The View From Across The Field

A Tough October for FSU

Florida State head football coach Bobby Bowden has taken to referring to the Seminoles' next four games as "our Oktoberfest." While all the games do fall in the month of October, what distinguishes the Seminole schedule from others is that all four are played on the road, back-to-back, against preseason top 20 picks Ohio State, Notre Dame, Pittsburgh and LSU. Never mind that FSU's last game, a 34-14 loss to Nebraska, was on the road too.

Buckeye fans who don't know of Bowden's humor will think the sixth-year coach ought to pick a different title for the span of games. After all, the "Oktoberfest" is a festival, not a walk down the alley of despair. Surely Bowden meant that it may be a festival for four opponent coaches.

Never before in the history of major college football has any coach been handed such a challenging schedule. "When you put your schedule on the table and the table tilts, you know you're in trouble," quipped Bowden before the season. "Only General Custer played such a schedule and he played 'em on the road too."

It is a young and inexperienced but talented team that Bowden brings to Columbus today, one that shows eight new starters on defense and another seven on offense. The 34-14 loss at Nebraska is misleading in that the Huskers scored on an 82-yard punt return, on a 94-yard run from scrimmage and on a fumble recovery. Take those three plays out of the game and FSU played the Huskers evenly. Those big plays and the missed assignments that went along with them will happen to a young team.

"If we can improve each week and eliminate those kinds of mistakes, then we're a football team to contend with," said Bowden of his 2-1 Seminoles. "When graduation takes as many players away as it did to us last year, then you find out what kind of a football team you have. The big powers don't rebuild, they reload. Right now we're seeing if we can reload."

While the offense and defense usually come up first among talk in football circles and then folks get around to talking about the kicking game, with



FSU you better start with the latter, because no one has a better kicking game.

All-American punter Rohn Stark was recently referred to as "the next Ray Guy" in a feature by a national magazine. Against Nebraska, he punted eight times for a 51.1 average. Stark is the Seminoles' American Express card—they don't leave home without him.

Freshman Mike Rendina is the other half of the kicking game. While he has yet to be on the spot this fall, Rendina's high school credentials show he has range and accuracy. After a senior year in which he was the most sought after kicker in America, he became the first specialist ever named to Parade's All-American team.

Offensively, the Garnet and Gold has an experienced quarterback in Rick Stockstill. A year ago, he led Florida State to a 10-2 record and upset wins over Nebraska and Pitt. Slow to start in '81, Stockstill showed signs of his old self in the Nebraska contest, connecting on 16 of 26 passes for 173 yards.

The Seminoles have a bevy of talented runningbacks and receivers, but one of the problems with the offense thus far has been the on-and-off play of the line. Against Nebraska, FSU could only get 5½ yards on the ground. But when the holes do open, freshman Billy Allen has found them, running for 196 yards in three games. Senior Mike Whiting is the elder member of the group who usually draws the blocking assignments for Allen or junior Ricky Williams, who is the starter at

tailback when he's healthy. Freshmen Greg Allen and Cedric Jones carry in Bowden's plays from time to time.

Stockstill's favorite targets have been junior Dennis McKinnon (12 catches for 131 yards) and tight end Sam Childers, who caught five balls vs. Nebraska. Also look for freshman Jessie Hester to have some thrown his way.

The Tribe defense played well in its first two games, only yielding five points (two of those came by way of a safety). But against Nebraska, the big play haunted the young unit as it gave up 503 yards in total offense. The front seven has only veterans Jarvis Coursey (6-4, 220, Sr.) and Garry Futch (6-2, 245, Sr.) in the lineup with new faces at every other position.

One of those new faces is sophomore Alphonso Garreker, a 6-6 Columbus native who passed up Ohio State to play for the Seminoles. He's loomed big in the FSU defense, putting pressure on opponent quarterbacks. Carreker has 20 tackles, two for quarterback sacks and another for a loss.

Look for Art Schlichter to test the Florida State secondary early. Only corner James Harris (6-0, 195, Sr.) has a year of experience. Both safeties, Eric Riley (6-0, 170, So.) and Larry Harris (6-1, 200, So.) never played defense before this season; Riley was a wide receiver and Harris a runningback in 1980. This unit has speed and ability, but is probably the biggest area of inexperience.

