Tribe Tonight

Don't ask Seminole head football coach Bobby Bowden how good his '81 Seminoles are.

The sixth-year mentor isn't sure despite the surprising 17-0 win over Louisville last Saturday. Yes, the Tribe was expected to win the meeting with the Cardinals, but no one connected with the Seminoles knew how the win would be structured.

Looking back, the victory ingredients were rather simple; a tough defense that wanted to prove it wasn't as bad off as advertised by some and an opportunistic offense.

Still, the jury is out on this year's squad. Perhaps Bowden, his staff and the loyal Garnet and Gold fans will learn more tonight with the invasion of Memphis State.

"I know this, we did some things right against Louisville, but did a lot more wrong," Bowden commented early in the week. "The key to our season will be if we can improve in those areas where something went wrong. If we can't we'll be in for a pot full of problems."

Bowden, when questioned, will admit this could become a better-than-average football team if it can improve with every practice and game. Also the Seminoles must be free of the injury bug.

Thus you can watch tonight for that hoped-for improvement. If it comes, the Seminole express will still be on track. If not there will be genuine concern for worry next week as the Tribe makes preparations for the most rugged five-game road schedule in the history of collegiate football.

Memphis State is an unknown quantity. The Tigers, playing their first game ever for Rex Dockery last Saturday, lost a 20-3 verdict to Mississippi State.

One area where the Seminoles will have an advantage tonight they didn't have last Saturday is in experience. The Tigers list only one offensive senior starter with eight juniors, a sophomore and freshman. Over on the defense there are three seniors, five juniors and three sophomores.

"For a club that was just putting itself together with so many inexpe-

rienced people, I thought Memphis State did a good job of keeping everything together together last Saturday," said Bowden.

The defense took charge of keeping the Tribe together. Linebackers Ken Roe and Ron Hester, who are trying to carry on the linebacker tradition started with Reggie Herring and Paul Piurowski, checked in with 10 and nine tackles, respectively. Next on the tackle chart was defensive end Jarvis Coursey, who had eight assists.

"That defense played better than I thought it could for this time of the season," Bowden said. "I never would have thought we could shut Louisville out. It was too much to hope for. I thought we may give up something like 14 points and score 21, but they surprised me."

Bowden may begin to expect the shutout in opening games. The white-wash of Louisville was the third opening game shutout in the last four seasons for the Seminoles. It also marked the third straight year FSU has not allowed Louisville to score.

"I think," said Bowden, "this may be a lot better Louisville team than the ones we played in the previous two years. We'll just have to wait and see what they do the remainder of the season but I suspect that team will win some big games this season."



I will be surprised if it doesn't."

One area the Seminole staff spent considerable time on in practice this week was the offense. FSU quarterback Rick Stockstill was sacked six times by the Cards and was heavily pressured on several other plays.

"We weren't picking up the blitz or making the blocks we were supposed to make," Bowden said.

Part of the problem, however, may have been with the game plan FSU elected to utilize vs. Louisville. Bowden and his coordinator George Henshaw has agreed prior to the game that because the Seminoles were using so many young players on offense that Stockstill would not check off at the line of scrimmage. So, even though on several plays when Stockstill recognized the Cardinals were coming with the blitz, he didn't check off to a better play but went with the one called in the huddle.

"It was our (coaches) decision not to check off," Bowden said. "We felt because we were going with so many young players it would just add to the confusion and possibly the younger players would not be able to pick up the audible and there would be a mistake on their part anyway."

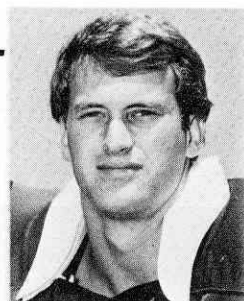
One would guess, however, that because there was more than one play where Stockstill was forced into a scramble situation last Saturday the Tribe will at least do some checking off this week against Memphis State.

It's part of that improvement Bowden wants each week which will make the Seminoles a better football team.

Coursey is Back for Seminoles

Jarvis Coursey's back. The success or lack of success of the 1981 Florida State Seminoles as it begins to undertake the most ambitious road schedule in the history of collegiate football may rest on Coursey's back—both figuratively and literally.

A native of Gray, Ga., Coursey came to the Seminoles in 1978 after every other college in the country turned their noses up at him and refused to offer him a scholarship. During his first two campaigns at FSU, Coursey lettered for the Seminoles while playing mostly on special teams or in a reserve role.

In 1980, however, Coursey blossomed into one of the premiere defensive ends in the South. After earning a starting berth during spring drills, Coursey came on last season to record 58 tackles and recover two fumbles. He helped pace the Seminole defense to a number one national ranking in defense—one that allowed just 7.7 points per game. Coursey realized that by playing a good game in the Orange Bowl, he could help lead the Seminoles to a national championship.

But while FSU was preparing for the Orange Bowl Classic, near disaster struck Coursey. During a scrimmage, Coursey had his legs chopped out from beneath him and his massive 6-5, 220-lb. frame came crashing down across teammate Ron Simmons, who also went down on the play.

"I can't really explain what happened," Coursey said. "I felt a severe, stinging pain in the back of my legs. I got up and went back into the huddle without talking to the trainers. The next day I could hardly move and I knew I was in trouble."

During a four-day Christmas recess, Coursey further aggravated the injury when he was helping his stepfather move some heavy items around their garage. By the time Jarvis got to the Orange Bowl a few days before the game, he could barely walk.

