and they'd wear us down late. Our kids did a great job of coming back and it was just a matter of who had the ball last."

COACH CHARLIE M&CLENDON OF LOUISIANA STATE

"I'm proud of this squad for coming up with a real big win. This coaching staff won't ever forget it.

"We did a good jeb on Sellers early in the game, but he came bask to prove what a great player he is. It took a tremendous effort on the part of our entire squad to win this one, and we made adjustments well during the game.

"(Gerry) Kent got hurt in the first quarter and he was supposed to sover Sellers for us. That injury changed a lot of our defensive plans considerably. We mix our defenses and came up with an effective pass rush.

We gave the ball to them four times in the first half. It speaks well of our defense to allow them only 13 points minimum many after giving them so many scoring eppertunities...in the early going. We used a four man front more tonight and did not stick with our basic defense.

"That punt return certainly gave us momentum. but we wanted to come up with a balanced offense. I think we beat them at their own game. Morel came up with a great eatch on that last scoring drive. and our offensive line did a tremendous job when we needed clutch yardage.



For the fourth time in five years, Florida State is going bowling.

Following the 1964 season, the Seminoles went to the Gator Bowl, downing Oklahoma 36-19. Florida State didn't make it in 1965, but was invited to the Sun Bowl the following season where the Tribe dropped a 28-20 decision to Wyoming.

Last season, Florida State returned to the Gator Bowl where the Seminoles and Nittany Lions battled to a thrilling 17-17 standoff. The Tribe was down 17-0 at halftime.

Offensive guard Larry Pendleton will have the honor of starting his 33rd straight varsity contest when the Seminoles battle LSU December 30 in the Peach Bowl.

As a sophomore, Pendleton was the starting middle guard on defense. In his junior season he switched to offensive guard and he has been a starter there for two straight years.

Florida State's "pro-style of leadership" is not limited to athletics. It permeates the 350-acre campus and characterizes the University's 41,000 alumni, 16,000 students and more than 3,000 dedicated members of the faculty and staff.

HEAD FOOTBALL COACH

BILL PETERSON



In just nine years Bill Peterson has lifted Florida State's football team from the ranks of a struggling Southern Independent university to one of high regard among the nation's football powers.

The Toronto, Ohio, native became Florida State's fifth modern day football coach in 1960, and since has vigorously pursued his ultimate goal of bringing a national football championship to Tallahassee.

The mark of Peterson's Florida State teams has been the wide-open, pro-style offense. The Ohio Northern graduate was one of the first

collegiate coaches in the country to employ the pro-type attack, and while building a strong foundation for Florida State's gridiron future, he has established the Seminoles as one of the Nation's most exciting offensive football teams.

The 1967 Seminoles, playing the toughest schedule in the school's 21-year gridiron history, rolled up a 7-2-1 record during the regular season and then tied Penn State 17-17 in the Gator Bowl. During the regular season the Seminoles defeated Cotton Bowl Champion Texas A&M, 19-18, and tied Alabama, 37-37. Following the bowl appearance the Tribe was ranked fourth in the nation by SPORTS ILLUSTRATED.

The 1967 team also produced the second win over intra-state rival Florida, and the Seminoles' second concensus All-America, flanker Ron Sellers. Quarterback Kim Hammond was named to three All-America teams, finished fifth in the coveted Heisman Trophy balloting and rewrote the Florida State record book.

The 1964 Seminoles compiled the best record of a Peterson coached team (8-1-1) and produced the Tribe's first All-America, receiver Fred Biletnikoff, along with the team's first major bowl appearance, a 36-19 win over Oklahoma in the Gator Bowl.

In 1963 and again in 1964 Peterson was selected "Coach of Week" by the nation's wire services. He received the honor following the Seminoles 24-0 upset over Miami in the 1963 opener and then for the Tribe's 48-6 win over the then fifth-ranked Kentucky Wildcats.