Against Ohio State, Florida State badly needs a win. The Seminoles may start with the ball on the ground, trying to pound out a running game. But don't forget Bowden's aerial circus teams of the past—the Seminole coach may go to the air early and try to open things up a bit.

Game two of that awesome and long talked-about road trip is upon the Seminoles. Bobby Bowden and his Seminoles hope today will be the beginning of their Oktoberfest. **O**

Stark Mixes Decathlon, Football

Rohn Stark is a stereotype.

When he was born, his dad, with a hopeful eye toward the unique and distinctive, inserted that "h" in the traditional spelling of Ron.

Okay, Rohn Stark is a *unique* stereotype of the All-American boy.

Paint your word picture of what one of those is supposed to look like.

How about 6-foot-3, 195, well-tanned, hair a sun-burned blond—the overall striking appearance of what they used to call a matinee idol?

Paint on that mental canvas a person of broad interests and intelligence (a 3.3 average as a finance major at Florida State), and do not forget the fact he married the childhood sweetheart whom he had known since the fourth grade.

Last spring he became, in fact, an All-American in a second sport, track. Last fall he had earned that distinction in football.

If Stark does not live with the All-American dream, it is something close. Stark wants to run the decathlon in the 1984 Olympics.

The realistic prospect, however, is that some NFL team is going to come after him hard following his senior season at Florida State. There are those that say he is the college game's best punter since Ray Guy.

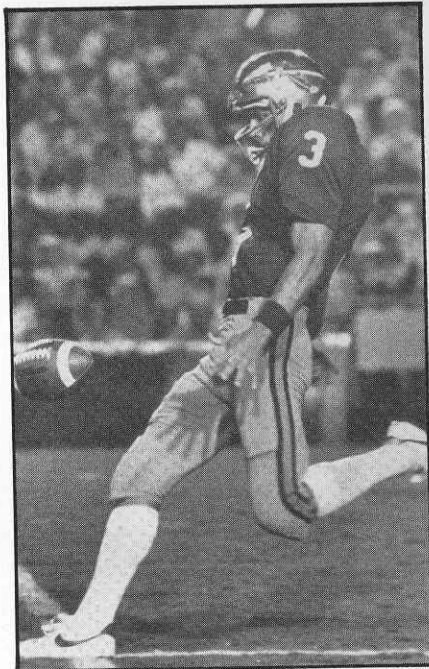
"If for some reason I was picked late in the pro draft and seemed not to have a whole lot to look forward to there, I would certainly vigorously pursue the decathlon," said Stark. "Still, if I don't score at a world-class level, I would soon give up my quest for the decathlon as far as the Olympics are concerned."

Progress in the multiple-event decathlon is tedious. In earning All-American acclaim, Stark registered 7,612 points while finishing eighth in the NCAA decathlon.

"World class is like over 8,000 points," said Stark. "I'm competing against guys who train the year-round in this event. I can't do that because of football."

While Stark leaves no question about his greater identity with track, he enjoys both sports immensely.

"Football is such a team thing—it's exciting," he said. "But you don't fulfill your own destiny as much. I spend a lot more time practicing track, and I love to practice it."



At night, Stark often goes alone to the FSU track and turns on the lights—he has a set of keys to do this. Then he runs. His wife Ann, a legal secretary, is sometimes with him. "She is so supportive," said Stark. "For the decathlon, she comes out and sits two days—which is about as hard as doing it."

His father, Don, has been a TWA pilot for 26 years. Rohn aspired to a similar career, and by age 17 was a licensed pilot back home in Fifty Lakes, Minn.

He received an appointment, out of high school, to the Air Force Academy, but a year of prep school was first required at Colorado Springs. After nine months, Stark returned home.

"I decided I didn't like the program that well," said Stark. "Another thing, when I took my physical they said I could never be an Air Force pilot because I had this slight curvature in my spine—something about the risk involved if I had to use an ejection seat. I didn't know about the curvature until I got there. Never had the slightest problem with it."

