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**FLORIDA STATE IN NCAA MEN'S TENNIS COMPETITION
MAY 24--28, 1988, ATHENS, GA.**

THE EVENT: Florida State number one tennis player, senior Paul Haarhuis will compete in the 104th NCAA Tennis Championships in the individual singles competition. With the draw announced Monday, May 23, Haarhuis will either begin competition on Tuesday, May 24 or the following day, Wednesday, May 25.

HOW HAARHUIS GOT TO ATHENS: On the heels of a banner tennis season in 1987-88, the senior from Eindhoven, The Netherlands, advances into post-season competition. Haarhuis breezed through the spring dual match undefeated and will attempt to keep his 24-match win streak intact in Athens. Competing in fall tournaments, Haarhuis racked up a 13-4 mark competing in the Lee Michaels-ROLEX Invitational, the ITCA Tournament and the Region III Indoor Tournament. In tournament play, he scored wins over such ranked opponents as Mats Malmberg of Trinity, John Carras of Southern Cal, Pat Crow of Cal State-Long Beach and Billy Uribe of LSU. He advanced to the semi-finals of the Lee Michaels-ROLEX and to the final round of the ITCA Tournament where he lost a three-set match to Scott Melville of USC. In the spring season, Haarhuis was untouchable. He took 23 of his 24 wins in two sets and took his second consecutive Metro Conference Tournament MVP winning the number one singles flight. During the 1987-88 campaign, Haarhuis put together an 11-4 record against opponents ranked in the Volvo Tennis Collegiate Rankings and finished the regular season ranked 18th in the prestigious poll.

HAARHUIS IN NCAA COMPETITION: His appearance in the NCAA Tournament this year will mark his second appearance in as many years. Following the 1986-87 season, Haarhuis and his doubles partner Henner Lenhardt were selected to defend their 23-3 mark in Athens. The duo took a preliminary match from Alex Palladino and Jim Burda of Kalamazoo and were eliminated from competition the following round by Pat Crow and Kevin Gillette of Cal State-Long Beach. Haarhuis is the first Florida State tennis player to compete in NCAA singles competition since Joey Rive made an appearance in 1984. Rive is currently on the pro tour and ranked 62 in the United States Tennis Association world ranking.

HAARHUIS' COLLEGIATE CAREER: Prior to his successes at Florida State, Haarhuis began his collegiate career at Armstrong State in Savannah, Georgia. After building a two-year singles record of 64-2, he decided to transfer from the Division II school to seek better competition. He got what he was looking for in competition at FSU. In some of his first Division I action, Haarhuis scored perhaps his springboard into the big time with a win at the 1986 ITCA Invitational in Panama City, FL when he defeated Robby Weiss of Pepperdine 5-7, 6-4, 7-6 to capture the championship. He then began the 1987 spring dual match season with an 18-match win streak. He finished the 1986-87 season with a 35-5 record and was selected as an alternate in NCAA Individual Singles Competition. His two-year record in fall and spring competition stands at 72-9.

one doubles win to take the conference title outright and the odds were with the Seminoles with their No. 1 and No. 3 teams in key positions. The team of Haarhuis and Alex Rucker, however, dropped a hardfought 4-6, 6-3, 3-6 decision to South Carolina's Longley and Harry Sy at the No. 1 doubles spot, while Memphis State gained momentum with a No. 3 doubles win as freshman Ulf Einert and junior Lars Nilsson defeated FSU's team of Todd Collins and Scott Shields, 6-2, 6-3 to boost the

Tigers' point total to tie the Seminoles for championship honors.

The Metro title was the sixth for the Memphis State men who dominated the conference tennis scene every year from 1976-1980. Winning its first league title since South Carolina took a three-year reign beginning in 1988, Florida State earned its third Metro title with this year's victory.

They're Outstanding

Most Outstanding Performer, Men

Florida State's Paul Haarhuis led the Metro men for the second straight season, as he defeated South Carolina's Steve Longley 6-1, 6-3 in the finals of the No. 1 singles bracket. Haarhuis, who lost just three games enroute to the final, also earned the Metro men's Most Outstanding Performer award for the second consecutive year.