Peterson was an end and team captain at Ohio Northern, graduating in 1946. He was an offensive line coach under Paul Dietzel at LSU before coming to Florida State and was credited with recruiting and developing many of the players on LSU's 1958 national champions.

The Seminole head coach has done graduate work at both West Virginia and LSU. He is a member of the Methodist church. He and his wife Marjorie have five sons: Ron, Tommy, Jon, Billy and David.



1968 IN REVIEW

FLORIDA STATE 24, MARYLAND 14

COLLEGE PARK (Sept. 21)—The Seminoles started the season off right with a 24-14 victory over a stubborn Maryland team looking for its first win since 1966.

Grant Guthrie's 26-yard field goal gave the Seminoles the lead early in the second period but the Terps' nifty passer, Alan Pastrana, led them right back to a touchdown on a pass to Rick Carlson.

The Tribe jumped back in front when Phil Abraira recovered a fumbled punt on the Maryland 19 and three plays later Gary Pajcic passed to John Pittman for the score.

Near the end of the half, a Terp punt gave the Seminoles a first down on their own 18. Pajcic teamed up with Sellers on the first play for an 82-yard touchdown aerial and Florida State led 17-7 at intermission.

The Seminoles dominated play in the final two stanza's, although the two teams traded touchdowns.

Bill Cappleman made his first appearance of 1968, but it was not one he will want to remember. His first play was a pass that strayed into the hands of Maryland's Henry Gareis, who returned it for a touchdown.

Later, however, Cappleman came back and directed the Seminoles the final 52 yards of an 85-yard touchdown drive after Pajcic got hurt. The junior signal caller scored himself from the one.

Later in the same period Tribe linebacker Steve Gildea picked off a Suggs pass (one of three Seminole interceptions for the night) and returned it 48 yards to the Carolina 33. Cappleman found Sellers for a 20-yard touchdown pass to tie it up again.

The Seminoles set up offensive shop again in the fourth quarter. Starting at their own 20 they moved 80 yards to the game's final score. For the third time it was the Cappleman to Sellers combination that clicked for the touchdown.

Sellers had 16 catches (a national season high) for 259 yards and three touchdowns for his night's work. Cappleman completed 25 of 42 for 437 yards.

Suggs' 24 completions in 37 attempts and 324 yards passing were all good for records against the Seminoles, as were his 370 yards total offense.

After Grant Guthrie missed a field goal at the end of the initial drive, the Gobblers drove 80 to a field goal of their own. On the second play after the ensuing kickoff, Tech picked off a Bill Cappleman pass and had a first down on the Tribe 15 yard line. Moments later Greg Smoot scored and the Hokies led 10-0.

On the first play of the second quarter Cappleman found Jim Tyson for a 34-yard scoring pass, narrowing the score to 10-7. The Gobblers got it right back, however, following another interception deep in Seminole territory to stretch the lead to 17-7.

A third interception gave the Hokies the ball on their own 12. It took just one play for fullback Ken Edwards to score. He raced the 88 yards on a quick-opener.

The Seminoles tried a little razzle-dazzle on the kickoff when Tom Warren lateraled to Gary Pajcic. The ball went awry and Tech recovered at the 10. George Constantinides scored on the first play and the Hokies led 31-7 at the half.

Tech added a field goal in the third period and fourth period touchdown for their 40 points. Cappleman found Tyson for a second TD pass and Warren passed to Pajcic late in the game for the Seminoles' final score.

Coach Bill Peterson summed it up this way: "Mistakes killed us...(but) I have faith in our kids. They'll come back."

The Bulldogs took the ensuing kickoff and marched 66 yards to a touchdown. A two-point try was no good and the score stood 17-6.

The Maroon defense stiffened also, and following a Seminole punt, MSU marched 73 yards to another touchdown. The two-point try again failed and the half ended 17-12.

The Seminoles marched the second half kickoff back to the State nine where Guthrie booted his second field goal, giving the Seminoles a 20-12 edge.

