Georgia Charge Captures Meet

STATESBORO, Ga.—The University of Georgia's golf team came from far behind and won the Chris Schenkel Intercollegiate Golf Tournament here Saturday.

The Bulldogs wound up with a low total of 867, six strokes better than the 873 posted by runner-up Florida. Host Georgia Southern College's No. 1 team finished in third place with an 882.

charge was due to the efforts of Billy Kratzert, Lyn Lott and Tom Valentine. Kratzert turned in the day's lowest total, a 105 for the 27-hole course, and Lott and Valentine finished in a three-way tie for second place with Columbus College's Sammy Rachels, all a stroke back at 106.

Rachels won the individual tournament title with a four-under-par 212 for the 54-hole tournament, 27 holes of which were played Friday. Rachels thus exactly matched his first-day total of 206, which left him in third place, one stroke off the 105 first-day totals of South Carolina's O. S. Hillman and Memphis State's Ken Walsh.

MIKE BRELSFORD of Rollins wound up in second place for the tournament at 213. Georgia's Kratzert was third at 214, and teammate Lott tied with Florida's Gary Koch for fourth at 215.

Georgia's Bulldogs were tied with Florida for fourth at the end of the first day with a team total of 440. But they promptly took charge Saturday and finished with six

strokes to spare.

Georgia Southern's No. 1 team had the worst day of any of the teams ranked high after Friday's first round over the par-72, 6,900-yard Forest Heights Country Club course. The Eagles were leading the field by a stroke after the first round, but slipped to third.

The team championship was based on the best four individual scores from each of the

six-member teams.

Rounding out the Georgia Southern team play on opening day were a 109 by Brooks Simmons and 112s by Buford Jones and Ricky Smith.
