FSU MEN'S TENNIS PLAYER MAT CLOER ADVANCES TO SEMIFINALS OF USTA'S FUTURES EVENT Seminole moves up in world rankings at Ursula Beck Men's Pro Tennis Classic

DECATUR, III. – In order to improve on last year's showing at the NCAA Men's Tennis Championships, Florida State University's **Mat Cloer** (Brevard, N.C. / Farrugut) knew that he would have to raise his level of competition this summer. The junior appears to be on the right track as he reached the semifinals of the Ursula Beck Men's Pro Tennis Classic on the United States Tennis Association's Futures Tour.

The 2003 Atlantic Coast Conference Player of the Year, Cloer had to make it through four qualifying rounds before even taking a swing in the tournament. With his success at the week long event Cloer has started to climb up the world rankings. Going into the event, Cloer was rated 988 with five ATP points. Advancing the semifinals gave him six more Tour points and will move him up at least 150 spots.

"It was a great run for Mat," FSU head coach **Dwayne Hultquist** said. "To win seven matches in a row and defeat the No. 1 seed shows that not only can he win big matches, but string several of them together. He has the ambition to play after college and I think that this shows that has the ability to do that."

Just getting to the main draw was an accomplishment as Cloer beat out 128 qualifiers who competed for just eight spots. During the first round he needed three sets to beat Japan's Toshihide Matsui 3-6, 7-6 (5) and 6-2. From there went up against top-seeded Raven Klaasen of Russia and dispensed of the number one player in straight sets, 6-4, 6-2.

In his quarterfinal match, Cloer was pushed the fullest extent in both sets before coming away with the straight-sets victory. A 7-5, 7-6 (5) triumph over Go Soeda of Japan put him one match away from the finals. However, that first title is still out there as fellow qualifier Matthew Hanlin of Great Brittan ended Cloer's run with a 7-6 (5), 6-2 defeat in the semifinals.

"I think that Mat is one of the better players in all of collegiate tennis," Hultquist added. "What we'd like to see him do this fall is make a run at one of the grand slams at either the All-American or the Indoors."

Ranked 38th at the end of the year by the Intercollegiate Tennis Association, he was the first Seminole men's tennis player in school history to earn the ACC's top honor. Cloer ended his sophomore campaign at the NCAA Championships in May when he was defeated 4-6, 2-6 in the first round by Alejandro Tejerina of Tulsa.

His 29-12 singles record, including a 7-1 league mark, ranks fourth in school history. Of his 29 victories, 12 came against ranked players, but what might be more impressive that he only dropped one match to a non-ranked player. Going into his junior campaign Cloer needs six singles victories to crack FSU's all-time top ten and 11 doubles wins to own the school mark.

NCAA PARTICIPANTS, ALL-ACC PLAYERS HIGHLIGHT RETURNERS FOR FSU MEN'S TENNIS ALUMNI MATCH

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. – Fifty years of Florida State University men's tennis will be represented when more than 30 players come back to Tallahassee for the Seminoles' Alumni Match on Friday (September 12). Included in the many alumni coming back for the 6 p.m. exhibition at the Scott Speicher Tennis Center are several players who competed at the NCAA Tournament and received a host of honors.

"It's exciting to have so many former players come back and it shows our current players how much the alumni care about the program," FSU net boss **Dwayne Hultquist** said. "This event proves that the former players have strong feelings towards the university and the tennis program. We have two players flying back from Europe just to see their old teammates. That's the perfect example of the kind of pride we want to instill into this program."

One of two FSU players to earn All-America honors from the Intercollegiate Tennis Association, **Brian Stanton** is one of the top alums returning for the event. The only player in school history to play both singles and doubles at the CAA Tournament in the same year (1995), he was a three-year All-Atlantic Coast Conference selection from 1993-95. During his freshman year, Stanton teamed up with Ford Lankford to win the No. 3 ACC doubles title before starting his run with Ken McKenzie that culminated in a top ten ranking in 1995.

Also returning for the match will be Stanton's teammate for three years and another NCAA participant **Jason**White. A two-time No. 2 ACC doubles champion (1994-95), he added a number four singles title in 1995 before earning a spot in the national tourney his final year. During the school's last year in the Metro Conference, **Stephen Noteboom** left his mark on the league as he won the No. 1 singles title and was named league MVP.

A true test of the history and the support that the program has gotten over the years, over a quarter of Friday's participants played for the Seminoles during the program's first 20 years. Among the program's pioneers who will be back are **James Crowther** who played for **Keith Pitchford** in 1954 and **Dr. Ray Bellamy**, one of five men's tennis players to be inducted in to the FSU Athletics Hall of Fame. Newer faces include **Xavier Luscan** and **Rodrigo Laub** who finished their careers in the last two years after winning the 2002 ACC Indoor doubles title.

Besides former players, a number of past coaches will be back for the alumni match. Returning to the school that he led to a pair of Metro Conference titles is **Richard McKey**, who ranks second in school history after racking up 129 victories from 1984-90. Also coming back is one of McKey's former assistants **John Vinson**, who also served as an aide to **David Barron** from 1995-99.

The current FSU squad takes the court for the first time in the fall on Thursday, September 18, when it opens up the Seminole Fall Classic at 5 p.m. Florida State finished the 2003 campaign ranked 32nd in the country after tying for second ACC and advanced to the second round of the NCAA Tournament. Junior **Mat Cloer** (Brevard, N.C. / Farrugut), the 2003 ACC Player of the Year begins the year ranked 22nd in the country by the ITA.

FLORIDA STATE MEN'S TENNIS GETS BACK INTO ACTION THIS WEEKEND WITH SEMINOLE FALL CLASSIC

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. – Even though fall is only a week away, there is still plenty of tennis to be played. After advancing to the second round of the NCAA Tournament last year, the Florida State University men's tennis team is hungry for more. The first step in returning to the national summit begins on Thursday (September 18) as FSU hosts the Seminole Fall Classic at the Scott Speicher Tennis Center.

Ranked 32nd to end the 2003 season by the Intercollegiate Tennis Association, Florida State starts head coach **Dwayne Hultquist's** fifth season against a good mix of competition. Providing an early test will be Middle Tennessee State, who was ranked 69th at the end of last year, as well as an up-and-coming Nebraska program. Rounding out the four-team event is fellow Tallahassee resident, Florida A&M.

"The biggest thing for us this weekend is that we want to play a lot of matches," Hultquist said. "We want to get to the point where we can evaluate all the players and find out what they need to improve on during the fall. It also gives our young guys an opportunity to get a feel for what dual matches are like"

The action begins with a pair of teams playing at 5 p.m. on Thursday, while Friday's 5 p.m. matches and the 9 a.m. start on Saturday will see all four schools in competition. The Seminole Fall Classic concludes on Sunday at 9 a.m. ith two squads facing off.