Another factor, perhaps the biggest: He wanted to go back home and marry Ann, which he did.

Florida State heard about Stark through John Crowe, an Air Force officer who taught Stark trigonometry at the prep school. When Stark dropped

out, Crowe sent films to FSU assistant Bob Harbison. FSU soon had Stark down for a visit, and offered him a scholarship. "I had never heard of Florida State," said Stark. "But I really liked the school."

Though he is a pilot, Stark has not flown a plane since he's been here. "Neither the resources nor the time," he said. "Football runs into track, and track runs into football."

He has not been home in three years. "I would have gone around Christmas, but we were in the Orange Bowl two years in a row," he explained.

Right-handed, Stark punts left-footed.

"I'm convinced that's the best combination for sports," he said. "Any time you do any activity right-handed, you have to lead with your left leg."

That left leg is inordinately strong. It *explodes* into a football.

The left-footed spin is a distinct plus. Return men find Stark punts hard to return. One reason is that he almost invariably kicks them high, but another is they're accustomed to the differing spins of right-footed kickers. Stark punts are more apt to be fumbled if a runner tries to handle them.

"I don't think they pay any attention to my being left-footed," he said. "I know I sit in on our own meetings, and I never hear them say 'this guy we're facing is a left-footed punter and we're gonna change our rush.'"

The rush that Stark faces is designed for right-footed punters. It gives Stark extra time. He's kicking from the other side.

"A tenth of a second is a lot of time when you're talking about punting," said Stark.

He has never had one blocked, except in the last spring game when he was working with a second-string snapper and also with the false impression that no attempts would be made to block punts in that game.

Just standing there on the field, Stark will kick eight of 10 balls about 75 yards from the point he's standing. There is the theory that punters are born, not made, and Stark tends to agree. He said he never received many tips until last year—when his average soared above 45 per and he attracted tremendous attention. "Then I started

pions). More than that, it was responsible, in large measure, for Fesler's resignation a few weeks later.

Considering the unreal conditions, you might think a coach would be spared criticism, but Fesler wasn't so lucky. A storm of controversy swelled, chiefly over his decision to order a punt on third down with only 46 seconds remaining in the first half. His critics felt Ohio State should have stalled out the time to intermission.

That the punt was blocked for Michigan's victory margin obviously didn't ease Fesler's situation, nor did his 0-4 record against Michigan mollify the grouching alums and downtown quarterbacks. He quit in December of 1950, to be succeeded by Woody Hayes.

Everything turned out much happier on Nov. 5, 1943. For one thing, the weather was vastly more pleasant as Ohio State and Illinois, two wartime teams of freshmen and military rejects, matched up in Ohio Stadium.

Buckeye partisans were not entirely ecstatic that day either, because an OSU passing try for a winning TD had misfired at the gun, leaving the teams tied at 26-26.

The stands began to empty, both teams ran to their dressing rooms and radio broadcasters signed off. However, Dispatch sports writer Paul Walker, on the sidelines, had seen an official throw a penalty flag on the final play. He knew the game could not end if that infraction had been called on the defense.

Walker caught up with the officials in their stadium dressing room. One official admitted he'd seen an Illinois offside, but had picked up his flag and taken off. Both coaches were then advised that one more play would have to be run.

Ohio State's Paul Brown was delighted. It meant a chance to win the game on a field goal. Illinois' Ray Eliot definitely was not delighted. But both teams did eventually come back on the field. The starters re-dressed, but many subs stood in the end zone in t-shirts, bare feet and holding their shoulder pads.

Brown's placekicker, John Stungis, had been a saxophonist in the Powhatan Point High School marching band only two seasons before. He'd kicked extra points as a 1943 Ohio State freshman, but no field goals. With the game riding on his foot, Stungis obviously felt pressure he'd never known before.

Brown put an arm around his shoulder as they walked to the field and consoled, "there's nothing to it, John. Why, I never missed one like this in my life."

The officials admittedly weren't sure of the previous line of scrimmage, but settled on the Illinois 21. The penalty moved it to the 16. The Buckeyes lined up, quarterback Bob McQuade set the ball, Stungis' leg came through and the ball sailed straight and true for a 29-26 Ohio State victory.