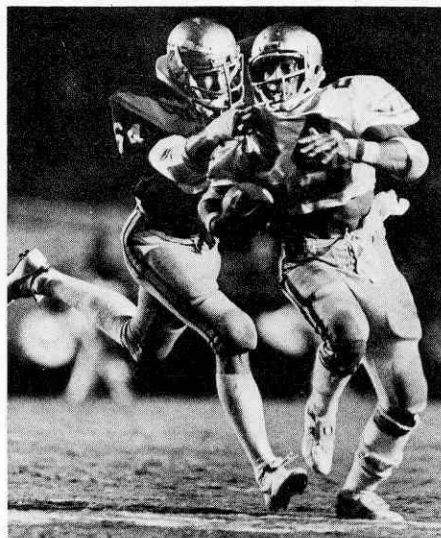
Although in severe pain, Coursey

is the type of player who will play on fortitude and courage when the physical abilities are exhausted. Against Oklahoma in the New Year's Day Classic, Jarvis made nine tackles including a crucial sack of Sooner Quarterback J.C. Watts. Although the Tribe came away from the game with a loss on a last second touchdown by Oklahoma, Coursey was selected defensive MVP of the game.

But that was last season, and the quiet Coursey would rather not dwell on past glories and injuries. Instead he looks forward to the 1981 season and the challenge on the upcoming schedule.

Coursey is one of only three returning starters in the Seminole defense, a defense that has been called young, untested and inexperienced by football experts and sports journalists in Florida. But Coursey is one individual who believes that the FSU defense in 1981 can be nearly as good as the one in 1980. "We may not have a lot of experience on defense, but I'll tell you what we do have," Coursey says. "We have a lot of talented players who are willing to give it all for the team."

If the Tribe's performance against Louisville last week in the season opener is any indication of how good the FSU defense can be, then maybe



the experts should heed Coursey's words.

Backed by Coursey and linebackers Ken Roe and Ron Hester, the defense limited a veteran Louisville squad to just 133 total yards, including just 65 on the ground. Jarvis, whose main responsibility is to make sure the running backs do not get outside to turn a big play, recorded eight tackles during the game—an impressive amount for a defensive end in FSU's alignment. For his efforts, Coursey was cited by the coaching staff for outstanding team effort.

Following tonight's game with Memphis State, the Tribe goes on a road trip that will take it to five of the biggest football factories in the country—Nebraska, Ohio State, Notre Dame, Pitt and LSU in a row. But Coursey shows no fear of the schedule. "It's going to be tough," Coursey says. "But I for one, and I think I speak for the rest of the team, am not afraid of who we play. We are going to be up for all of them and they will not intimidate us. They're going to have to beat us because we're not going to beat ourselves."

Defensive end coach Jim Gladden agrees with Coursey's assessment, but adds an important stipulation. "In order to have a good year, we need a healthy Jarvis Coursey. I'm super high on the kid," Gladden says. "Jarvis is the type of player that you need to win games. You don't often find players like him that have everything—speed, determination, aggressiveness and a good football sense."

The question again comes to the back—Coursey's back. How sound is it and is he 100 percent? "It's still a little sore," Coursey says. "But there is nothing that's going to keep me from playing this season. I think a lot of people still think we're a fluke team, but if we do well this season they're going to have to respect us."

Bowden & FSU: A Perfect Match

What is the reason for Bobby Bowden's Florida State success?

Perhaps retired Dr. Coyle Moore, who was dean for Florida State's School of Welfare and a long-time observer of the Seminole sports program, gives the best insight with the below quotation.

"Bobby Bowden is a Southern Cracker, to the manor born, perfectly adapted to us Southern Crackers and Rednecks in Northern Florida. He speaks our language, adheres to our religious faith, and fits our needs like a glove."

Bowden, who was raised in Alabama, has been able to tie together the loose ends of a major college football program with his downhome, country, folksy way of getting things done. A city slicker he ain't.

He has the ways of a southern cracker yet the polish of a sophisticated head coach from the eastern establishment thanks to a six-year head coaching stint at West Virginia. Bowden has been able to find the right blend that makes him the second most popular head coach in the deep south today. Only Paul "Bear" Bryant of Alabama draws more attention.

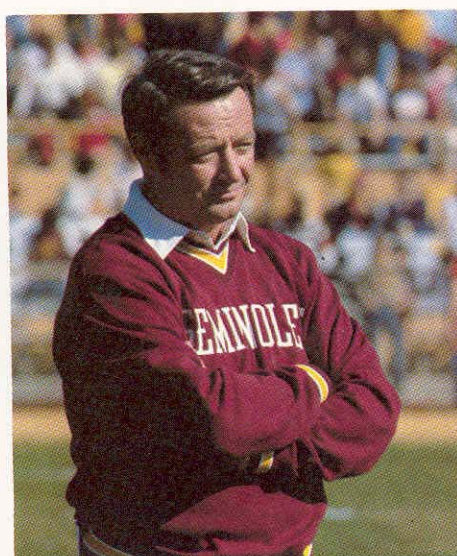
At various times in the last two years, Bowden has been described by the media as a "savior" and "St. Bobby." Indeed, he has fit the needs of the Florida State football program like a glove. Bowden has taken a program that was in ashes and turned it into one of the most respected in the country.

In case you disagree, consider . . .