"The three teams coming in are all going to provide us with some good competition," Hultquist added. "Middle Tennessee has been in and out of the top 25 and has been in the NCAA Tournament recently. Nebraska is an up coming program in the Big 12 and that's a strong conference. Florida A&M has improved and has a nice team."

Last season the Seminoles ended a four-year drought when they advanced to the NCAA Tournament. Florida State started with a 4-2 victory over #30 Miami, before falling 4-0 to No. 2 Florida. Within Atlantic Coast Conference action, the Seminoles boasted a 6-2 record as their second place finish was their best in seven seasons. Against ranked opponents FSU held its own, going 8-5 versus the nation's best.

Leading the charge for the Tribe this year will be junior **Mat Cloer** (Brevard, N.C.), the 2003 ACC Player of the Year. He starts the 2003-04 season rated 22nd in the preseason ITA rankings after finishing his sophomore year with a 29-12 record and No. 32 spot in the final rankings. Over the summer Cloer improved his skills by competing on the USTA Futures tour. His best showing came at the Ursula Bech Men's Pro Tennis Classic where he reached the semifinals.

In the doubles competition the Seminoles will be anchored by the sophomore duo of **Jeff Groslimond** (Atlanta, Ga. / Riverwood) and **Chris Westerhof** (Durban, South Africa / Crawford College). Even though they only played together for a semester, the duo produced an 18-6 record, including a 7-1 mark against ACC competition. Highlighting the offseason for Groslimond was a doubles victory and second-place singles finish at the ITA's Summer Circuit stop in North Carolina.

Thursday's season opener marks the start of the last campaign for a pair of seniors who want to make a big contribution to the team after missing last year. **Joe Bassett** (Monticello, Fla. / Aucilla Christian Academy) and **Jarrod Owen** (Vero Beach, Fla.) both had to sit out 2002-03 with injuries and the wait for Bassett dates back to the fall of his sophomore year. Junior **Chip Webb** (Chattanooga, Tenn. / Naples) will look to build on his 18-16 mark from a year ago.

Fighting for a spot in the line-up this year will be a trio of freshman. Brazilian imports **Jonathas Sucupira** (Sao Palo, Brazil / Colegio Megga) and **Joao Paulo Bounassar** (Maringa Parana, Brazil / Colegio Marista) were at the top of e junior national rankings while capturing the Brazilian junior national championship one year after the other. Adding to the Seminoles' depth will be newcomer **Jason Hood** (Columbia, S.C.).

SEVEN VICTORIES FOR FLORIDA STATE HIGHLIGHTS DAY ONE OF SEMINOLE FALL CLASSIC

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. – Usually the first match of the year doesn't have much significance, especially when you're trying to shake the cobwebs loose from the off-season. That wasn't the case for the Florida State University men's tennis team as a neighborhood rivalry is how it got it 2003-04 season underway. The hosts took seven matches off Florida A&M University on Thursday (September 18) during the opening day of the Seminole Fall Classic.

"At times we played well today and there were other times where we could have closed some matches out," FSU head coach **Dwayne Hultquist** said. "We got out of it what we needed to and that was being able to play against competition other than ourselves. Some of Florida A&M's guys' played really well. They are much improved team."

After running out to a quick lead in his match, **Chip Webb** (Chattanooga, Tenn. / Naples) lost the second set and had to come back in a third-set tiebreaker to win his bout with Frank Green. Webb was up 8-6 in the super tiebreaker, but found then himself down 9-8 and facing match point. The junior battled back to win the tiebreaker 11-9 and take the match 6-2, 6-7, 1-0 (11-9)

For the first five games of the first set, **Jeff Groslimond's** (Atlanta, Ga. / Riverwood) was only up one game on Zurah Zhvania. From there the sophomore only surrendered two more games the entire match as he went on to win 6-3, 6-1.

Playing in his first collegiate tennis tournament, rookie **Jonathas Sucupira** (Sao Palo, Brazil / Colegio Megga) had the quickest match of the day as he disposed of FAMU's Jarrell Williams 6-0, 6-2. Fellow freshman countryman **Joao Paulo Bounassar** (Maringa Parana, Brazil / Colegio Marista) also picked up a 6-1, 6-0 victory over Errol Tshabe in his Florida State debut.

"It was good to see our two freshmen get a pair of convincing victories," Hultquist added. "Until they line up against a different opponent you don't know how they are going to do. Overall we played well as a team, but we have some areas we have to improve.

Unfortunately for the hosts they dropped two of the three matches that went the distance. Senior **Jarrod Owen** (Vero Beach, Fla.) battled back from a first set loss, but he couldn't hold on as Yves Sinson won 7-3 in the tiebreaker for the 6-4, 1-6, 7-6 victory. After seeing both ends of a 7-5 decision, sophomore **Chris Westerhof** (Durban, South Africa / Crawford College), fell 10-8 in the super tiebreaker as he lost 5-7, 7-5, 0-1 to the Rattlers' Pfungwa Mafefu.

Florida State started the season off to a strong by taking the first three doubles matches. Webb and Sucupira made quick work of Tshabe and Williams, 8-2. The duo of Westerhof and Groslimond took an 8-5 decision over Mahefu and Green. After falling behind 4-1, Owen and senior **Joe Bassett** (Moticello, Fla. / Aucilla Christen Academy) came back to win 8-5 over Sinson and Zyania. For Bassett it was his first match in two years after a knee injury his sophomore season kept him out of the line-up.

The tournament continues on Friday (September 19) with four teams in action. Joining the Seminoles and the Rattlers will be Middle Tennessee State and Nebraska. First serve is set for 5 p.m.

The Seminole will take two weeks off before getting back into action at the Icy Hot/ITA All-American Championships. Prequalifying rounds begin October 3 in Chapel Hill, N.C.

On Sunday they play Diego Iglesis and Moises Serrano of East Tennessee State.

Countrymen **Jonathas Sucucpira** (Sao Palo, Brazil / Colegio Megga) and **Joao Paolo Bounassar** (Maringa Parana, Brazil / Colegio Marista) advanced without having to complete their first match. Tennessee-Chattanooga's Derek Haybittel became ill during the tilt and could not continue, giving the Seminoles the walkover victory. I think they're hungry for more and two more wins gets them in the main draw."

The morning began with the sophomore duo beating Diego Iglesis and Moises Serrano of East Tennessee State 8-3, their largest margin of victory in the tournament. Next up was their closest match of the event, as they needed a tiebreaker to beat Denver's Nejc Smole and Viktor Zetterholm.