"I'm even with you, coach," shouted Stungis, grabbing Brown in a bearhug. "I've never missed one either."

"You're way ahead of me," Brown grinned. "I never even tried one."

The "fifth quarter", as it has been called, came approximately 15 minutes after the clock had run out. A majority of the fans had left the stadium, oblivious to the unexpected prologue. Many of them didn't know until they read the paper on Sunday morning.

The one-of-a-kind ending caused temporary domestic crisis for at least one husband. "What was the score of the Ohio State game?" demanded a woman on the telephone to the Dispatch sports department that Saturday night.

She was told Ohio State had won, 29-26. "Why, that dirty rat!" she screamed. "He didn't even go to the game at all. He tried to tell me it ended in a tie."

Ohio State's 7-6 victory over Northwestern in 1947 is generally less remembered, but undeniably belongs in this crazy-games trilogy. Had a script writer submitted a play-by-play account of the game for a movie, he would have been laughed out of Hollywood.

Out of character as it may seem today, the Buckeyes were in the Big Ten basement. Northwestern wasn't much better. This was no titanic struggle between nationally-ranked powers.

Not surprisingly, the two teams went into the fourth quarter 0-0, but Northwestern scored a TD two plays later. The extra point was missed. In the final minutes, the Buckeyes finally mounted a drive, gaining first down on the Northwestern 12 yard line with 13 seconds left on the clock.

An unhappy ending for Ohio State appeared certain when Pandel Savic's pass was intercepted in the end zone. However, hopes revived when an official threw a penalty flag. A Northwestern substitute had been late clearing the field. The Wildcats were set back to their own 7.

With the defense expecting a pass, Ohio State called a run. Rod Swinehart was stopped at the Northwestern

3, with one second remaining. But again there was a flag and again Northwestern was penalized, this time for offside.

Savic then pitched a TD pass to Jimmy Clark—after time had elapsed. Ohio State lined up for the game-winning extra point, which would be tried by Emil Moldea, a shot-putter from the track team who had joined the football squad as a senior specialist.

Moldea's kick was blocked, leaving the score at 6-6. Would you believe another penalty flag? Northwestern coach Bob Voigts couldn't. But the officials ruled a Wildcat lineman had jumped offside.

Moldea managed to get his second try through the uprights and Ohio State won the game 7-6. Unfortunately, the moment of glory didn't last. Ohio State went on to lose to Illinois and Michigan, and finished in 10th place in the Big Ten (Northwestern was 9th).

A football, according to cliché, takes some funny bounces and football games take some wacky turns, too. These three Ohio State games prove the point—and, in their own way, add delightful spice to the Ohio State football story. **O**

getting a lot of coaching pointers," he said, laughing.

A gifted athlete, Stark could have been an All-America wide receiver, coach Bobby Bowden said recently. He might have been a success in almost any sport, so easy does it come for him. Stark has played only one round of golf in his life; he shot a 94. In high school he was an outstanding basketball player.

Last season, after the Pitt game, when he averaged 48.1 on seven punts, United Press International named him its *defensive* player of the week in the Southeast.

That was unprecedented, unique, absolutely distinctive.

And his father, wherever he was flying that day, must have been exceptionally proud. They even spelled Rohn right. **O**

LAST WEEK--Florida State was idle. The Tribe last played on September 19, when it lost a 34-14 verdict at Nebraska. Trailing just 10-7 at intermission, the Seminoles allowed the hosts to jump ahead by a 27-7 count at the start of the fourth quarter. FSU was able to narrow the gap to 27-14, but Nebraska iced the game on a 94-yard run by Roger Craig early in the fourth quarter.

Ohio State remained unbeaten with an impressive 24-19 road victory at Stanford. It was the first road trip of the season for the Buckeyes, who led 24-6 before allowing Stanford to narrow the gap. The Buckeyes moved into the lead on the passing arm of All-American quarterback Art Schlichter, who threw two touchdown passes. Both of the scoring tosses went to tight end Brad Dwelle. Schlichter finished the day with 240 yards passing.