After taking early control of the match, Haarhuis, ranked 27th in the Volvo/ITCA poll, used a strong net game and clever shot placement to overcome 44th-ranked Longley. Longley, down 3-2 in the second set, showed frustration as his racket continued slipping from his hand, and found little success in handling his Florida State opponent, until holding serve at 5-2. At 5-3, however, Haarhuis served up four straight points to capture the set and top singles honors.

Also leading the Florida State effort in team standings was senior Carey Sochin who defeated Virginia Tech's Paul Calhoun 6-4, 6-1 in the finals of the No. 2 singles bracket.

Co-champion Memphis State was led by senior Simon Edmunds who overcame South Carolina junior Johan Karlen 6-3, 2-6, 6-3 in the No. 4 singles bracket while Tiger Nick Buoni defeated Tech's John Woolbridge in a 6-3, 6-3 contest at the No. 6 singles spot.

Though the strength in the singles field surely worked to the champions' favor, it was the doubles that told the story at the end of the men's tournament. Going into the finals of the three brackets, Florida State needed at least

Haarhuis is among NCAA's best

FSU's tennis ace aims
to serve up pro career

TALLAHASSEE — Richard McKee should be happy that Paul Haarhuis has friends. Otherwise, Haarhuis, a native of The Netherlands, may have never joined McKee's Florida State tennis team.

Haarhuis was playing at Armstrong State in Savannah, Ga., and was looking to transfer. McKee was recruiting Scott Karmibad, who told the Seminoles' coach of Haarhuis' performance at the NCAA II school.

Before he knew it, Haarhuis was bringing his 64-2 singles record to FSU. He has been winning since. As FSU's top-seeded player the past two years, Haarhuis is 68-9, including a 20-0 record this spring.

"I was excited about coming to FSU," Haarhuis said. "I started off right, and I was really excited. For the first time in my life, I had a chance to get a ranking."

In the latest poll released by the International Tennis Coaches' Association, Haarhuis is ranked 20th among college players.

"FSU has had some good players," McKee said. "In this day and

age with the quality of competition, Paul is one of the best out there."

Despite his skills in tennis, Haarhuis, 22, still calls soccer his favorite sport. In his hometown of Eindhoven in Holland — and, in fact, in that part of the world — soccer is the rage. Tennis only recently has become popular. He also played soccer at Armstrong State.

Haarhuis had an advantage. His parents are avid tennis players. When he was 10, his mother suggested he start playing.

Haarhuis, 6 feet 3 and 170 pounds, puts in two or three hours a day on the courts. He said it shows in his game, one that con-

sists of booming baseline shots. Many people who haven't seen him play in a couple of years complimented him about his game when he competed as an amateur in a pro satellite tournament in his home country last summer.

"Everyone was asking me why I was playing so well," he said. He fared well enough to gain a ranking of No. 380 in the world by the Association of Tennis Professionals despite only playing four weeks.

"I needed the experience playing the pros," Haarhuis said. "It's a lot different than playing college."

nomics decree this month. Then comes the whirlwind of finding a sponsor when he enters the pro circuit.

FSU's Haarhuis is perfect, but NCAA may want more

There are times Paul Haarhuis seems like a sleek Formula One car racing around a backwoods Southern dirt track. Very nice, but out of place.

Haarhuis is the only link the Florida State men's tennis team has to national rankings at the moment. He also is the team's sole hope for exposure and recognition if he makes the 64-player men's singles field of the NCAA Tournament to be played May 18-28 in Athens, Ga.