FSU DOUBLES CONTINUES RUN, CLOER STARTS SINGLES AT ITA ALL-AMERICAN CHAMPIONSHIPS

CHATTANOOGA, Tenn. – While a pair of Florida State University men's tennis players continue their way towards the main draw of the ITA/Icy Hot All-American Championships, another Seminole is set to begin his run. The doubles tandem of **Jeff Groslimond** and **Chris Westerhof** play their first match of the qualifier bracket on Tuesday (October 7) at 11:30 a.m. and two days later **Mat Cloer** takes on his first opponent in the main draw.

The Seminoles' first-round opponent will be fellow pre-qualifiers Miha Lisac and Jaime Rodriguez from Georgia State. A victory would set up a potential meeting with sixth-seeded and No. 42 in the country, Scott Green and Ross Wilson from Ohio State.

On Sunday, the sophomore duo won a pair of matches to secure one of the eight spots in Tuesday's qualifier. Groslimond (Atlanta, Ga. / Riverwood) and Westerhof (Durban, South Africa / Crawford College) battled back from being down 6-4 to beat Denver's Nejc Smole and Viktor Zetterholm 9-8 in a tiebreaker.

So far this season Groslimond and Westerhof are unbeaten in doubles. They started the year with a trio of wins at the Seminole Fall Classic before picking four more last weekend. At 7-0, the tandem is almost halfway to its 17-16 total from 2002-03.

"Jeff and Chris have good chemistry and know what the other is going to do," FSU head coach **Dwayne Hultquist** said. "They had a real good record as freshmen, playing at number three, but now they want to prove it on a national level. We felt that they should have already been in the qualifier or the main draw, but they had to win four matches to prove it."

With the fall season in full swing, most of the Seminoles have had a chance to get a couple of matches under their belt, but for Cloer (Brevard, N.C.) Thursday will be his first collegiate match of the year. By virtue of his No. 22 ranking to start the year, the junior did not have to play in any of qualifying rounds. Cloer will not know his opponent until Wednesday once players from the qualifier have filled the eight remaining spots.

Last season Cloer became the first player in school history to be named ACC Player of the Year. He posted a 29-12 record, the fourth highest single-season total in school history, while earning a spot in the NCAA singles championship. During the summer he advanced to the semifinals of the Ursula Beck Men's Pro Tennis Classic on the USTA's FUTURES tour.

"I think that Mat is one of the better players in all of collegiate tennis, Hultquist added. "We'd like to see him make a run at the title this week."

Following action at the ITA All-American, the Seminoles will wrap up the fall season in Chapel Hill, N.C. at the Omni Hotels/ITA Mideast Championships, October 23-27.

DAY ONE OF ITA ALL-AMERICAN SEES FSU MEN'S TENNIS GET SINGLES AND DOUBLES VICTORIES

CHATTANOOGA, Tenn. – Even though it is only the first day of the main draw at ITA / Icy Hot All-American Championships, the Florida State University men's tennis team has already had an impact on the tournament. In singles, **Mat Cloer** pulled off the biggest upset of the event, while doubles team of **Jeff Gröslimond** and **Chris Westerhof** rolled to their seventh-straight victory of the tournament.

Thursday's action began with Cloer beating Bo Hodge, the number two player in the country, 6-3, 6-2 in the first round of the singles draw. Unfortunately, his trip was cut short as he dropped a 6-1, 4-6, 6-3 decision to Arkansas' Adrians Zguns. The day concluded with the doubles tandem posting an 8-5 victory over brothers Brandon Gill and Kevin Gill of Butler.

Cloer (Brevard, N.C.) picked up an early break in the first set of his match with Hodge then grabbed another to take the opener. During second set, the junior used his strong return once again to break Hodge three times on his way to a 6-2 triumph and the match.

The momentum Cloer gained from his opening round victory—the highest ranked player to fall to a Seminole in school history—was not there for his second match of the day. After dropping a 6-1 decision in the first set, the 2003 ACC Player of the Year battled back to win the second set 6-4. His run at the tournament ended with a 6-3 loss in the third and deciding set.

A good return was key for Grolimond (Atlanta, Ga. / Riverwood) and Westerhof (Durban, South Africa / Crawford Collee) as they picked up their tenth win a row and seventh in the tournament dating back to the prequalifier. The sophomore tandem is the only pre-qualifier, in both the singles and doubles draw, left in the tournament. The duo had to win four pre-qualifying matches and two more in the qualifier to earn a spot in the main draw.

After splitting the first two sets, the Seminoles broke the Butler brothers, than Westerhof held at love to put FSU up 3-1. Florida State broke again to go up 5-1, but started a run that saw each team break the other twice. In the final game, an appeal to the line judge gave Groslimond another shot to serve at 15-love instead of giving Butler the point. FSU won the point on the second serve and closed out the match for the 8-5 victory.

Waiting for them in Friday's 1:30 p.m. match is the third-ranked team in the nation, Zoltan Csanadi and Izak van der Merwe of Old Dominion. There is some familiarity between the opponents as Westerhof and van der Merwe were doubles partners in South Africa.

CHAPEL HILL, N.C. – During the first two days of the Omni Hotels / ITA Mideast Regional, the Florida State University men's tennis team has learned to take the good with the bad. The Seminoles have been winning their first matches of the day, but dropping the afternoon contests. That held true FSU had its doubles teams record victories before being eliminated on Thursday (October 22) at the Cone-Kenfield Tennis Center on the North Carolina campus.

Needing a victory to get into the main doubles draw, the tandem of **Mat Cloer** (Brevard, N.C.) and **Jonathas Sucupira** (Sao Paulo, Brazil / Colegio Megga) dispatched North Carolina's Jonathan Janda and Brad Pomery. Once in the main bracket, the Seminole duo sent home the number ten seed, Clayton Almeida and Michael Kwiecien of Winthrop, 9-8, winning the tiebreaker 8-6. Unfortunately the doubles run ended with an 8-6 loss to Wake Forest's Brett Ross and Derrick Spice, the number 50 team in the country and the seventh seed.

Automatic qualifiers to the main draw with their number nine seeding, the sophomore tandem of **Jeff Groslimond** (Atlanta, Ga / Riverwood) and **Chris Westehof** (Durban, South Africa / Crawford College) didn't have to pick up a racket to advance to the second round. Their opponent, Oscar Posada and Alejandro Salazar of East Tennessee State, defaulted as no-shows. Not playing a match may have affected the pair as they dropped an 8-4 decision to eight-seeded, and No. 28 in the country, Marko Rajevac and Scott Schnugg of Georgia Tech.