THE SERIES--This is the first time FSU and Ohio State have met on the football field. The teams are also slated to play next year (October 2) in Columbus.

THE CAPTAINS--Florida State's team elected five for the season. Offensively it's quarterback Rick Stockstill (No. 11) and fullback Michael Whiting (No. 27) while defensively the assignment falls to noseguard James Gilbert (No. 51) and corner James Harris (No. 33). Punter Rohn Stark (No. 3) is in charge of special teams.

Ohio State captains are quarterback Art Schlichter (No. 10) and inside line-backer Glenn Cobb (No. 35).

THE COACHES--FSU is piloted by Bobby Bowden (Samford '52), who's in his sixth season with the Seminoles. Bowden came to the Tribe in 1976 from West Virginia. In the five seasons plus three games, he has taken the Tribe to a 46-15 record that includes a 23-4 mark in the last 27 games. Bowden has taken the Seminoles to three bowl games--'77 Tangerine and '80 and '81 Orange--and helped the Tribe shoot to second in the final 1980 regular season wire service rankings after the Seminoles went 10-1 in the regular season. Bowden has twice been named National Coach of the Year. The first time came following the 1979 perfect regular season when ABC-TV and Chevrolet picked him as their top Division I-A mentor. Following the 1980 season, he won Bobby Dodd Coach of the Year honors. Twice during the previous five seasons he has been voted the Associated Press Southern Independent Coach of the Year. This is the third head coaching stop for the 51-year-old Birmingham, Ala., native. He had a 31-6 mark at Samford (1959-62) and went 42-26 while at West Virginia (1970-75). His overall record is now 119-47 (72.0 winning percentage). Prior to the start of the current campaign, Bowden ranked sixth among active coaches with a minimum 10 years as a Division I-A head coach for winning percentage. His victory total was ninth among active coaches in Division I-A.

Earle Bruce (Ohio State '53) is in his third season of coaching the Buckeyes after going 20-4 in the first two years. That mark included a remarkable 20-2 showing during the regular season. His first Buckeye team won the Big 10 Conference championship outright and last year Ohio State just missed. Bruce was named "1979 College Coach of the Year" by the Football Coaches' Association, by the Football Writers and by UPI. His first Ohio State team compiled an 11-0 regular season mark, even though unranked in pre-season polls. Only a 17-16 loss in the Rose Bowl to Southern California kept Ohio State from a probable national championship. This is the third head coaching stop for Bruce at the collegiate level. He was also at Tampa (1972) and Iowa State (1973-78) before returning to his alma mater. In nine years at the collegiate level, his teams have won 66 while losing 38.

NEW DIRECTION IN SCHEDULE--The Ohio State game is a "first" for Florida State. It marks the first time the Seminoles have ever played a team from the Big 10 Conference in football since FSU began playing the sport in 1947. The Tribe plays Ohio State again next season and future dates have been announced for games with Michigan and Michigan State.

TRIBE ON ROAD--The Tribe is 0-1 on the road this season after losing to Nebraska, 34-14. But, in the 1979 and '80 seasons, the Seminoles enjoyed success at foreign stadiums. The Seminoles won eight of nine road tests in those years, losing a one point 10-9 verdict to Miami in 1980. Taking the road statistics further, FSU has won 11 of its last 15 road games and 16 of the last 21.

BOBBY'S ROAD RECORD--Since Bobby Bowden came to FSU, the Tribe has won 18 of 27 road games and four of the nine losses took place in the first season (1976) when the Tribe played away from Tallahassee six times. That record doesn't include bowl game appearances in the 1977 Tangerine or 1980 and 1981 Orange Bowls.

WANT TO COMPARE?--It's unfair to compare the 1980 and 1981 edition of the Seminoles because 15 of the 22 Orange Bowl starters from last January 1, are missing. Still, two statistics are worth noting. Thus far in the first three games of the current campaign the Tribe has out-scored its foes, 41-39. Last year that margin was 131-7.

