### FSU IN 2ND AT MEN'S ACC SWIM CHAMPIONSHIPS

CHAPEL HILL, NC -- Despite taking a total of eleven out of twenty first places, the 12th ranked Florida State men's swimming and diving team did not take the one first place they wanted, as they came in second overall to the University of North Carolina at the 1997 Men's ACC Swimming Championships. North Carolina, which won their fifth conference title in a row, scored 784.5, while Florida State finished with 660.50. The Seminoles could not overcome North Carolina's incredible depth, as Carolina only won four events but had every single swimmer score points. The Seminoles did make a statement for the NCAAs however, as they set three ACC records on the final night of swimming, and a total of eight of the whole meet, and ten ACC meet records.

Making sure the Seminoles didn't come home empty-handed, sophomore All-American Brendon Dedekind was named ACC Swimmer of the Meet, as he completed one of the most impressive three-day performances in the history of the meet. Dedekind, handed the award to a standing ovation, won the 100 free in a ACC meet record of 43.14, and he swam the lead-off leg on the ACC record setting 400 free relay. For the meet, Dedekind won three individual events, all in ACC meet record time, and swam on three ACC record setting first relays and one second place relay. In addition, his 50 and 100 free times are the fastest in the country this year, and his 100 breast time is second.

Also making highlights on the final night, senior Rob Braknis, swimming in his last ACC Championships, won the 200 back, an event he won in 1995, and which gave him seven individual ACC titles in his career. Sophomore Stephen Parry made up for a disappointing ACC's last year as he won his second event of the meet, the 200 fly in a ACC record time of 1:43.69. Joining Dedekind on the ACC record 400 free relay were Braknis, sophomore Matt McVittie, and senior Eduardo Coelho.

Rounding out the other finishers, North Carolina State was third (545), Virginia was fourth (469), Clemson was fifth (319), Maryland was sixth (220), Duke was seventh (124), and Georgia Tech was eighth (110)

### FSU IN 2ND AT MEN'S ACC SWIM CHAMPIONSHIPS

CHAPEL HILL, NC -- Despite taking first place in four events, the 12th ranked Florida State men's swimming and diving team still trails the University of North Carolina after the second day at the 1997 Men's ACC Swimming & Diving Championships. The host school North Carolina leads with 520.5 points, while Florida State is in second with 441. Trying to gain ground on Carolina, FSU was hurt by having three of its swimmers miss making the night session, while all but one of Carolina's swimmers qualified for the scoring finals at night.

The Seminoles were once again led by sophomore All-American and 1996 South African Olympian Brendon Dedekind. Dedekind, who in a surprise move swam the 100 breast instead of the 200 free, arose the crowd in the morning session by swimming a 53.58, which broke the ACC conference and meet record by well over a second, then set the record again at night when he took the 100 breast title in a time of 53.23, which was also a school record and a NCAA 'A' Automatic qualifying time. Fellow Seminole Olympian (Canada), senior Rob Braknis successfully defended his 100 backstroke title, which he has won every year he has swam at the ACC Championships. Braknis, who won in 1993, 1994, 1995, and now 1997, won in a time of 48.??.

Sophomore Stephen Parry, touched out last night in the 500 free, came back to win the 200 free in a school record and NCAA 'A' time of 1:36.18. And the Seminoles' fourth title came in the 200 medley relay, which also set an ACC meet, conference, and school record in a time of 1:28.77. Swimming on the relay were Braknis, freshman Brett Petersen, Parry, and senior Eduardo Coelho. So far this meet, the Seminoles have set five ACC meet records, and four ACC conference records.

Chip Haberstroh, two-time defending champion in the 400 IM, was upset by freshman Doak Finch as Haberstroh finished second in a time that was faster than the winning times from the last two years. Eduardo Coelho, runner-up in the 100 fly last year, finished 3rd. Other scores for the Seminoles; in the 400 IM, freshman Bill Schultz (10th) and senior Kevin Murphy (15th); in the 100 fly, sophomore Nei-Kuan Chia (14th); in the 200 free, sophomore Matt McVittie (7th) and junior Darren Milun (8th); in the 100 breast, Petersen was 7th and senior Frank Bradley finished 12th; in the 100 back, senior Dave Semesco was 10th and freshman Ross Clement was 16th; and the 800 free relay took 2nd, with Dedekind, Parry, Milun, and McVittie failing to stop UNC's streak of seven straight titles in the event.