The Seminoles' day started with Westerhof and **Joao Paolo Bounassar** (Maringa Parana, Brazil / Colegio Marista) winning their first singles matches. Westerhof took down the Tar Heels' Ben Aiken, 7-6, 6-4, while Bounassar sent home Tech's Trevor McLeod, 6-3, 6-4. Both fell one win short of main draw as Westerhof lost 7-6, 6-4, to Winthrop's Kwiecien and Steve Ward of William & Mary beat Bounassar 6-1, 6-1.

By virtue of automatic bids, FSU has a pair of players in Friday's singles draw. Cloer begins his run as the top seed when he takes on Jerome Kirkland of North Carolina A&T at 8 a.m. **Chip Webb** (Chattanooga, Tenn. / Naples) plays his first match of the tournament at 10:30 a.m. against ETSU's Fernando Fiuri.

Florida State's pair of singles entries ties it with three other league schools—Georgia Tech, Clemson and Virginia—for the most in the draw. William and Mary leads all schools with three players.

As a squad, the Seminoles came out plus one game against Atlantic Coast Conference competition. Two of the three victories were in singles play, while both losses came in the doubles bracket against nationally-ranked teams. The next potential match up with a conference foe would come for Webb. If he wins his first round match he would face either Schnugg from Tech or Virginia's Marko Miklo

CHAPEL HILL, N.C. In his first collegiate tournament of the season, Florida State University men's tennis player **Mat Cloer** got off to a great start, beating the number two player in the country, only to lose to a lower-ranked player that afternoon. At the Omni Hotels / ITA Region II Tournament, Cloer is extending his stay with a pair of victories on Thursday (October 24).

Anther difference from this event to the last is that **Cloer** (Brevard, N.C) is now the hunted and not the hunter. Sporting the number seed in the draw, he started his run with a 6-0, 6-1 decision against Jerome Kirkland from North Carolina A&T in a match that took just 40 minutes.

Cloer moved on to Saturday's action by beating East Tennessee State's Oscar Posada 6-3, 6-3. For the second time in two days a Florida State player sent Posada home. During Thursday's double action he lost to **Jeff Groslimond** and **Chris Westerhof**.

In a singles role, Groslimond (Atlanta, Ga. / Riverwood) picked up a win in his first match when he beat Radford's Brandon Johnson 6-3, 6-3. Unfortunately his trip to Tobacco Road ended with a 6-4, 6-1, decision to the number three seed and No. 43 player in the country, Nicholas Monroe of the host North Carolina.

Florida State's third entry in the singles draw, **Chip Webb** (Chattanooga, Tenn. / Naples) shared the same fate as his teammate Groslimond. The junior started the day with a 6-2, 3-6, 6-2, triumph over Fernando Fiuri of East Tennessee State. In his second match, Webb met the number 65 player in the country, fifth-seeded Scott Schnugg of Georgia Tech, and was defeated 6-1, 6-2.

Action for Cloer continues on Saturday at the Cone-Kenfield Tennis Center on the UNC campus. He faces the No. 16 seed in the draw, freshman Andrew Hamar from Wake Forest at 9 a.m. Cloer is 2-1 in his FSU career against Wake Forest. A victory in the morning match would set up a 12:30 p.m. bout versus Jeff Kader of William and Mary or South Carolina's Carl Wermee.

The tournament has been dominated by the Atlantic Coast Conference as 11 of the 16 players remaining hale from the league. There has been few upsets so far as 11 of the 16 seeded players have advance to Saturday's action.

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. – Over the last two years, the Florida State University men's tennis team has made a name for itself regionally and nationally. That attention has sparked interest from some of the best high school players in the country. One in particular that wants to wear the Garnet and Gold is **Sam Chang** as he is slated to join the Seminoles in the fall of 2004.

Originally from Taipei, Taiwan, Chang (Delray Beach, Fla.) has been major contributor to the varsity team at Delray's American Heritage High School. Last season, Chang captured the Florida High School Athletic Association 1A championships during his junior year, beating Mario Jutronic of Bradenton Academy 6-2, 6-2 in a match played at FSU's Scott Speicher Tennis Center.

"Sam has been very successful internationally and he has aspirations of playing professionally after college," FSU net boss **Pwayne Hultquist** said. "He's very quick and technically very sound. The Panthers also took home the team title in 2003 after finishing as the runner up at the 2A level in 2002. In doubles action, Chang advanced to the quarterfinals of last year's tournament with his partner Chris Liao.

After compiling a perfect 16-0 singles record, the accolades began to roll in for Chang. Among the best was Player of the Year as chosen by the **South Florida Sun-Sentinel**. He and Liao also earned First-Team All-Area doubles honors from the publication. Chang received his initial award from the **Sun-Sentinel** following his sophomore campaign when he was selected to the All-County squad.

Even though he still has one season left in his prep career, Chang has plenty of experience on the international scene. This April he advanced the quarterfinals of the Shuzo Challenge Japan Open. During the summer of 2002, he won the International Berimbau Junior Cup in Mexico. Chang helped his international ranking this summer when he advanced the round of 16 at the USTA's International Grass Court Championships after falling in the final round of qualifier for the US Open Junior Championships.

"Sam brings a lot of talent to our program and has a chance to step in right away and contribute to our line-up, Hultquist added. "He could play at the top or middle of our line-up. He's going to compete right away for one of the six spots and that is going to make everyone on the team that much better."

Following a successful fall campaign, Chang's future Florida State teammates are finished competing until after the New Year. The Seminoles start the spring season on January 16 at the ACC Indoor Championships.

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. - One of the main concerns of Florida State University men's tennis coach Dwayne Hultquist was how the time off would affect his 32nd-ranked team. While the Seminoles had to shake the rust off a little bit, once they did they came out firing as FSU cruised to a 6-1 victory over Stetson University in the dual match opener for both teams on Monday (January 19).

"We have to have a higher level of concentration and keep our intensity up,' Hultquist said. "It's easy to do it during one set in practice, but now we have to do during the entire length of the match. The intensity was there during doubles, but it wasn't during the early part of singles."

A prime example of Hultquist's concerns was shown at No. 1 singles by Mat Cloer (Brevard, N.C.) The No. 29 player in the country found himself down 4-2 in the first set, but he fought back to take the match 7-5, 6-1 over Vittorio Fratta at No. 1 singles. Playing like he was in midseason form, freshman Jonathas Sucupira (Sao Paulo, Brazil) made quick work of Christian Moe at No. 2 in his 6-0, 6-2 victory.