(1) A 44-14 record in five seasons compared to a 19-38 in five years B.B. (Before Bowden);

(2) Back-to-back Orange Bowl appearances when the school had never previously appeared in a New Year's Day post-season contest;

(3) Second place spots in both the Associated Press and United Press International Top 20 polls at the close of the 1980 regular season;



(4) Consecutive Top 10 finishes in the final wire service polls the last two years when FSU only once previously since 1947 had finished in the Top 20.

Yes, the Florida State football program has turned around with Bobby Bowden at the helm. In fact, it can even be described as amazing. That first year (1976) the Tribe went 5-6—not a good mark by many standards, but when one remembers the previous year was 3-8, 1976, was considered a plus. Since then FSU has reeled off regular season marks of 9-2, 8-3, 11-0 and 10-1.

There have been three bowl appearances—the 1977 Tangerine and 1980 and 1981 Orange Bowls. The Tribe has

consistently ranked in the Top 20 each of the last two years and there have been eight national or regional television appearances—more than any other school in the country.

Bowden is the first to recognize the work of his staff for bringing the Seminole program to the point where it exists today. But, others direct the credit to the 51-year old Bowden.

This was quite evident during and after the 1979 season when Bowden's name was mentioned for every head coaching position that opened. But, FSU President Bernie Sliger managed to get Bowden's name on a contract that should make him a permanent fixture in Tallahassee and Doak Campbell Stadium for many years to come.

Bowden signed an automatically renewing five year contract that contains a clause unique to college athletics—if Bowden elects to resign from his current employer for another coaching position, he must pay FSU for the time remaining on the contract.

"It means we are married and nobody's going to put our marriage asunder," Bowden explained. "I didn't want to go anywhere. I wanted to stay here. I love it here. Florida State and its fans are not spoiled yet."

Bowden realizes there is room for the program to grow.

"We haven't won the national championship," Bowden says. "We were close last year—a pair of two point conversion plays kept us from winning the title. No, we still have some growing room. It ain't the time for 'ole Bobby and his players to sit back. There's still work to be done."

Still, Bowden can fondly recall the pleasant memories of the last five seasons. Twice he has been named National Coach of the Year. First the honor was given by ABC-TV and Chevrolet after the 1979 season and at the close of the 1980 campaign, the American Sportsmanship Council named him

mind on FSU's staff in the 1960's, when Bill Peterson was head coach and the Seminoles were first making waves in the polls with a celebrated passing game that featured wide receiver Fred Biletnikoff.

Bowden left to be offensive coordinator under Jim Carlen at West Virginia. When Carlen checked out, going to his current job at South Carolina, Bowden became head coach of the Mountaineers. He was doing well in a tough situation and, when Florida State called Bowden had to give it some thought.

After two minutes, he accepted.

asm in everything you do in life," Bowden says," and you coach what you believe. If we can be enthusiastic in the little things we do, it will carry over to a winning season.

"But don't get me wrong about discipline. I believe in letting the players know who is boss, and I believe in some sacrifice and devotion. But discipline can only go so far.

"Heck, I've always said that if short hair and perfect manners won football games, the Army-Navy game would be played every year for the national championship."

its "Bobby Dodd Coach of the Year." And twice he has been the Associated Press Southern Independent Coach of the Year.

Success fits Bowden. He has been just as successful at his previous head coaching stops—Samford and West Virginia.

His Samford record was 31-6 over four seasons. In six years at West Virginia, he piloted the Mountaineers to a 42-26 record and two Peach Bowl appearances. His 44-14 FSU log gives him a career mark of 117-46, a .717 winning percentage.

Bowden is no Tallahassee stranger. He had been an offensive coaching

"I'm a southern boy who wants to be in the Deep South," he said. "I slipped on ice once too often, got bogged down in the snow one time too many. I didn't want to act anxious, but I was eager to come to Florida State."

Bowden doesn't follow a complicated coaching philosophy. In fact, it's quite simple.

"I believe in blocking and tackling," he says. "Everything else in this game is irrelevant, blocking and tackling will cause wins."

Enthusiasm and discipline are key words which exemplify Bowden's overall attitude, both on and off the field.

"I believe in discipline and enthusi-

coach. He is also a deeply religious individual, who speaks often to church groups throughout the state.

"God is an integral part of my life," Bowden says. "I look to God for guidance but firmly believe God helps those who help themselves. Man must help himself, but also seek guidance."

Born on November 8, 1929, Bowden attended Woodlawn High School in Birmingham, Ala., and was a Little All-American quarterback at Samford University. He holds a bachelor's degree from Samford and master's from Peabody College. He married his childhood sweetheart, the former Julia Ann Estock and they have six children.

Jim Gladden, Defensive Ends

Jim has been with the Seminole coaching staff since 1975, when he first was a graduate assistant. He was promoted to full-time status a year later and has tutored the defensive ends ever since. He also schedules FSU's junior varsity games.

Gladden came to Florida State after 15 years of coaching the prep ranks. He coached high school teams in Kansas, Missouri, Kentucky, Tennessee and Florida before entering the collegiate ranks.

A native of Springfield, Mo., Gladden graduated from William Jewell College in Liberty, Mo., where he was an all-conference end.

Jack Stanton, Defensive Coordinator. Jack is in his sixth year of heading up the Seminole's defensive strategies. He also serves as the Tribe's defensive secondary coach.

Stanton is the veteran of the assistant coaches. He began his coaching career in the high school ranks in Kentucky, West Virginia and Virginia. He later moved to George Washington University and then spent five seasons at North Carolina State, his alma mater.