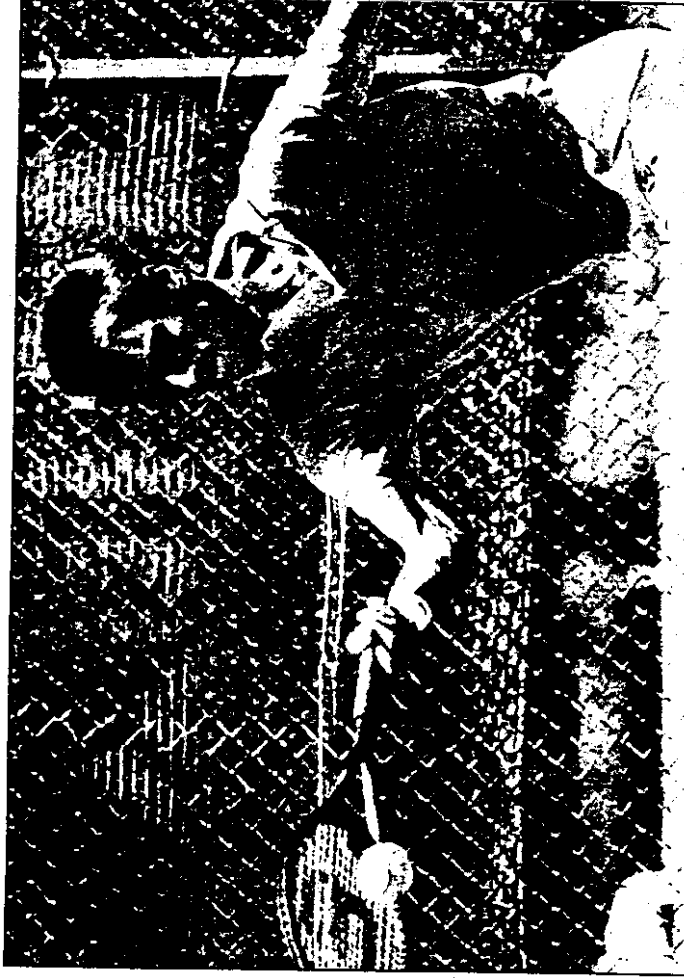
After barely missing a chance to play in the tournament last year, it has become something of a mission for the senior from Eindhoven, Netherlands. He hopes it can serve as his springboard to finding a sponsor to help finance his pro career that will begin within three months.

"I guess it's pretty important," says Haarhuis, who transferred to FSU from Armstrong State in Savannah, Ga., last year and has barely stopped winning since. "I've been doing my job at FSU, but I haven't been able to show what I can do nationally."

What has held him back at times has been the limitations of his team. Between the raindrops of a wet spring, the rebuilding Seminoles are struggling through a 3-9 season. Weather permitting, they play Georgia Southern today at 1 p.m., and McNeese State on Saturday at 1 p.m. The schedule is not strong and provides Haarhuis few opportunities for big wins over ranked players.

But he also has misfired on some of the opportunities he's received. He was 13-4 last fall, but let big fish like Louisiana State's Jeff Brown, Southern California's Scott Melville and Georgia's Al Parker off the hook in three-set matches. A victory in any of those matches may have made him a lock for an NCAA bid.

This spring he's been a perfect 12-0, beating an array of opponents' top guns, ranging from names like Arkansas' Mike Brown and Rice's Don Freeman to global types such as Alabama's Constantine Efar-

even won a set from Haarhuis this spring. Against Alabama, Southeast Louisiana and Clemson, he was the only Seminole player to win a match. The only question is whether it is all good enough to get him into the NCAA tournament, especially from the Southeast region that is loaded with quality players.

In fact, only North Carolina's Dan Johnson has

"It's not a matter of him being good enough," says FSU coach Richard McKee. "It's a matter of the selection process."

Haarhuis is currently ranked No. 26 in the country. If he maintains that ranking, he should get his bid. But as it is in basketball and other sports where there can be no specific criteria for getting a bid, the process can be controversial.

"The main criteria to look at is impact wins, who the player has beaten in the top 15 or 20," said Dennis Emery, tennis coach of the University of Kentucky and a member of the NCAA's tennis hierarchy. "Paul did not have the impact wins he needed last year. He was maybe one win short. He's a really good player, and seems like a really nice kid."

But will he have the impact wins he needs?

"He's in a group with a lot of other people," says Emery. "But he's got a good chance of going."

Haarhuis will have no more chances for impact wins unless he makes the NCAA tournament. The Seminoles play a relatively soft schedule (in national-power terms) through the Metro Tournament that will be played in Tallahassee on April 22-24.

