

FSU Golfers Get Invited To Nationals

Florida State's golf team will participate in the NCAA championships in Knoxville, Tenn., next week.

Coach Hugh Durham's Seminoles, undefeated in dual competition for the second straight year, are one of the five teams invited from District III.

Invitations to the five-day tournament were issued on a basis of overall record and tournament play. The Seminoles were 8-0 in dual competition and played in three tournaments during the season.

Five Florida State golfers will go to Knoxville. They are Denny Lyons, St. Petersburg; John Parsons, Sarasota; John Danielson, Watertown, Mass.; Bill Boutwell, Palm Beach; and Joe Endry, Pensacola.

Houston Golfer Leads Tourney

KNOXVILLE, Tenn. (AP) — A precedent for shooting an eagle 3 on the seventh hole may have been set for the young golf stars who hope today to overtake Marty Fleckman of Houston, the leader going into the second round of the National Collegiate Golf Tournament.

Until his 30-foot putt for an eagle on No. 7, Fleckman was shooting only average golf. But the big hole gave him a boost and from there on Fleckman was unbeatable in Wednesday's opening round.

His five-under-par 67 also put the University of Houston, seeking its eighth national team championship in a decade, into first place with a total score of 285. The team title will be decided today.

The field of 202 will be cut to low 60s and ties after today's 18-hole round. The final 36 holes will be played Friday.

Just behind Fleckman's 35-32-67 were Norwegian-born Arne Dokka of California State at 68, and Lauren Hammer of Florida, Jerry Preuss of Southern California and Bert Greene of Tennessee, all with 69s.

Florida State's Denny Lyons had a 71.

In team standing, Houston was trailed by Southern California with 287, Oklahoma State 289, California State at Los Angeles 290 and Purdue 291.

One of the outstanding shots on opening day was Fleckman's 35-yard chip which carried to the cup for an eagle hole-out on the par 5 18th. Another stroke which caught the fancy of the galleries was the 149-yard par 3 hole-in-one by Bob Borthwick of Indiana.

The defending champion, Terry Small of San Jose, Calif. State, was disappointed with his first round 72, even though it represented a splendid recovery with a two-under-par 34 after the turn.

FSU Golfers Sixth

KNOXVILLE, Tenn. (AP) — Neither rain nor its sloshy aftermath could keep Houston's Marty Fleckman from his self-appointed round with a nine-under par, four-stroke lead at the halfway mark in the National Collegiate Golf Tournament.

Fleckman, the 1964 Texas amateur champion from Port Arthur, shot a masterful four-under par 68 Thursday to give him a 135 going into today's final 36 holes.

Within striking distance were Jim Wiechers of Santa Clara with 70-69-139; Lauren Hammer of Florida, 69-71-140; Arne Dokka of California State at Los Angeles, 68-73-114, and Steve

Robbins of North Carolina, 73-69-142.

Fleckman's score led Houston to its eighth NCAA team championship in 10 years. Houston's four lowest scores in the first two rounds totaled 577, followed by California State at Los Angeles, 587; Southern California, 590, and Florida and Purdue, 594 each.

Florida State finished sixth in the select 35 team field with a score of 595.

Lyons was the Seminole leader with his 172-143, followed by John Parsons, 75-73-148; John Danielson, 77-72-149; Bill Boutwell, 76-79-155; and Joe Endry, 75-81-156.

Lyons, Parsons and Danielson are among the 65 golfers qualified for the championship round this afternoon.

Of the 202 golfers who teed off in the first round, only 65 qualified for the championship drive today.

KNOXVILLE, Tenn. (AP) — Marty Fleckman of Houston won the 68th annual National Collegiate Golf Tournament Friday with a seven-under-par 281 after surviving a shaky final 18 holes and a strong challenge by Jim Wiechers of Santa Clara with a 282.

Other top finishers were Arne Dokka of California State at Los Angeles and Sherman Finger of Southern California, tied at 286; Randy Petri of Houston and Alex Antonio of Ohio State, 287; and Tim Collins of Virginia Tech and Bob Dixon of Oklahoma State, 288.

The 72-hole tournament was played over the par 72 Holston Hills Country Club Course. The weather was sunny and warm, except for rain on Thursday.

"The course was tougher than I thought it was," said Fleckman, who moved in front with a first round five-under-par 67.

The University of Houston won the team championship, its eighth in 10 years under Coach Dave Williams. Next were California State at Los Angeles, Southern California and two teams tied for fourth—Florida and Purdue.

Fleckman's opening rounds of 67 and 68 established an NCAA medalist record of 135. The previous mark was 136, held by Don Albert of Purdue 154; Johnny Pott, LSU, 1955; and

Bob Pratt and Jack Cupit, both of Houston in 1959.

Fleckman ran into trouble on his last 18 holes when he began to tire.

"I guess I had better get into shape for the next one," he said.

The husky, dark-haired youth scrambled on No. 17 for a par five. He hit the rough twice, missed the green and then sank a three-foot putt. On No. 18, his

drive was down the middle, but he pulled his second shot into the left bunker and used a wedge to blast 75 yards onto the green.

Fleckman needed the 12-foot putt to win, and he sank it.

Florida State's Danny Lyons finished ten strokes off the pace in 11th with a 291. Other Seminoles included John Danielson at 299 and John Parsons at 300.