Stanton was the defensive backfield coach for FSU in 1974 but returned to N.C. State for two seasons to join Bill Dooley's staff. Bowden brought him back to FSU in 1976.

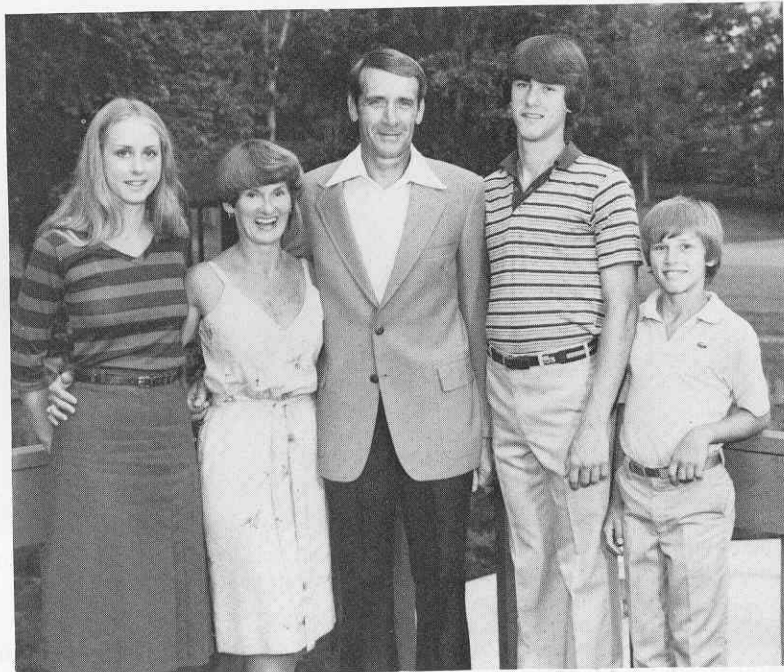


John Eason, Receivers. John is the newest Seminole coach. This will be his first campaign as the Garnet and Gold receiver coach.

Eason came to FSU from Tallahassee's Leon High School, where he was assistant principal since 1979. He was an assistant football coach at Leon between 1973 and 75, and had also coached in Ocala two years.

Eason was an All-American receiver and punter for crosstown Florida A&M, graduating in 1969 with his degree. He played professional football three years, two with the Oakland Raiders and a third with the Montreal Alouettes of the CFL.

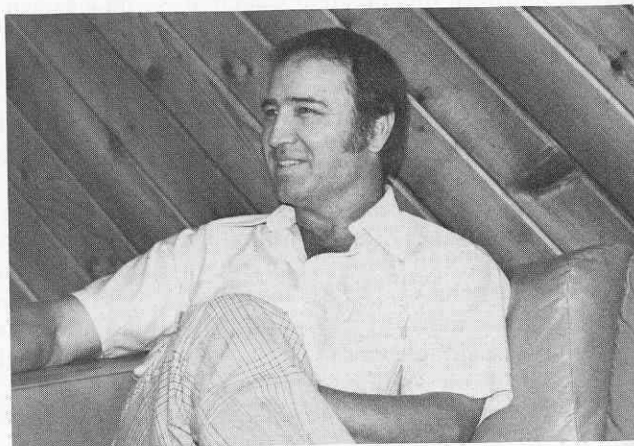

Gene McDowell, Linebackers. Gene McDowell is one of three Seminole coaches who now coach at their alma mater. McDowell has spent the last 18 years coaching football and most recently, directing the Seminole linebackers.

McDowell spent his early coaching years with the Seminoles but moved to Kansas State briefly. He returned to Tallahassee in 1974 to coach the defensive ends and took the linebacking duties when Bowden became head coach.

McDowell, a native of Quincy, lettered three years at linebacker for FSU. He was selected third team Associated Press All-America following his senior season. Gene is a bachelor.





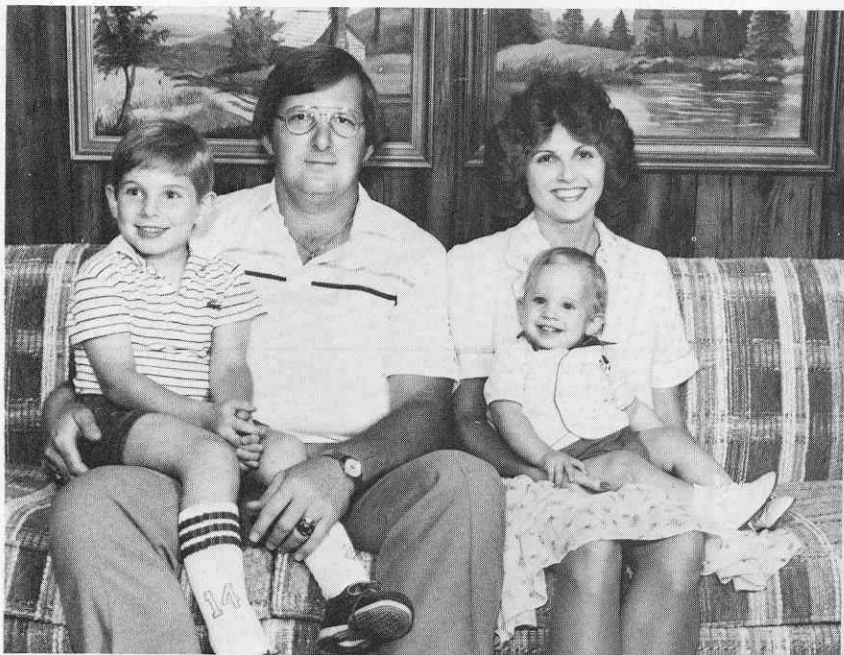
◀ **Billy Sexton, Quarterbacks.** Billy, the youngest member of the Seminole staff, is in his fifth year at Florida State. He has been on the full-time staff for three seasons.