Part of Haarhuis' problem, according to McKee, was his anonymity. Armstrong State doesn't provide the brightest lights for a tennis star, especially one who bloomed late — his sport was soccer when he was growing up in Holland. That was largely the case with Joey Rive, who had a fine college career at FSU but didn't become a full-blown terror until he turned pro. Rive has piled up enough big wins on the men's pro circuit to earn a current ranking of No. 88 in the world.

Haarhuis, who played well on pro circuits in Europe last summer, has similar ambitions: "I've set pretty high goals for myself. I'd like to be in the Top 100 for sure."

"Getting to play in the tournament can be opportunity to prove yourself. Then an agent or somebody says 'Let's put some money into him.' Sponsors can put anything (endorsements) on my shirt. Sometimes you just need those opportunities."

Two years ago, Florida State sophomore tennis player Scott Karnibad referred a relatively unknown tennis talent from Holland to FSU head coach Richard McKee. Seems that this certain Dutchman was going great guns at Armstrong State in Savannah, GA, Karnibad's hometown. Using the right recruiting pitch, McKee was able to lure Paul Haarhuis to Florida State. Since that time, Karnibad experienced academic problems and has returned to his hometown and now plays for Armstrong State.

If trades were possible in collegiate athletics, Richard McKee would have to be credited with one of the biggest steals in history.

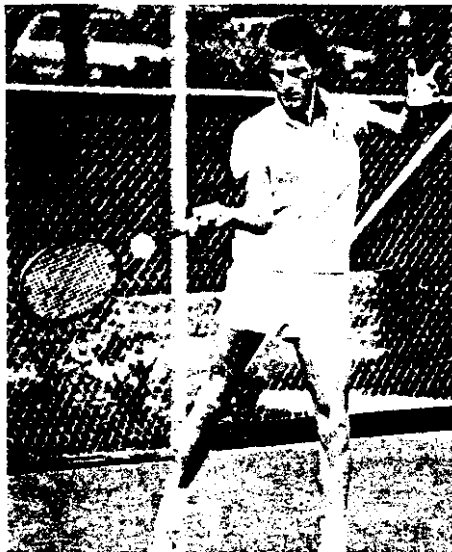
Since Haarhuis' arrival in Tallahassee, he has continued to perfect a game which was nearly perfect to begin with. While at Armstrong State, an NCAA division II school, Haarhuis compiled a two-year 64-2 dual match singles record. "In my sophomore year at Armstrong State, I was 35-0 and no one knew about it," says Haarhuis. "I came to Florida State to play against better competition as well as get a better education."

Coming off the most disappointing tennis season in nine years, McKee leaped at the chance to give the ambitious youngster a chance to excel. Athletic talents aside, Eindhoven, Holland native has also managed to turn a struggling team, which finished with a 10-13 record the year prior to his arrival, into a squad with hope and promise with his mere personality. "I wish I had five more players like Paul," says McKee. "His personality is very pleasant to have around. He's not big-headed or cocky. He does his talking with his play. He picks everyone up and gets them excited."

Last season, as a junior, Haarhuis won 35 singles matches against five losses while teaming with departed senior Henner Lenhardt for 25-5 doubles mark. The doubles duo was rewarded with an invitation to the 103rd NCAA Tennis Championships but Haarhuis' excellent singles play was overlooked. As a team, the Seminoles followed the winning ways of their new teammate and finished the season with a 13-10 spring dual match record. In 1987, five seniors return from that team and McKee looks to complete the turnaround.

Haarhuis first made a national name for himself about this time last year at the ITCA (International Tennis Coaches Association) first annual Men's Collegiate Classic at the Bay Point Resort Panama City. Seeded 12th going into the tournament, he emerged as a sleeper to defeat three of the top seeds to take the championship. Against Marcel Van Der Merwe of Auburn, Edwin Wu of Florida and Robbie Weiss of Pepperdine in the final, Haarhuis fought off first set losses and rebounded to win all three matches.

His six successive wins at Bay Point started a string of 24 consecutive singles wins which continued into the spring. Haarhuis was on the losing end of only two spring matches.