After dropping the first set of his No. 5 match 6-2, Chris Westerhof (Durban, South Africa) completely reversed gears. The sophomore proceeded to win the next nine games, taking the second set 6-0 while building a 3-0 advantage in the third. At No. 2, Cloer and Sucupira did them one better as they beat Cayo and Moe 8-1. That same score at No. 3 produced a victory for Webb and Joe Bassett (Monticello, Fla.) over Soiland and Brian Coyle.

The Seminoles get back onto the court Thursday (January 22) when it plays host to San Diego. First serve with the No. 42 Toreros is scheduled for 4 p.m. at the Scott Speicher Tennis Center.

At No. 2 singles, Sucupira fell 6-2, 6-4 to Jason Pongsrikul, who is ranked 75th in the nation. USD's tied the match when Jeff Das beat Owen at No. 6, 6-1, 6-2. After winning the first set, Groslimond lost the next two as he lost 0-6, 6-1, 6-4 to Nic Beuquer.

The match came down to two matches at No. 5 and No. 4. Westerhof took the first match of his No. 5 bout, 6-4, but dropped the second set by the same margin. The final set went to a tiebreaker where Mir Koristovic prevailed 7-2 to win the third set 7-6. Webb did not finish his No. 4 match.

FSU MEN'S TENNIS DROPS SECOND TOUGH MATCH OF THE WEEK, LOSING 4-3 AT FLORIDA

GAINESVILLE, Fla. – When it comes time for the Atlantic Coast Conference Championships, the Florida State University men's tennis team will be stronger after the tough tests it has faced during the early part of the year. The Seminoles just wish that this learning experience didn't come at the hand of Florida. The third-ranked Gators prevailed 4-3 on Sunday (January 25). The 32nd-ranked Seminoles fall to 1-2 on the year, with both losses coming to ranked opponents.

"Our guys played great, it was a terrific match," FSU head coach **Dwayne Hultquist** said. "If we would have had a break or two go our way, it would have been a different match. We've lost some tight singles matches this week and we could be 3-0 as easily as we are 1-2."

Just as been the case in the early going, the doubles point was strong for the Seminoles. Fifteenth-ranked **Jeff Groslimond** (Atlanta, Ga.) and **Chris Westerhof** (Durban, South Africa) stayed perfect during dual meet play as they prevailed 8-5. The same couldn't be said for the No. 2 tandem of **Mat Cloer** (Brevard, N.C.) and **Jonathas Sucupira** (Sao Paulo, Brazil) as they fell 8-5.

The doubles point came down to the third. After building a 7-5 lead, FSU's Chip Webb (Chattanooga, Tenn.) and Jarrod Owen (Vero Beach, Fla.) let the Gator tandem back in as they tied it at 7-7. But FSU won the next two games to take the doubles point 9-7.

"We're pretty good in doubles," Hultquist noted. "Chris and Jeff are one of the better teams in the country, Mat and Jonathas are awfully good as well and Jarrod has quite a bit of experience. It's definitely our strength."

Florida quickly gained the lead in singles as Webb dropped a 6-1, 6-1, decision at No. 3 singles to 52nd-ranked Vladimir Obradovic and the No. 6 match saw Chris Brandi beat Owen 6-2, 6-2. Twenty-fourth-ranked Hamid Mirzadeh battled back to beat Cloer 7-6 (4) in the first set, before taking the deciding set 6-2.

The biggest win of the day for the Seminoles came in the number two spot where Sucupira pulled off a big upset to get FSU within a point. The freshman beat No. 9 Janne Holmia 6-4, 6-3 for the second upset of a top-15 player by a Seminole this week.

"That was a great win for Jonathas," Hultquist added. "Being a freshman, we know he's going to be a little up and down, but we know he's capable of winning matches like this because he plays so big. He competed hard and really went after him. I'm proud of how we played."

Florida State tied the match at three points apiece when Groslimond battled in the third set to beat Stefan Tell 6-3, 4-6, 6-4. For the second time this week, the match came down to the No. 5 singles spot. After dropping the first set 6-1, Westerhof rallied for a 7-5 decision. The third set, which included Westerhof saving triple match point, went to a tiebreak where Ryan Sherry prevailed 7-5 to take the deciding set 7-6 and give UF the match.

The Seminoles are off from competition until January 31 when they return home to play host to Princeton in a 1 p.m. bout at the Scott Speicher Tennis Center.

FSU MEN'S TENNIS GETS BACK ON WINNING TRACK WITH 5-2 VICTORY OVER PRINCETON

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. —Having dropped two tough matches to ranked opponents, the Florida State University men's tennis team was looking to get back into the win column. With one of the toughest schedules in the country, the Seminoles knew that it wouldn't be an easy task, but they evened their record at 2-2 by beating Princeton 5-2 on Saturday (January 31).

"Princeton is very even all the way through its line-up and has a lot of good players, but our guys seemed to step it up a notch when they needed it," FSU head coach **Dwayne Hultquist** said. "Both teams competed hard and there were some well played matches."

FSU's strongest suit this year has been doubles and that provided the Seminoles with their first point of the day. After breaking at three all and then again at 5-3, the 15th-ranked Florida State duo of **Jeff Groslimond** (Atlanta, Ga.) and **Chris Westerhof** (Durban, South Africa) produced an 8-5 victory against Darius Crayton and Daniel Friedman. Princeton took No. 3 doubles as Hans Plukas and Andrew Lieu beat **Jarrod Owen** (Vero Beach, Fla.) and **Joe Bassett** (Monticello, Fla.) 8-3.

The closet doubles match came at number two between the Seminoles' **Mat Cloer** (Brevard, N.C.) and **Jonathas Sucupira** (Sao Paulo, Brazil) and Stratha Saengsuwarn and Tim Kofol from Princeton. The two teams exchanged a pair of breaks before Princeton held twice and FSU once. At 6-6, the Seminole held Cloer's serve, then broke to win the match 8-6.

Florida State quickly took a 2-0 advantage when Cloer, ranked 29th in the country, breezed past Crayton 6-0, 6-3 at No. 1 doubles. Following a tough 7-5 victory in the first set, two breaks within the first four games gave Sucupira the advantage he needed to take the second set and his No. 2 match 6-3 over Friedman.

Providing the decisive point was Groslimond at the third singles spot. He picked up a 6-2, 6-3 triumph against Lieu. The Seminoles got their final singles victory from **Chip Webb** (Chattanooga, Tenn.) as he produced a 6-4, 5-7, 6-1 over David Gopstein at No. 4.

"I thought Jonathas did a great job in doubles," Hultquist noted. "He brought a lot of energy to match and I thought that was key. Jeff had a lot of intensity in his single match and I thought that was going to be an important match for us. He jumped on the guy right away and didn't let up."