Sexton earned his bachelor's degree from FSU in 1974, then moved to Tallahassee's Leon High School where he spent three years coaching the offense. He returned to FSU in 1976 as a graduate assistant.

Sexton played football three years at Alabama before transferring to FSU in 1973 and picking up his degree. After coming to FSU, he was a starter at quarterback for the opening half of the 1973 season. (l-r) Joy, Leslie and Billy Sexton

George Henshaw, Offensive Coordinator. George has been an assistant coach under Bowden for the last eight years. He serves as offensive coordinator, his third season in that capacity. During his first three seasons at FSU, he coached the noseguards and tackles.

Henshaw was also with Bowden at West Virginia where he was the defensive line coach from 1972-76. Prior to that, he played under Bowden at WVU where he was a three-year starter at defensive tackle. ▲ **Bill Shaw, Defensive Line.** Bill is Florida State's third-year defensive line coach. He came to the Seminoles from Jacksonville (Ala.) State where he was defensive coordinator for two seasons. Prior to that, he coached at VMI three seasons.

Shaw was a member of Florida State's 1968 Peach Bowl and 1969 Fiesta Bowl squads. After graduation, he was briefly a graduate assistant at his alma mater.

At Jacksonville State, Shaw's 1977 defense limited six of its opponents to a touchdown or less on its way to the NCAA Division II playoffs. Overall, the school had an 18-6 record while Shaw designed the defenses.

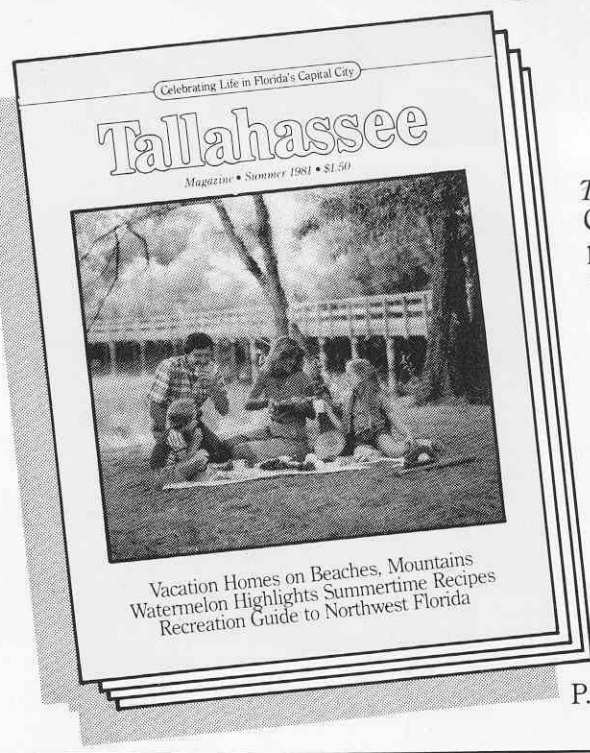
A graduate of Indiana, Harbison played offensive end and defensive line for the Hoosiers and finished his career with a performance in the Blue-Gray game.