In three years of collegiate tennis, Haarhuis has been on the losing end of only seven singles matches. His career record is 99-7 going into his senior season.

One, a rematch with Shawn Taylor of Florida after Haarhuis won the first go-round the other against Alex Palladino of Kalamazoo. Both of those losses came to eventual NCAA competitors and both were in three sets.

Haarhuis concluded the 1986-87 regular season by winning the MVP of the Metro Conference Tournament in Hattiesburg, MS after taking the number one singles crown and teaming with Lenhardt to win the number one doubles title.

Returning to Europe for the summer, Haarhuis hit the satellite circuit in Holland. To his surprise, a rigorous schedule of seven tournaments in seven weekends produced success as well as hope for the future. "I was playing to get experience and pick up a few ATP (Association of Tennis Professionals) points," he says. "But I did really well and people kept saying to me, 'You're crazy to go back to school. You could go professional.' But I'm only 21 and I'm really set on getting a degree."

On the circuit, the tall, slim Dutchman with the spiked haircut picked up wins at every stop. He did run across one nemesis, fellow countryman Menno Oosting. Oosting, a five-year professional, defeated Haarhuis four times before meeting in the Masters Tournament of the circuit. That tournament paired the top 16 of the summer circuit who had accumulated the most ATP points. Competing in the finals, Haarhuis defeated Oosting but fell short in points accumulated over the course of the summer and finished second. His 26 accumulated points currently ranks him among the top 350 tennis players in the world. "I had some great wins in Europe," says Haarhuis. "All the guys I played were up and coming talents from Holland. But so am I. But it was different because I had not been there and they already had a reputation."

With his summer successes fresh on his heels, Haarhuis returned to Tallahassee to prepare for the coming year. After securing his fall schedule, he was quickly called back to Holland upon learning that his mother had been severely injured in a car accident. He returned to Tallahassee but not before losing two weeks of practice time.

In his first competition of the 1987-88 season at the Lee Michaels-ROLEX Tennis Classic in Lafayette, LA October 15-19, Haarhuis entered the tournament seeded number one. After three impressive wins, he fell short in the semi-finals to LSU's Jeff Brown. Haarhuis does not fault his missed practice time for the loss, though. "He (Brown) was the most physical player I've ever faced," Haarhuis says. "He was 6-7 and was very strong. Some of his serves were too much for me."

He continues this year's tough schedule, one which Coach McKee says he prepared keeping Haarhuis in mind, by returning to Bay Point October 22-25 as the defending champion. He enters the tourney seeded sixth and believes that he does have an advantage at Bay Point. "At Bay Point, we will play on clay courts," Haarhuis says. "That's what I'm used to playing on in Europe. There's nothing wrong with playing on hard courts, but on clay, it gives you just a little more time to react to the ball."

Barring any unforeseen injuries, Haarhuis should continue his winning ways during the fall and into the 1988 spring season. A winning senior season should add to the confidence he picked up over the summer and strengthen his views of playing professional tennis. "The success of the summer really changes my views of playing professional," he says. "But right now I want to get my degree and have a good season and eventually end up in the top 16 in the nation."

Along the way, Haarhuis might want to take some advice from McKee, who after three All-American seasons at North Carolina headed out on to the professional circuit, doing it the hard way. "I hope Paul can go a different route than I did," says McKee. "I didn't have a sponsor and my family didn't have a lot of money. I worked in a resort and saved money for a few months and then would play the circuit for six weeks until I ran out of money. Going about it that way, playing off and on, I could never keep consistency. Hopefully, during the course of this year, Paul can catch someone's eye and they will be willing to sponsor him so he can keep his mind on tennis and not where his next meal is coming from."

McKee hopes the best for his sensational number-one player because he genuinely cares for him and it shows. "It's great to have a player like him," McKee says. "He manages himself properly and behaves like you would want a son to behave. If I had a lot of money, I would love to sponsor him myself."

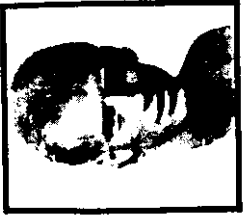