TAKING IT FURTHER--It's probably necessary to add this fact when discussing the offensive/defensive differences between this year's Tribe and the '80 group: twice in the first three games of '80, the Seminoles scored 52 or more points. This season the Seminoles haven't tallied 52 in three.

ABOUT NEBRASKA POINTS--Last year's FSU defense ranked first in the nation against the score (7.7 points per game) and second in total defense (208.1 yards ppg). The 34 points scored by Nebraska on September 19, was the most scored on FSU since 1978 when Mississippi State picked up 55 in a 55-27 Bulldog victory. The biggest number of points allowed by FSU in the '80 campaign was the 22 given Pittsburgh in a 34-22 Seminole victory and in 1979 Miami tallied 23 in a 40-23 Seminole regular season victory while Oklahoma picked up 24 in the Orange Bowl.

TWO STRAIGHT LOSSES?--If Florida State loses to Ohio State, it will be the second straight defeat for the Tribe. It will be the first time since the 1978 campaign the Tribe has lost back-to-back. The last teams to beat the Tribe on successive weekends were Mississippi State (55-27) and Pittsburgh (7-3).

ABOUT-BACK-TO-BACK LOSSES--Since Bobby Bowden arrived on the FSU scene in '76, the Seminoles have lost back-to-back games three times. Twice the losing streaks extended to three games and on each of those occasions it was in the first year (1976). The longest losing streak for Bowden at FSU is three games.

BRUCE & FLORIDA--Ohio State head coach Earle Bruce has limited Florida ties. The Buckeye mentor was the head coach at the University of Tampa in 1972 and took the Spartans to a 10-2 record. Tampa also appeared in the Tangerine Bowl that year, defeating Kent State, 21-18.

BRUCE & PETERSON--Seminole radio analyst Bill Peterson will probably visit with a former coaching aide when he hits Columbus Friday. Ohio State head coach Earle Bruce was an assistant for Peterson at Mansfield (Ohio) High School in the early 1950's.

BUCK ASSISTANTS TIED, TOO--Two of the Ohio State assistant coaches also carry Florida ties. Defensive coordinator Dennis Fryzel followed Earle Bruce as the head coach at Tampa for the 1973 and 1974 seasons, recording records of 8-3 and 6-5, respectively. When Tampa closed down its program, Fryzel served as an assistant with the Tampa Bay Bucs for one season. Wayne Stanley, who coaches the Ohio State runningbacks, is a native of Belle Glade, Florida.

OKTOBERFEST CONTINUES--The FSU Oktoberfest that began early (Sept. 19) at Nebraska continues with road games at Ohio State, Notre Dame, Pittsburgh and LSU before the Seminoles return home October 31, for a meeting with Western Carolina. Appropriately, that will be the FSU Homecoming game.

OCTOBER RECORD--Since 1976 when Bobby Bowden took over the FSU program, the Seminoles have compiled a 15-5 record during October. The five losses came in two seasons with three being administered in the first year. The other two came during the 1978 campaign. FSU has not lost a game in October since Pitt captured a 7-3 verdict on October 21, 1978. Since that time the Seminoles have reeled off eight consecutive October victories.

LAST TRIP TO OHIO--The last time FSU visited the state of Ohio was during the '79 season when the Seminoles met Cincinnati in the Queen City. The Tribe was in the midst of its first unbeaten season ever as a major college and the wheels almost came off before FSU, with a 19-point fourth quarter, pulled out a 26-21 win.

BOBBY VS. BIG 10--Although FSU has never before played a game against a Big Ten Conference foe, Bobby Bowden coached against schools from that league while at West Virginia. Bowden has a 3-1 mark against the league including 1-0 vs. Illinois and 2-1 vs. Indiana.

COLUMBUS NATIVE STARTS--When the Tribe lines up in Ohio Stadium Saturday, Alphonso Carreker, who starts at defensive tackle for the Seminoles, will be playing before family and friends. Carreker (6-6, 235) lettered last year as a freshman for FSU and has started the three previous games this year. He's a Columbus native and one of two Ohio athletes on the Seminole roster. The other is tailback Billy Allen, who hails from Cleveland.