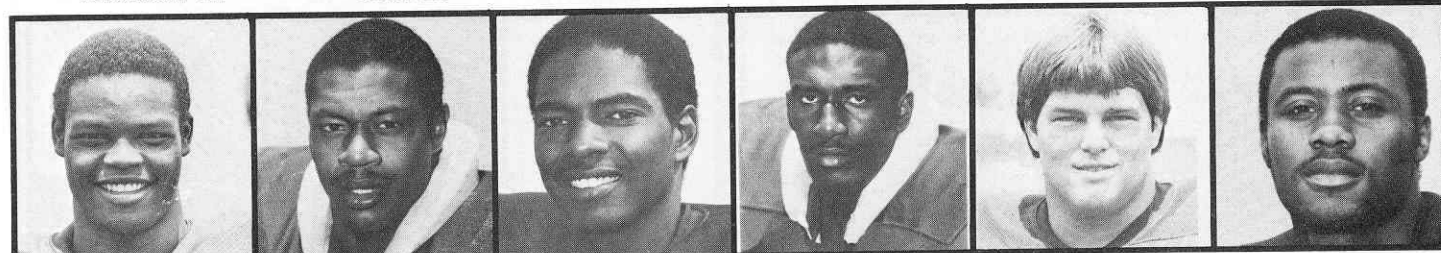


Cornerback Harvey Clayton nails this Louisville ball carrier

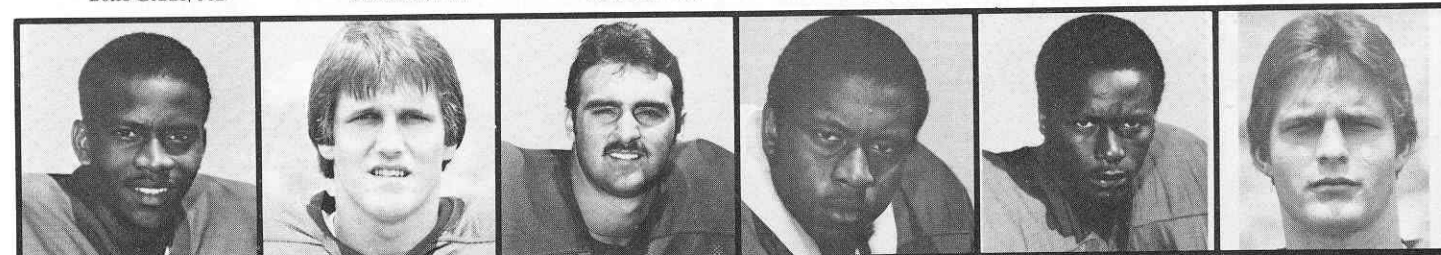

Dennis McKinnon has the potential to be one of the most explosive and exciting performers on the Seminole team.

This year, he has shown signs of developing into the consistent receiver the Seminoles need. If he can maintain that consistency, opponent defensive backs will have to worry about McKinnon's big play ability.

McKinnon continued his jinx on Louisville last week, leading the receiving corps with five passes for 54 yards.

Dennis has also returned kickoffs over the last two seasons and served as the Seminole's punt returner in last week's opener. He didn't break one, but give him an inch of daylight and he'll be gone. That's what Garnet and Gold fans are waiting for.

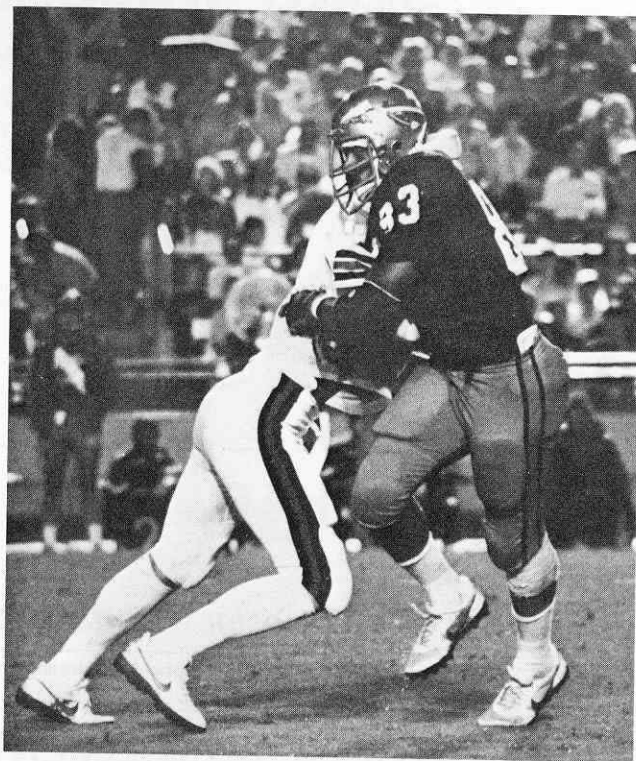
Football fans are expecting big things from Ron Hester this year. His coach, Gene McDowell, has hinted that Hester may be the best linebacker in America. Pro scouts are drooling over his speed—which has been clocked between 4.2 and 4.56 in the 40-yard dash.

Why, then, all this fuss over a young man who has started only two games in his career prior to the 1981 season?

For the reason, look at last year's final tackle chart. In a part-time role, he totaled 50 tackles, fifth-best on the defense. Included were three quarterback sacks, three tackles for loss and two blocked kicks. Hester even scored two touchdowns—a 50-yard interception return vs. Louisville and a 33-yard blocked punt return vs. Boston College.

Hester had his first collegiate start in the Pittsburgh game, filling in for Paul Piurowski who was unable to play after an appendectomy. Hester had 13 tackles, two fumble recoveries and was named Associate Press Southeastern Lineman of the Week in that contest.

Ron, who originally walked on at FSU, lived up to his pre-season billing last week vs. Louisville. After a limited fall practice due to injuries, he was out there in a starting role and recorded nine tackles.

In addition to the Chiefs' performances at home games and road contests, their past national and regional television appearances have brought them into the homes of millions.

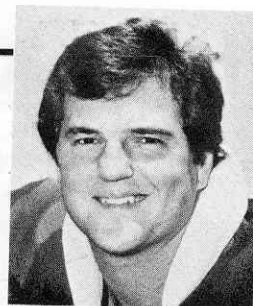
As the Chiefs step out on the field this year, audiences will be greeted by the familiar version of the style

Brannon: The Silent Leader of the Offensive Line

When you think of Florida State offensive guard Tom Brannon the first thought that comes to mind is the stereotype of an old matinee idol—strong and silent.

Brannon's anonymity dissolved this season when he was tabbed as the only returning starter on the rebuilt Seminole offensive line. And, he's at a new position, moving from tackle to guard this fall.

"I'm real quiet," Brannon whispered. "You're not going to find me jumping up and down and saying a lot about nothing. If I'm going to lead I'm going to lead by example—or at least try to."

Highly recruited by Georgia, Auburn and Alabama, Brannon arrived on the Florida State campus in 1977, and was redshirted in 1978 when he played behind fellow Albany, Georgia, native Nat Henderson.

"I think that redshirt season helped me," Brannon says. "They say offensive linemen take longer to mature and I guess they're right. I've matured physically and I'm a lot smarter than when I arrived."