The Tigers to victories came at No. 5 and 6 singles. Plukas rallied to beat Westerhof 6-4, 2-6, 6-4 at No. 5. The final match had Shannon Morales beating **Joao Paolo Bounassar** (Maringa Parana, Brazil) 7-5, 6-3.

Florida State is off until next Saturday (February 8) when it plays host to Central Florida at 1 p.m. at the Scott Speicher Tennis Center.

SEMINOLES CONTINUE HOME STAND WITH NON-CONFERENCE OPPONENTS

With its record back to an even 2-2, the Florida State University men's tennis team continues a three-match home stand with a pair of contests this weekend against ranked opponents. Up first, the Seminole will take on instate rival, and No. 75 Central Florida at 1 p.m. on Saturday (February 1). The following day at 1 p.m. FSU serves it up against the 61st-ranked Red Raiders from Texas Tech. Four of the Seminoles' first six matches have come against ranked opponents.

FSU LOOKS TO STAY PERFECT AGAINST THE GOLDEN KNIGHTS

Besides getting its second-straight win, Florida State will look to keep its record unblemished against Central Florida. The Seminoles have won all eight meetings with the Golden Knights in a series that dates back to 1983. The two teams haven't met since the 2002 campaign when Florida State produce a 5-2 victory at home. UCF's roster is highlighted by Ener Gursoy, the 100th-ranked player in the nation.

SEMINOLES AND RED RAIDERS MEET FOR JUST THE SECOND TIME

The last time Florida State and Texas Tech faced each other on the tennis court, not a single member of the current team was born yet, nor was assistant coach Ty Braswell. The Red Raiders won the only meeting between the two schools, 5-2, during the 1970 campaign. Overall, Florida State is 7-18 against the Big Twelve Conference. FSU has not played a Big 12 school since 2001 when it lost to Texas 5-2. The Seminoles have not beaten a Big 12 team since 1995—a streak of sevenstraight losses—when it toppled Texas A&M 5-2.

FSU GETS BACK INTO THE WIN COLUMN WITH 5-2 DEFEAT OF PRINCETON

After two tough defeats, the Seminoles picked up their second victory of the year when they defeated Princeton 5-2 on January 31. Florida State got an early lead by taking the doubles points—FSU has not lost the doubles point in four dual matches this year—before taking four of the six singles matches.

CLOER & SUCUPIRA SECURE DOUBLES POINT, LEAD SINGLES CHARGE

Against Princeton the doubles point came down to No. 2 where FSU's Mat Cloer (Brevard, N.C.) and Jonathas Sucupira (Sao Paulo, Brazil) held at 6-6, then broke to win the point. Cloer breezed through his match at No. 1 singles, winning 6-0, 6-3. Following a tough opening set, Sucupira picked a 7-5, 6-3 victory. Cloer tops the squad with nine singles wins, while Sucupira is just one behind.

GROSLIMOND CONTRIBUTES TWICE TO PRINCETON VICTORY

Beside Mat Cloer and Jonathas Sucupira, the only Seminole to win both singles and doubles was sophomore Jeff Groslimond (Atlanta, Ga.). He teamed up with Chris Westerhof (Durban, South Africa) to win FSU's first doubles match, then came back to post a 6-3, 6-3 win in No. 3 singles to wrap up the team victory.

WEBB WINS EIGHTH MATCH AGAINST TIGERS

Never out of a point, Chip Webb (Chattanooga, Tenn.) plays the longest games of anyone on the team. With that in mind, he got some rest by not playing doubles against Princeton. That extra rest may have made the difference as he needed three sets to beat David Gopstein 6-4, 5-7, 6-1.

FLORIDA STATE MEN'S TENNIS WINS THE TIGHT MATCHES TO BEAT UCF 5-2

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. – Sparked by a strong home court advantage, the 36th-ranked Florida State University men's tennis team prevailed 5-2 over #75 Centra! Florida on Saturday (February 7). All four of the final matches went to a third set with the Seminoles taking three of them for the victory.

The win improves Florida State to 3-2 on the year and moves fifth-year head coach **Dwayne Hultquist** past FSU Hall of Famer **Don Loucks** into fifth-place all-time with 54 victories. The Seminoles also stay a perfect 9-0 against the Golden Knights.

Florida State got the momentum early when it took the doubles point. Using four breaks, **Mat Cloer** (Brevard, N.C.) and **Jonathas Sucupira** (Sao Paulo, Brazil) cruised to an 8-0 victory at No. 2 over Paul Ramy and Rhett Rosen. Fifteenth-ranked **Jeff Groslimond** (Atlanta, Ga.) and **Chris Westerhof** (Durban, South Africa) won the last five games to take their No. 1 match 8-2 over Joel Allen and Simon Jaeger. UCF's only doubles victory came at No. 3 where Catalin Brado and Ener Gursoy battied back from 6-1 to win 8-6 over **Jarrod Owen** (Vero Beach, Fla.) and **Chip Webb** (Chattanooga, Tenn.).

After winning the first set 6-1, Cloer did not have to complete the second to pick up his tenth victory of the year as Gursoy retired because of an injury. With the win, Cloer became just the ninth player in school history to win 70 career singles matches.

"It was very evident in the first few games that Mat was going to win," Hultquist said. "I think Mat is starting to play well. He's starting to get himself in good shape. He's controlling points and is always going to be a tough guy to beat."

UCF got its first point of the afternoon in the number six singles match. Rosen posted a 6-3, 6-2 victory over Owen to get the Golden Knights on the board. The Knights' second point came at No. 2 where Bradu rallied after dropping the first set to come back and beat Sucupira 2-6, 6-2, 6-3 to even the match at two apiece.

Florida State regained the lead when Westerhof took his No. 5 singles match over Ramy. The sophomore took control in the third set to win 6-4, 3-6, 6-1. Closing out the match was Groslimond at No. 3. After Groslimond pulled ahead 5-1 in the third set, Allen rallied to tie the match at 5-5. The Seminole sophomore came back with a break then held his serve to win the match 4-6, 6-4, 7-5 and give FS®J the victory.

"To me, Jeff really stepped up. He lost the first set, came back, showed some emotion and really got us going again," Hultquist said. "Jeff got an early lead in the third and I think that gave us some momentum. I thought we had the momentum after the first sets. Chris has lost some tough ones lately, but he played under control and did what we needed him to do."

The final match went to Florida State as Webb rallied after dropping the second set to win the match in a tiebreaker 6-4, 1-6, 7-6 (5)

The Seminoles are back in action on Sunday (February 8) when they play host to No. 61 Texas Tech at 1 p.m. at the Scott Speicher Tennis Center.