COLUMBUS CONNECTION--Carreker is one of two players who have been FSU starters from Columbus. Offensive tackle Ken Lanier was a four-year starter for the Seminoles. Ken graduated last spring and is now on the roster of the NFL's Denver Broncos.

WHAT THE PLAYERS SAY...

TE SAM CHILDERS--"I think the offense played fairly well against Nebraska even though we lost. We're still making the mistakes that hurt us. If we can correct those mistakes I think we'll be okay.

"I can't wait to play Ohio State. I've been hearing about this game since I played at Tallahassee Leon and first thought about coming to FSU. This game sure means a lot. You hate to lose two games in a row. I'm not saying if we lose we're done for the year, but it would sure be a lot harder to come back.

"I think I'm catching the ball well, but my blocking hasn't been up to par. I know I'll have to do a better job on the line against Ohio State."

DB JAMES HARRIS--"We didn't tackle well at Nebraska. We weren't afraid of Nebraska, but a lot of guys never lined up against a team that hits for a full 60 minutes. After it was 10-0 we finally settled down and played a good hard-nosed ball game. We found our poise and worked together. That's the way we must play against Ohio State.

"You hate to lose two games in a row. We need to win this game for ourselves. Nebraska taught us what it takes to beat a major. They taught us a lesson. We're going to face some top football teams the next few weeks and we now know what it's going to take to win.

"Art Schlichter is a legitimate Heisman Trophy candidate. I thought he didn't have a running game to compliment his passing attack, but found out I was wrong after looking at film. He's the best quarterback I've faced in four years.

"As long as the defense plays as a team we can come out a winner."

DT ALPHONSO CARREKER--"Playing against Ohio State is a dream come true. When I was young I always dreamed of playing for or against Ohio State. One of the seasons I chose Florida State was because I knew we would play Ohio State.

"We need to win this game for the fans and show them we can pull together. We need to get that winning spirit of last year. Nebraska taught us a hard lesson.

"The pressure now is to win. We don't want to lose another game. We have to put our hearts and heads in the game."

TB RICKY WILLIAMS--"I'm now 100 percent healthy. It's not my legs that are hurting, it's my running. Our running game has got to improve and improve fast. It hasn't complimented the passing game at all. Once we get the run moving, we can use a wider variety of plays.

"The game this week will decide if we want to play football or fold. If we win this game it will give us the confidence to play even better.

"If we beat Ohio State, people will forget about Nebraska. If we lose, fans will think FSU is supposed to lose the 'big' game. I don't want anyone thinking that way.

"I feel like I need to contribute more and start making big plays. We need to show some pride. It seems like we're making the same mistakes we make in practice."

WHAT BOBBY SAYS...

ABOUT FLORIDA STATE--"In preparation for Ohio State we need to work hard and iron out some of the problems we've been having. We've made a lot of mental mistakes that FSU football teams of the last few years just haven't made.

"I've not been displeased with the effort of our players. That has been good. I have no concerns there, but I'm greatly concerned about the mental preparation. We've spent the off week working on fundamentals, going back to basics. I'm sure it helped.

"Where I'm concerned is that in playing time this is a very young football team. It needs experience and the only way that comes is under game conditions. A young team at times is going to give up the 'big' play. That happened at Nebraska and it got us beat."

ABOUT OHIO STATE--"I didn't realize until someone told me that this is the first time FSU has ever played a team from the Big Ten. That is certainly exciting for our fans. It signals a new direction for our football program. We've enjoyed playing games against Big Eight and Southeastern Conference schools the last few years and I'm sure we'll enjoy the relationship we'll have against Ohio State and future teams we play from the same league."

ABOUT ART SCHLICHTER--"What do you want me to say about him? Hasn't everyone already said what there is to say? He's the best around in this year's senior class. Our defense will have its work cut out."

ABOUT FSU OFFENSE--"We need to start scoring more points. There is going to be a change in philosophy, but I'm not going to say what. No use for me to allow Ohio State to prepare for it. Our running game has really been lacking and we've got to figure out some way to get our backs loose. The running game is going to receive plenty of attention before we go to Ohio State."