With his five years of playing experience, two prior to this season in a starting role, Brannon serves as a role model for the younger players on an all but new Seminole team.

"There's pressure knowing that you're the only starter and that everyone is looking at you," Brannon shrugged. "The underclassmen know you have the experience and they expect you to know what you're doing out there."

The pressure and new found fame hasn't changed the 6-3, 250-pound senior who describes himself as "laidback."

"It takes a good bit to upset me and I haven't been upset in a while," Brannon smiled. "Things get to me but I don't go home and sulk. If I have a bad day at practice I'll just come

back the next day and try to correct my mistakes and pick up where I left off.

"I'm laidback but I guess I'm more serious than anything else. When I'm with good friends I like to let loose. People think I'm shy, but that's not the case. I don't have a lot to say, but what I say I mean."



Brannon's consistency and constitution has earned him the admiration of his teammates and coaching staff.

"Offensive linemen do not get the media exposure, but I don't expect it," Brannon said. "The runningbacks get the big yardage and the quarterbacks throw the big passes, but the offensive line just seems to be there. When the runningbacks and quarterbacks come up and shake your hand you know you've done your job."

"Tom is consistent and and dependable," said offensive coordinator and line tutor George Henshaw. "He hasn't been hurt and he's at practice every day. He's a good hard worker."

"He's a quiet kind of guy and the type of player you like to have in your program. At the conclusion of this season hopefully Tommy will have started 36 games for Florida State. You just wish everyone could

be like that—a player that you know will do his best."

Brannon's personality fits the mold of the offensive lineman which Brannon admits is occasionally maligned.

"A lot of people have the impression that offensive linemen are not too bright upstairs," Brannon laughed. "To be on the line you have to be thinking all the time. You have to have good size—which I guess I have—good speed—mine is about average—and some smarts."

Much has changed for Brannon since enrolling at FSU. He married the first girl he met at Florida State July 18, and should receive a degree in criminology at the conclusion of the spring semester.

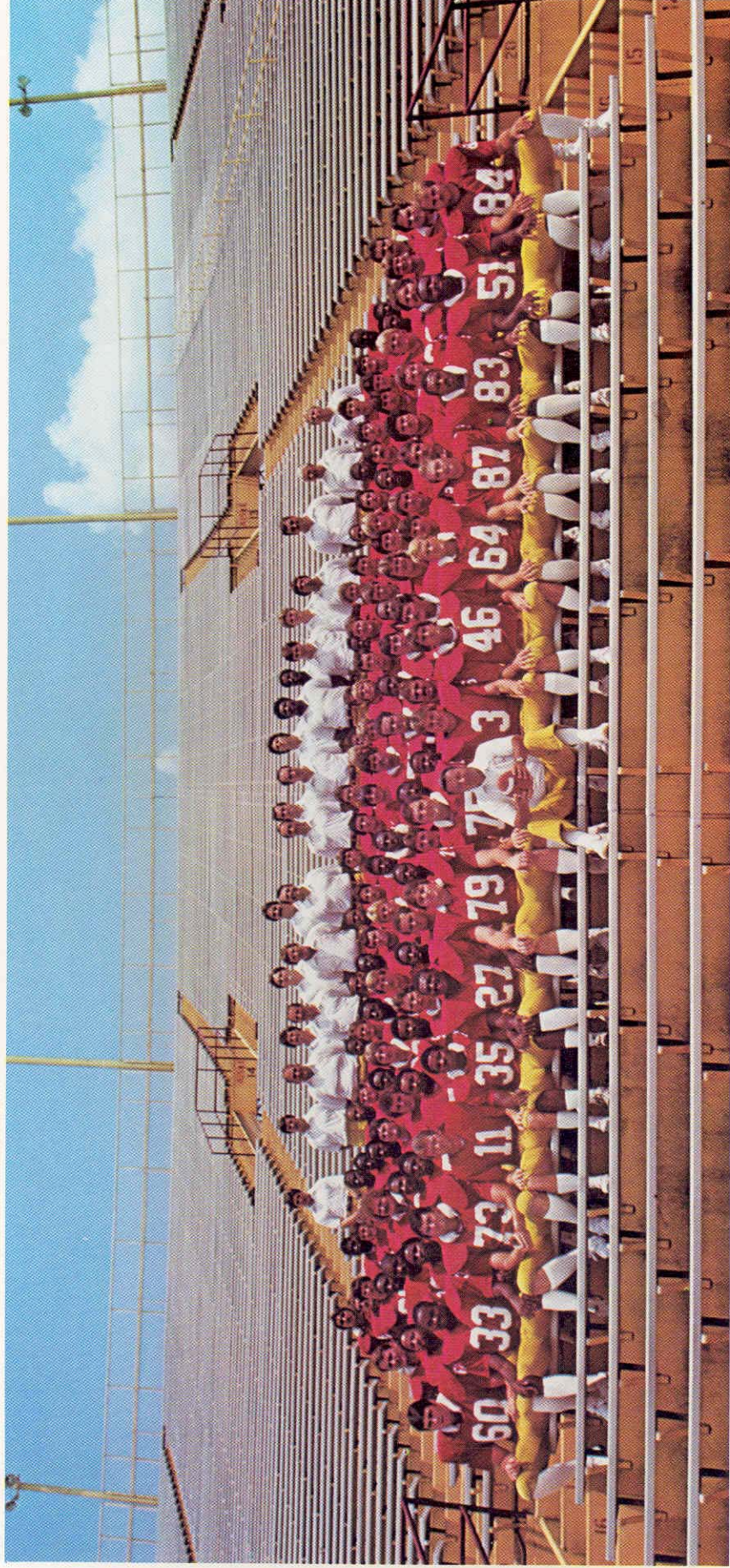
"I can't see myself being happier anywhere than at Florida State," Brannon reflected. "A lot of people say how they wouldn't do this or how they wouldn't do that, but I haven't regretted any decisions I've made in terms of football. I wouldn't trade it for anything. Football has taught me never to give up and to keep going no matter what."