The fourth quarter saw Cappleman hit Billy Cox with a 32-yard pass for the Tribe's final score. Cappleman was tackled in the end zone for a Mississippi State safety bringing the final to 27-14.

period and eight plays later Bill Gunter ripped through right tackle for a touchdown.

On the first play following the kickoff, Chuck Elliott intercepted a pass at the NCS 41. It took Cappleman and Co. just six plays to add six more points on a pass to Gunter.

With just seconds left in the third period, Gary Yount fumbled Bill Cheshire's punt at the two-yard line. Billy Cox recovered and two plays later Gunter went over for the score.

Three minutes into the final stanza the Seminoles got their last score. Tommy Warren returned a punt to the State 45 and after two plays, Cappleman hit Abraira with a 37-yard TD strike. The Seminoles went for two and missed. With second units playing the final 12 minutes that was all the scoring for the day.

The Seminoles dedicated this game to President Emeritus, Dr. Doak S. Camp-

The day was not all FSU, however. Bill Cappleman to Sellers passes for 26 and five yards gave the Seminoles a 14-0 lead after one period. The Deacons fought back behind the arm of All-ACC quarterback Freddy Summers to take a 17-14

lead at the half.

A fumble led to another Wake Forest touchdown early in the third period as

the Deacs went on top 24-14.

The Seminoles got cranked up again, however, and the fears of the Seminole Homecoming crowd were soon abated. Cappleman hit Sellers with a short pass and the 6-4 receiver gave one of his patented fakes and raced 48 yards for the

On the next drive, Cappleman gave his favorite target a rest as the Seminoles stayed on the ground. Bill Gunter scored on a three-yard sweep and the Tribe was

in front to stay.

Still in the third period, Cappleman found Sellers again and with a move here and another there, "Jingle Joints" strung the Deacon secondary out behind him as he raced into the end zone. It was his fourth TD, and a Wake Forest cornerback asked Sellers if he hadn't had enough for one day.

Sellers answered, "No," and came back with less than five minutes in the game to score a national all-time record-tying fifth touchdown on a 30-yard Cappleman

aerial.

His performance jumped Sellers into the No. 1 spot in the nation for career yards receiving passes. It also earned him national lineman of the week honor, from both the AP and SPORTS ILLUSTRATED.

If you are Bill Peterson you tell the world the game is a mismatch, and then do

something to even your chances.

That "something" was to gamble. "Take away three of the four things they do with their option and hope they don't kill you with the fourth," an assistant explained.

So the Seminoles stacked the line. They brought up the linebackers and cornerback Chuck Eason. With one man keying on the deep back and another on the quarterback, the Tribe broke Houston's patented option with an eight-man

line.

The Seminole defense was faultless in the first half. It held All-America Paul Gipson to just 54 yards rushing. The Cougars managed only six first downs. Time and again on a big third down situation the Seminole defense not only held but tossed the Cougars for a loss.

Meanwhile, the Seminole offense was dissecting the Houston defense with the pin-point passing of Bill Cappleman. The junior signal caller had touchdown passes to Phil Abraira and Chip Glass while Bill Gunter and Tom Bailey scored

overland.

At the half, 39,400 fans were ecstatic as the Seminoles went to the dressing

room with a 25-0 advantage.

The Cougars adjusted at the half. They went with the fourth option-the pass-in the final 30 minutes and Gipson started getting big chunks of yardage up the middle. But it was of little avail as the Seminole offense also kept rolling. The end result was never in serious doubt.

Cappleman passed to Ron Sellers for a 62-yard score and 46 yards to Billy Cox

on another TD strike.

Gipson scored on runs of six and 55 yards for Houston and Len Heiskell

scored the final TD.

SPORTS ILLUSTRATED named Cappleman National Back of the Week for his performance which included 25 completions in 34 attempts and four touchdowns. The TD's brought his total to 13 in three ball games and a national season high of 25.

The only disappointment of the game came after the Seminoles' first touchdown when Grant Guthrie missed the extra point attempt-his first miscue in 57 tries. Ironically, the only other miss of the junior placekicker's career was against

Houston last year.
