FLORIDA STATE SWIMMER AND DIVER COMPETE IN NCAA CHAMPIONSHIPS

(Brent Burkman and Brett Petersen will compete in Minneapolis)

TALLAHASSEE, FL – Two Florida State Seminoles will compete at the NCAA Men's swimming and diving championships in Minneapolis, Minn., this weekend. Senior Brent Burkman will compete in the diving events with fellow senior Brett Petersen competing in the Breaststroke events.

Burkman makes his first career appearance at the NCAA Championships after finishing 10th on the 1-meter, 13th on the 10-meter platform and 17th on the 3-meter at the NCAA Zone B Diving meet, hosted by Auburn University. A four year letter winner from Ruston, Va., Burkman won the 1-meter competition and finished 4th on the 3-meter at the 2000 ACC Championships. He has made the finals on both the 1-meter and 3-meter all four years as Seminoles, including taking 3rd on both boards at the 1998 and 1999 Championships. In 1997, Burkman finished 7th on both boards. He is a two-time All-ACC Honor Roll selection and has been named Florida State's men's diver of the year for two consecutive years. Burkman is the first diver to qualify for the meet since 1992 and will compete in the 1-meter and 3-meter as well as the 10-meter platform.

Petersen is a returning All-American from the 1999 championships. A native of Pietermaritzburg, South Africa, Petersen finished 2nd in the 200 Breast and 9th in the 100 Breast at the 2000 ACC Championships. He was also a member of the 2nd place 400 Medley Relay and 3rd place 200 Medley Relay at the conference meet. At the 1999 Championships, Petersen competed in the 100 and 200 Breast and the 400 Medley Relay. He took 2nd in the 200 Breast in the 1998 and 1999 conference championships and was on the 1997, 1998 and 100 ACC Champion 200 Medley Relay team. Petersen also competes internationally, including a 4th place finish in the 100m Breast at the Pan-Pacific Championships in Sydney, Australia last summer.

Burkman will compete in the 1-meter on Thursday, March 23 with the 3-meter on Friday, March 24 and the platform on Saturday, March 25. Petersen will compete in the 100 Breast on Friday and 200 Breast on Saturday. The preliminaries begin at Noon with the finals at 7:00pm each day.

FLORIDA STATE SWIMMING AND DIVING COMPLETES SECOND DAY AT NCAA CHAMPIONSHIPS

MINNEAPOLIS, MN -- Seniors Brent Burkman and Brett Petersen completed their second day of competition at the 2000 NCAA Men's Swimming and Diving Championships in Minneapolis, Minn. Burkman competed in the 3-meter diving with Petersen swimming the 100 Breast.

After finishing 25th in the 1-meter diving on Thursday, Burkman moved up five spots to clinch 20th in the 3-meter diving with a score of 487.70. Petersen, who finished 2nd in the 100 Breast at the ACC Championships, was disqualified in the preliminaries of the event and did not swim in the evening session.

The Seminoles will conclude competition tomorrow in Minneapolis. Burkman will dive in the 10m platform competition while Petersen swims in the 200 Breast.

Highlights

Teamwork gets Title for Texas: Though Texas failed to win an individual event on the last day of competition at the Division I Men's Swimming and Diving Championships, the 125-point lead it had accumulated from the previous day managed to keep Auburn and Arizona at bay. The Longhorns earned 539 total points to claim their seventh title March 25 in Minneapolis. Defending champion Auburn took second with 385 and Arizona third with 360½.

The win was Texas' first since 1996.

Texas dominated the relay events with wins in the 200- and 400-meter medleys and the 800-meter freestyle. Matt Ulrickson won the 100-meter backstroke. In addition to strong showings in the swim events, the Longhorns' efforts were aided by diver Troy Dumais who had wins in the one and three-meter diving events and a second-place finish in platform.

Arizona State's Atilla Czene set a world record in the 200-individual medley with a time of 1:54.65. For California, Anthony Ervin's time of 21:21 in the 50-meter freestyle was a world's best. Swimmer of the meet Ed Moses of Virginia set two world records with his wins in the 100- and 200-meter breaststroke. And Auburn's preliminary score of 1:24.83 in the 200-meter freestyle relay was also a world record.

It was the first NCAA men's swimming championships to be held in short-course meters.

MINNEAPOLIS — Brett Petersen of Florida State was disqualified in the 100-meter breaststroke preliminaries at the NCAA Championships. Petersen had the seventh-best halfway time at 28.43.