SEMINOLE MEN'S TENNIS COMPLETES WEEKEND SWEEP WITH 5-2 WIN OVER TEXAS TECH

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. – For the first few weeks of the season, the close matches just weren't going in favor of the Florida State University men's tennis team. That seems to have turned around as the Seminoles beat their second ranked opponent in as many days, taking down No. 61 Texas Tech 5-2 on Sunday (February 8).

The 36th-ranked Seminoles improved to 4-2 on the year with their third-straight victory.

"I don't think we played the best match of the year, but it was our best win," FSU net boss **Dwayne Hultquist** said. "I like that we won a match, having played the previous day. Everyone played hard and to be a great team, everyone has to play hard everyday. I think some guys really stepped up for us today."

Similar to Saturday's tight singles matches, the doubles point went down to the wire. Florida State had the early advantage when fifteenth-ranked **Jeff Groslimond** (Atlanta, Ga.) and **Chris Westerhof** (Durban, South Africa) prevailed 8-5 at No.1 over Bojan Szumanski and Esat Tanik.

FSU stayed perfect in doubles when the No. 2 match went 9-7 in favor of the Seminoles' **Mat Cloer** (Brevard, N.C.) and **Jonathas Sucupira** (Sao Paulo, Brazil). The FSU tandem was down 7-6, but rallied for two breaks to win the point. TTU's lone doubles win came at No. 3 where Teddy DiBlasi and Michael Innerebner needed a tiebreaker to beat **Joe Bassett** (Monticello, Fla.) and **Chip Webb** (Chattanooga, Tenn.) 9-7 (2).

"I thought the key to match was our doubles," Hultquist added. "We were down 7-5 at No. 3 and 7-6 at number two and they were serving to win the doubles point and we broke on both courts. Mat and Jonathas came back to win at No. 2 and we were in the match at No. 3."

The Seminoles gained a quick 3-0 advantage over the Red Raiders when FSU took the first two singles matches. At No. 4, Webb prevailed 6-2, 6-4 over Halachev, while Westerhof was victorious 6-3, 6-3 versus Innerebner in the fifth match.

Completing the team victory was Cloer when he won his contest at No. 1 7-6 (2), 6-2 over Paulsen. His singles victory, combined with the win at doubles, moved him past Hall of Famer **Joey Rive** for eighth all-time with 122 combined victories. Cloer ranks ninth in school history with his 72 singles wins-one behind assistant **Ty Braswell**-and has moved into sole possession of third place with his 50 doubles triumphs, needing three more to break the record.

Adding to the Seminoles' advantage was Groslimond at number three singles. After winning the first set in a tiebreaker, the sophomore came back from a 5-4 deficit to take the second set and the contest 7-5.

Texas Tech got its first point of the day during No. 2 singles. Despite sustaining an injury during the match, Sucupira played on, but couldn't mount a comeback as he fell 6-1, 6-3 to Szumanski. Finishing up the afternoon was Texas Tech's Dimitrio Martinez beating **Jarrod Owen** (Vero Beach, Fla.) 6-4, 5-7, 6-3.

Florida State will take to the road for its next three matches. The Seminoles travel to instate rival South Florida, ranked 34th in the country, on Saturday (February 14) for a 1 p.m. bout.

FSU LOOKS FOR SOME LOVE ON THE ROAD AGAINST THE BULLS

So far the only experience the Florida State University men's tennis team has had on the road this year left a bitter taste in its mouth. The Seminoles' lone road match of the year has been a 4-3 loss at #3 Florida. FSU will try to get road win No. 1 on Saturday (February 14) when it travels to Tampa for a 1 p.m. match with South Florida at the USF Varsity Courts.

SERIES WITH SOUTH FLORIDA IS NECK AND NECK

In a series that dates back to 1969, Florida State and South Florida are only separated by one match. The Seminoles took a 19-18 advantage last season when they picked up a 5-2 victory in Tallahassee. The triumph was also the first for the Tribe under head coach **Dwayne Hultquist** in four attempts. Overall, the fifth-year net boss is 1-3 against the Bulls.

MILESTONE MAT

Over the weekend, junior **Mat Cloer** (Brevard, NC.) made several moves up the Florida State career carts. On Sunday against Texas Tech, his two victories moved him past Hall of Famer **Joey Rive** for eighth all-time with 122 combined victories. Cloer ranks ninth in school history with his 72 singles wins—one behind assistant **Ty Braswell**—and has moved into sole possession of third place with his 50 doubles triumphs, needing three more to break the record.

THIRD SETS GO FSU'S WAY IN 5-2 VICTORY OVER UCF

In order to get win number three, the Seminoles had to put in some overtime for a 5-2 victory over No. 75 Central Florida on Saturday (February 7). Four of the six singles' contests went to a third set with Florida State taking three of the four to insure the victory. The win also moved **Dwayne Hultquist** past FSU Hall of Famer **Don Loucks** into fifth-place all-time with 54 coaching victories.

FLORIDA STATE RALLIES FOR DOUBLES POINT TO BEAT TEXAS TECH 5-2

Continuing the late match magic, Florida State rallied in two of the three doubles matches and carried the momentum from doubles to beat No. 61 Texas Tech 5-2 on Sunday (February 8). Facing match point at 7-6, the tandem of **Mat Cloer** and **Jonathas Sucupira** (Sao Paulo, Brazil) came back to win 9-7 at No. 2 and secure the doubles point. FSU then won four of the six singles' bouts.

WESTERHOF AND GROSLIMOND RACKING UP SINGLES VICTORIES

Already strong in doubles—ranked 15th in the country and undefeated in dual matches—Jeff Groslimond (Atlanta, Ga.) and Chris Westerhof (Durban, South Africa) are starting to find their groove in singles. FLORIDA STATE MEN'S TENNIS HOLDS ON FOR 4-3 DECISION OVER MICHIGAN

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. – Home was definitely sweet for the Florida State University men's tennis team as it broke a two-match slide with a 4-3 victory over Michigan on Friday (February 27). The 39th-ranked Seminoles won the last match on the court to beat the No. 44 Wolverines and improve to 5-4 on the year. Michigan drops its first match of the season, falling to 6-1.

"We've played a lot of close match like this against some teams in the top ten," FSU head coach **Dwayne Hultquist** said. "I think we could have had a complex, but we've won two now that have been close. We knew

Michigan was going to be a tough match. They have one of the best teams there that they've had in a while."