ABOUT ROHN STARK--"At Nebraska, he was out-punting his coverage and it did cause our punt team some problems. They broke the one for a touchdown and came close to getting another. We're probably going to ask him to sacrifice some distance and kick the ball higher. That way our fellows can cover better and prevent the long runbacks."

ABOUT OHIO STATE GAME--"It's important. We need to win so these young kids can realize and understand they can play with the major powers of college football. I would hate to lose in Columbus and then have to travel to Notre Dame the following week with two consecutive losses."

PLAYERS TO WATCH...

FLORIDA STATE

P ROHN STARK--(No. 3, 6-3, 195, Sr., Fifty Lakes, Mn.)--pro scouts consider him the best kicking prospect in the collegiate ranks since Ray Guy played at Southern Mississippi...thus far in 1981 he has kicked 20 times in three games for a 47.1 average with the longest being 63 yards at Nebraska...at Nebraska he established a new single game record for FSU with a 51.1 yard average on eight boots...has the distinction of earning All-American honors in two sports, football and track and field...he participates in the decathlon for Seminole track team and last year finished eighth in NCAA competition...made most of this year's pre-season All-American teams and recently was featured in SPORTS ILLUSTRATED.

WR DENNIS MCKINNON--(No. 6, 6-1, 175, Jr., Miami, Fla.)--tops the Tribe receiver corps with 12 catches for 131 yards and one TD...he needs just three more grabs to match his career total (15) at the start of the current season...TD catch came on a three-yard toss from Rick Stockstill at Nebraska...that was his first TD reception since the third game of the '80 season and just the fourth of Dennis' career...has also been used to return punts this season for Tribe.

DT ALPHONSO CARREKER--(No. 76, 6-6, 235, So., Columbus, Ohio)--will be starting in his hometown before parents and friends when Seminoles and Buckeyes collide...has started each of the Tribe's games this fall after spending last fall as a substitute, but earning enough playing time to letter...through three games he's the fourth leading tackler with 20 total hits, including nine solo...second on squad in quarterback sacks with two for seven yards...15 of his tackles came in Memphis State game...other big plays include one tackle for loss and an interception at Nebraska...comes from the same high school that produced former offensive tackle Ken Lanier for the Seminoles...Ken is now with Denver Broncos.

DE JARVIS COURSEY--(No. 64, 6-5, 220, Sr., Gray, Ga.)--apparently is fully recovered from a back injury that kept him out of spring practice...injury occurred before the '81 Orange Bowl but Jarvis' performance vs. Oklahoma still won him Defensive Most Valuable Player honors...currently ranks third on the FSU tackle chart with 22 hits, six solo and 16 assists...one of those hits is a tackle for loss...one of eight players who has the opportunity to letter four times in Seminole career.

OHIO STATE

QB ART SCHLICHTER--(No. 10, 6-3, 208, Sr., Bloomingburg, Ohio)--among the '81 seniors Art is considered the premier quarterback...against Stanford last Saturday he completed 16 of 32 passes for 240 yards and two touchdowns...that hiked his season totals to 40 completions in 75 attempts for 639 yards and four scores...just two of his passes have fallen into enemy hands...he has started every game for the Buckeyes since entering Ohio State as a freshman in '78...considered an outstanding candidate for Heisman Trophy honors this season, if he does win he would become the sixth Ohio State player to cop the honor.

LB MARCUS MAREK--(No. 36, 6-2, 216, Jr., Masury, Ohio)--the eighth leading all-time tackler at Ohio State...in the 24-19 victory at Stanford last Saturday the press box charts credited him with 16 tackles, including 13 solo...totals for the season include 29 solo hits and 17 assists...was a second team All-American choice on the 1980 Associated Press squad.

SEMINOLE TRAVEL PLANS--FSU team and official party depart Tallahassee Friday at 1 p.m. via Piedmont charter. Arrival in Columbus is set for 2:35 p.m. Seminoles will not work out at Ohio Stadium but will walk the field Friday. Headquarters in Columbus will be Arlington Arms, 1335 Dublin Road (614/486-0211). FSU will return to Tallahassee immediately following the game with tentative arrival in Tallahassee slated for 7:30 p.m.