Rounding out the rest of the teams, North Carolina State is in third (386.5), Virginia is fourth (339), Clemson is fifth (220), Maryland is sixth (186), Duke is seventh (111), and Georgia Tech is eighth (110).

### FSU IN 2ND AT MEN'S ACC SWIM CHAMPIONSHIPS

CHAPEL HILL, NC -- In a very close battle for the ACC swimming title, the Florida State men's swimming and diving team used a conference record setting night to fall in 2nd place after the first day of the 1997 Men's ACC Swimming & Diving Championships. The Seminoles set an ACC meet, conference, and school record as they won the 200 freestyle relay for the third year in a row in a time of 1:18.78, which is also a NCAA 'A' Automatic time, the 400 medley relay set an ACC meet, conference, and school record; and the Seminoles also set an ACC meet record in the 50 free. The host school University of North Carolina, helped by placing four swimmers in the finals of the 500 free, and three in the finals of the 200 IM, leads with 237.50, while Florida State is just 23.5 points behind (237.5). N.C. State is in third (194.5), Virginia in fourth (156), Clemson in fifth (99), Maryland in sixth (67), Duke in seventh (62), and Duke is eighth (59).

The Seminoles were led by sophomore Brendon Dedekind, who defended his ACC title as he set an ACC meet and school record in the 50 free with a time of 19.26. Dedekind helped bring the Seminoles back from a 75 point deficit as he broke the ACC meet record held by former N.C. State swimmer and U.S.A. Olympic Gold medalist David Fox, and was just .12 seconds away from Fox's ACC record, which is also the NCAA 50 free record. Dedekind was joined in the 50 free finals by senior Eduardo Coelho and Rob Braknis. Coelho was the conference runner up for the second year to Dedekind; while senior Rob Braknis, who was the 1995 ACC Champion in the 50 free, finished 5th. Dedekind and Braknis also swam on the 1st place 200 freestyle and 400 medley relays. Joining the two Seminoles on the 200 free relay was Coelho and sophomore Matt McVittie, who also placed 10th in the 50 free, while freshman Brett Peterson and sophomore Stephen Parry swam on the 400 medley relay.

In the 500 free, Parry came into the championships as the favorite but finished second, as Virginia freshman Austin Ramirez put on a burst of speed in the last five yards to steal first. Parry's swim, 4:23.28, was still fast enough for a school record. And on the 1-meter board, Seminole senior Corey Geraghty finished 3rd, improving from his fourth place finish from last year.

Also scoring for the Seminoles; in the 500 free, senior and team co-captain Chip Haberstroh was 9th and freshman Danny Chocron was 11th; in the 200 IM, senior and the other team co-captain Frank Bradley was 15th, and freshman Chad Onken was 16th; and freshman Ben Nuttal and Brent Burkman finished 6th and 7th in the 1-meter diving event, respectively.

FLORIDA STATE'S PARRY DEDEKIND NAMED ACC MEN'S CO-SWIMMERS OF THE YEAR

TALLAHASSEE, FL -- Florida State sophomore swimmers Stephen Parry and Brendon Dedekind were tabbed Atlantic Coast Conference Co-Swimmers of the Year today in balloting by the league's head coaches.

Parry, the Liverpool Great Britain, became the first Seminole swimmer to win a national championship when he finished first at the NCAA Championships in the 200 butterfly. Parry also set an ACC record in the in the 200 butterfly and holds four school records in individual events and three as a member of relay teams.

Dedekind, from Natal, South Africa, was named Most Valuable Swimmer of the ACC Championships after setting league standards in six different events. Dedekind became the first FSU swimmer to achieve All-America honors in three individual events when he took third in the 50 freestyle, fourth in the 100 freestyle and fifth in the 100 breaststroke at the NCAAs.

Five other Seminoles were named to the men's all-conference team: Rob Braknis, Eduardo Coelho, Chip Haberstroh, Matt McVittie and Brett Peterson. Three Lady Seminoles were named to the women's all-conference team: Anne Blachford and Sam White.

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## Dedekind, FSU second in ACC championships

Eric Fehr won the 200-yard individual medley Thursday as North Carolina took the lead as the Atlantic Coast Conference Men's Swimming and Diving Championships got underway.

The four-time defending champion Tar Heels collected 237.5 points in the first day of competition at UNC's Maurice J. Koury Natatorium.

