





Tips for Following Meet

National Collegiate Gymnastics Championships are being held for the first time at Michigan State University this weekend.

The following notes are provided so that you may better enjoy and understand the various events.

The meet consists of the nine following events:

(1) Free Exercise; (2) Rope Climb; (3) Side Horse; (4) Horizontal Bar; (5) Trampoline; (6) Parallel Bars; (7) Flying Rings; (8) Tumbling; and (9) All-Around.

Four judges will score each contestant, awarding a number of points for his performance. Perfect performances rate 100 points, with 50 per cent of the total based on the combination of stunts and the difficulty of the routine, and the other 50 per cent on style, beauty, and form. The high and low marks of the individual judges are discarded, and the average of the two intermediate ratings is the contestant's score for the event. High total score wins.

The ten highest contestants and ties in each of Friday's preliminaries qualify for the finals. Only scores registered in Saturday's finals are used in

determining individual standings and team points, with the exception of the All-Around event. Friday's totals are used in this event.

The All-Around championship includes competition in the following six events: free exercise, side horse, horizontal bar, parallel bars, still rings, and long horse.

The rope climb is scored on a time basis, with the intermediate times again used for computing the recorded time of ascent.


In tumbling, each contestant is allowed four routines and a 1½-minute time limit to complete his routine. The time limit in the free exercise event is 1½ minutes.

Contestants in trampoline are permitted two exercises, with ten landings in each.

Team points are awarded the first ten place winners in each of the nine events as follows: first, 11 points; second, 9 points; third, 8 points; fourth, 7 points; fifth, 6 points; sixth, 5 points; seventh, 4 points; eighth, 3 points; ninth, 2 points; and tenth, 1 point.





Meet *Biggie Munn*, Spartan Athletic Director and Meet Host

After an outstanding career as Michigan State's head football coach, winning 54, losing only nine and tying two in seven seasons, Clarence L. (Biggie) Munn became the Spartan athletic director. He now is serving his fifth year in that capacity.



Under Munn, Michigan State's athletic program has experienced an era of expansion. The addition to Spartan stadium, which increased the seating capacity to 76,000 and made it the third largest in the Big Ten, the 18-hole golf course, and the women's and men's intramural buildings are Munn projects.

Biggie was a great athlete at the University of Minnesota. In 1931 he was a unanimous choice for All-American honors and was captain of the Gophers. He was named to several All-American teams in his junior year also.


More recent honors bestowed on Biggie are the

naming to the Christy Walsh 25-year All-American team and the Sports Illustrated Silver Anniversary All-American football squad.

Munn's achievements were not confined to the gridiron, however. He excelled in track in high school and also won letters in that sport in college. He once held the Western Conference and Penn Relay records for shot put.

Munn was selected the college football "Coach of the Year" in 1952 and was the Detroit Times Quarterback Club's choice for "Coach of the Year" three straight years—1950, '51 and '52. He coached the East All-Stars in the 1952 and 1953 Shrine Bowl games. Both years his teams won one-point upset victories over strong West Squads.

Biggie's boys went undefeated in 1951 and 1952 and won the national championship in the latter season. A Munn team was also co-champion in 1953 and winner of the Rose Bowl classic in 1954.



Meet *George Szypula*, Spartan Coach and Meet Director

George Szypula is Michigan State's first and only varsity gymnastics coach, coming to the Spartan athletic staff in 1947.



Szypula won many personal gymnastics honors. He took the National AAU tumbling crown for four years while at Temple University and he won the Middle Atlantic States Senior AAU tumbling title ten times. He won the Eastern Intercollegiate all-around and tumbling titles in 1942-43 and the NCAA tumbling championship, also in 1942. He has won the Senior AAU horizontal and parallel bar championships five times.

Szypula has directed the Spartans to a fine place in the gymnastics world. In his ten years at State his teams have won 37 dual meets, lost 32 and tied three.

The 1957 team won seven and lost one and placed third in both the Big Ten and NCAA championship meets. His 1958 team again placed third in the Big Ten.

He has produced many individual stars. Carlton Rintz and Mel Stout starred in both the NCAA and Big Ten championship meets during the early 1950's. Together they won 14 individual Big Ten Titles and six NCAA crowns. More recent standouts are Roland Brown, Don Leas and Stan Tarshis, all Big Ten title holders.

Coach Szypula currently is president of the National Association of American Gymnastics Coaches.

He is the author of a recent book on tumbling, entitled "Tumbling and Balancing for All."