"Being married to Cindy, I am able to see my priorities clearer. I'm not doing the things I used to—which I wouldn't tell. I've continued to mature and I'm more serious about the game. She's given me the inspiration I needed during two-a-days and she helps me when the going gets rough. I guess you could say she picks me up."

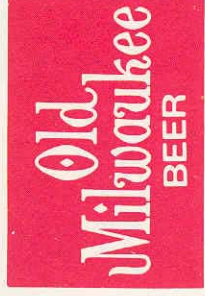
"After graduation, I have a few business opportunities I want to look into in private security. I'd like to give the pros a shot, but its not my main goal in life—it's not one of those driving forces. If I get the shot I'll take it, but if it doesn't work out I won't be one of those frustrated jocks."

THE RANKINGS: Once again this week FSU is ranked in the Top 20 of the wire service polls. The Associated Press rankings list the Tribe at 18th, one notch above their pre-season ranking. United Press International did not release a Top 20 this week.

THE CAPTAINS: Florida State has four captains for the season. They include quarterback Rick Stockstill (11), fullback Mike Whiting (27), cornerback James Harris (33) and noseguard James Gilbert (51). Memphis State will have game captains.

THE COACHES: Bobby Bowden (Samford '52) is in his sixth season as head coach at Florida State. The Seminole program has taken a dramatic upward turn since Bowden's arrival. In five seasons plus one game, he has taken the Tribe to a 45-14 record that includes a combined 21-3 mark in the 1979 and 1980 seasons. This is the third head coaching stop for the 51-year-old Birmingham, Ala., native. He had a 31-6 mark at Samford (1959-62) and went 42-26 while at West Virginia (1970-75). His overall record is now 118-46 (72.0 winning percentage).

Rex Dockery (Tennessee '65) was named head coach at Memphis State on December 17, 1980. He accepted the Tigers' position after serving three years as head coach at Texas Tech and compiling a 15-16-2 record. Dockery grew up in Cleveland, Tn., where he developed a friendship with present Ole Miss head coach Steve Sloan. Dockery was the offensive coordinator for Sloan at both Vanderbilt and Texas Tech.

HOME WINNING STREAK: Florida State enters tonight's home game with a 17-game winning streak at Doak Campbell Stadium. The Seminoles have not been beaten at home since Houston won a 27-21 verdict on September 30, 1978. Memphis State has been one of the winning streak victims, losing 66-17 during the 1979 season.

UNBLEMISHED FOURTH: The Seminoles have now played 12 consecutive REGULAR SEASON games without being scored on in the fourth quarter. The Tribe never gave up a point in the final 15 minutes during the '80 regular season, but Oklahoma did tally seven points in the Orange Bowl where FSU lost an 18-17 verdict.

NEXT WEEK: FSU begins what's probably the most grueling road schedule in the history of college football at Nebraska next Saturday. That's followed by road dates at Ohio State, Notre Dame, Pittsburgh and LSU before the Seminoles return home on October 31. Memphis State opens its home schedule next Saturday against Mississippi.

Florida State-- Bobby Bowden

"We won the defense and we won the kicking game. The offense sure does need improvement. If someone asks me about the offense, I wouldn't say we didn't improve. Everytime I looked up we had first down and 15 to go, 1st down and 20 or 1st down and 25 to go. Our players said the Memphis State defense was barking out signals and I spoke to the officials but nothing was done. ~~XXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXX~~ When we got to the goal line, we looked terrible. The offensive line did better than last week but certainly not good enough. Rick (Stockstill) didn't seem to have it tonight. We brought Blair (Williams) in looking for that spark. We inserted Rick for our ball control offense. He doesn't make mistakes. Our defense was excellent tonight. People are going to say FSU was terrible, I say NO, the defense was excellent and the kicking game was excellent. If you can win two of the three parts of the game, you can usually win it."

Memphis State--Rex ~~XXXXXXXX~~ Dockery

"Overall, I thought it was an extremely hard hitting game. I have a lot of respect for Florida State. They play hard and clean. The kicking game was very good on both sides. Rohn Stark is a great athlete and one of their better players. (About the fourth down on their 25yd. line with less than two minutes to go)--we considered going for it but we decided to punt. We figured FSU wasn't going to throw the ball so we knew if we held them, we'd have a chance. Many things can turn a ball game around. Both teams made a lot of mistakes but I think you'll always see that early in the season. We had our chances to win in the fourth quarter but we didn't hit the open man and the motion penalty hurt us. I am very proud of the way our players tried. I don't think you can judge how well Florida State will do in the future by the way they played tonight. I think they'll go out and give anybody a tough game. (About the goal line stand)--You have to give credit to the entire defensive unit on that stand. If anybody fails, to do their job, the stand won't work."