Florida State was in second place with 214 points, followed by North Carolina State with 194.5 points, Virginia with 156, Clemson with 99, Maryland with 67, Duke with 62 and Georgia Tech with 59.

Despite the fact the Seminoles won three of the evening's six events, including both relays in ACC record time, the Tar Heels were able to persevere and take the lead on the basis of placing 10 swimmers and divers in championship finals on the first night of competition.

Florida State had only seven individuals in championship finals.

Fehr was the only individual winner for North Carolina, winning the 200-yard individual medley and his first-ever ACC individual title with a time of 1:48.61.

The rest of the night belonged to Florida State and particularly to sophomore Brendon Dedekind, a 1996 member of the South African Olympic Team. The Seminoles won the 200-yard freestyle relay in ACC record time (1:18.78) with a relay that featured Dedekind, Eduardo Coelho, Matt McVittie and Rob Braknis. The Seminoles' 400-yard medley relay team also set an ACC record with a clocking of 3:13.28. That relay consisted of Braknis, Brett Petersen, Steve Parry and Dedekind.

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# Dedekind sets record, FSU still in second

Florida State won four events on Friday, but remained in second place behind host North Carolina at the Atlantic Coast Conference Men's Swimming and Diving Championships. The Tar Heels had 520.5 points and FSU had 441.

All-American Brendon Dedekind set a meet record in the 100-meter breaststroke with a time of 53.23 to lead the four FSU wins. The time automatically qualifies Dedekind for NCAA Championships.

Rob Braknis successfully defended the 100 backstroke title, which he first won in 1993, for a third time to give FSU its second win of the day. The only other individual victory for FSU was scored by Stephen Parry in the 200 freestyle. His time of 1:36.18 set a school record.

The Seminoles took the 200 medley relays in 1:28.77, setting another school record.

## **FSU takes second**

CHAPEL HILL, N.C. — The Florida State men's team took second place Saturday night at the Atlantic Coast Conference Swimming and Diving Championship. North Carolina won the title for the fifth consecutive year.

FSU All-American Brendon Dekind was named ACC Swimmer of The Year for his performance,

which included setting an ACC record (43.14 seconds) in the 100 freestyle.

FSU's brightest spot in the pool on Saturday night was Stephen Parry's record-setting swim in the 200 butterfly. He completed the event in 1:43.69.

# UNC men lead ACC swimming

Four-time defending champion North Carolina was in familiar territory after the opening day of the ACC Men's Swimming and Diving Championships at Chapel Hill. In first place.

The Tar Heels put 10 swimmers and divers into the finals and hand 237.5 points. Florida State, considered the favorite, was se-cond with

Florida State won both relays on Thursday in ACC-record time — the 200-yard freestyle relay in 1 minute, 18.78 seconds and the 400 medley relay in 3:13.28.

Florida State sophomore Brendan Dedekind, a member of the 1996 South African Olympic Team who finished fifth in the 50-meter freestyle in the Atlanta Games, was on both relay winners and won the 50-yard freestyle in a meet-record 19.26 seconds.

Eric Fehr was the only individual winner for North Carolina, taking his first ACC title in the 200 individual medley with a time of 1:48.61.

N.C. State's Todd Smith won the 1-meter diving with 495.05 points.

North Carolina, led by Tucker Shade's 100-yard butterfly victory, added 56 points to its lead Friday and moved closer to its fifth straight ACC men's swimming and diving title at Chapel Hill.

UNC's 800-yard freestyle relay team won for the eighth straight time, finishing in 6:30.96.

Virginia freshman Doak Finch

was the surprise winner of the 400-yard individual medley, beating two-time defending champion Chip Haberstroh of Florida State with a time of 3:50.57.

After 13 of the 20 events, North Carolina leads with 520.5 points. Florida State is second with 441 points. N.C. State is in third with 386.5 points. The rest of the field includes Virginia at 339, Clemson at 220, Maryland at 186, Duke at 111 and Georgia Tech at 110.

Florida State sophomore Brendon Dedekind was named the meet's outstanding swimmer. He won three individual events and swam on three winning relay team — helping set four ACC records and six ACC meet records.

The Seminoles won 11 of 20 events.

N.C. State senior Todd Smith was named the most valuable diver after finishing second on the 3-meter board on Saturday. He had earlier won the 1-meter competition.

UNC's Frank Comfort was named ACC Coach of the Year at the meet. N.C. State's John Candler was voted Diving Coach of the Year.