The Seminoles picked up the first point of the match by taking the doubles. FSU took an early advantage when the #48 tandem of **Jeff Groslimond** (Atlanta, Ga.) and Chris **Westerhof** (Durban, South Africa) beat Anthony Jackson and Brian Hung 8-1. Michigan answered at number three as Steve Peretz and Vinny Gossain held off **Chip Webb** (Chattanooga, Tenn.) and **Jarrod Owen** (Vero Beach, Fla.) 8-4.

The point came down to the number two match between FSU's **Mat Cloer** (Brevard, N.C.) and **Jonathas Sucupira** (Sao Paulo, Brazil) and the Wolverines' Michael Rubin and Ryan Heller. Down 6-3, the Seminoles rallied to send the match in the tiebreaker where they prevailed 8-6 to win the doubles point.

Michigan got its first point when David Anving beat **Joao Paolo Bounassar** (Maringa Parana, Brazil) 6-1, 6-3 at number six. FSU regained the lead when Westerhof won his fourth match in a row, beating Peretz 6-2, 6-3.

"Chris is playing good tennis right now and he's capable of playing higher in our line-up and maybe that's something we can do," Hultquist added. "He's certainly playing well right now."

Taking down his second-straight ranked opponent, #25 Cloer beat 40th-ranked Rubin 6-4, 6-4. The victory was number 74 of his career, tying him with **Joey Rive** for seventh all-time. The doubles triumph moved him into a first-place tie with **Alex Rucker** and current assistant coach **Ty Braswell** at 52 career doubles wins.

While the first three matches were decided in under an hour and a half, the remaining trio went to a third set. After trading the first two sets at 6-4, Groslimond and Hung battled at number three singles. The deciding set went Michigan's way as Hung prevailed 6-4. Just minutes before, Michigan's Heller also rallied from a one-set deficit to beat Webb 6-7 (4), 6-3, 6-3 at No. 4 to tie the match at three points a piece.

The outcome came of the match came down to number two between Sucupira and Jackson. Sucupira won the first set 7-6 (3), but Jackson answered with a 6-1 win. Tied at three in the deciding set, Sucupira picked up a break then held to go up 5-3. After Jackson held, Sucupira came back to win the set and the match 6-4.

"I think Jonathas really stepped it up," Hultquist added. "He really served well in the third and I thought that was the difference. He stayed aggressive. Even though he was missing some volleys, he stayed aggressive and that in the end won him the match."

FSU returns to the Scott Speicher Tennis Center on Saturday to play a 3 p.m. match with Furman.

MAT CLOER TIES DOUBLES RECORD AS FSU MEN'S TENNIS BEATS FURMAN 5-2

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. – A former Florida State University men's tennis player was on hand to see a little slice of history, unfortunately for **Paul Scarpa**, it came at the expense of his current team. Despite losing the doubles point, the #39 Seminoles rallied for a 5-2 victory over Furman on Saturday (February 28).

With the victory, Florida State improves to 6-4 on the season, while the Paladins drop to 0-5. Scarpa played for the Seminoles from 1960-62 and coached the Tribe during the 1964 campaign.

"It was key for Chris to just run through his guy and I thought we did a good job of staying focused," FSU net boss **Dwayne Hultquist** said. "I think we were a little bit more talented then they were, but they were fighting so hard. Furman does a great job of staying in the match. It was good to see Jarrod get a straight set victory and now Jonathas is starting to make a run."

In only his third season of play, junior **Mat Cloer** (Brevard, N.C.) has equaled the doubles mark set by **Alex Rucker** and current assistant coach **Ty Braswell**. Combining with his partner **Jonathas Sucupira** (Sao Paulo, Brazil), Cloer tied the new mark at 52 with an 8-4 triumph over Allen Simmons and Brian Crook.

"Mat's winning percentage is excellent and we look for him to do that," Hultquist added. "He's the kind of guy who should win a high percentage and he's good when the pressure is on. It might be hard to catch him."

Unfortunately, that would be the only doubles match the Seminoles would win as Furman took the doubles point. At No. 1, John Chesworth and Patrick Fillnow upset 48th-ranked **Chris Westerhof** (Durban, South Africa) and **Jeff Groslimond** (Atlanta, Ga.) 8-4. Number three doubles saw Scott Kahler and Kevin Lackey beat **Jarrod Owen** (Vero Beach, Fla.) and **Joe Bassett** (Monticello, Fla.) 8-3.

Evening the match at one point apiece was Westerhof's triumph at number five singles. The sophomore won his fifth match in a row, cruising past Crook 6-1, 6-0. After falling behind 1-0, Westerhof won the next 12 games to take the match. Giving Florida State its first lead of the day was Owen as he prevailed 6-2, 7-5 over Lackey at number six. The senior reeled off six-straight games to win the first set.

Squaring the match at two points was Furman's Ben Pauluhn as he beat **Chip Webb** (Chattanooga, Tenn.) 6-3, 6-3 at number four. Friday's hero Sucupira got the Seminoles back on top when he beat Fillnow 6-3, 6-3. Closing out the match for Florida State was Groslimond as he rallied from down 4-1 in the second set to beat Simmons 6-2, 7-5.

Cloer's effect on the Florida State career charts wasn't limited to doubles. By defeating Chesworth 7-5, 3-6, 6-2 he moved past Rucker on the combined wins list with 127 total triumphs. He also took over sole possession of seventh-place all-time with his 75th singles triumph.

The Seminoles will take to the road in search of their first victory away from the Scott Speicher Tennis Center next weekend. Florida State opens Atlantic Coast Conference action on March 7 at Maryland.

FSU MEN'S TENNIS BOLSTERS COACHING STAFF WITH ADDITION OF ALL-AMERICAN NICK CROWELL

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. – While earning All-America honors in doubles play at the University of Texas, **Nick Crowell** recognized the importance of teamwork. Then an assistant with the Longhorns, current Florida State University net boss **Dwayne Hultquist** recognized that Crowell might have the talent to be an assistant some day and he acted on that notion when he hired Crowell as his new assistant.

The 25-year-old Crowell replaces **Ty Braswell**, who left the Seminoles to pursue a job as a teaching professional at Laurel Glenn in Sarasota, Fla.

"Ever since going to Texas and knowing Dwayne, I've always looked up to college coaches and I wanted to pursue that after my playing career was over," Crowell said. "It's a great opportunity to come to a major program and I look forward to helping Florida State. Knowing Dwayne's past and working with him is going to make it easier for me to come in and adapt to his system and work with the guys."

Since graduating from Texas in 2000 with a bachelor's degree in sports management, Crowell has been playing professionally on the Challenger and FUTURES tours. Last season he reached the semifinals in doubles play at the Seascape Challenger (Aptos, Calif.) and the Challenger of Dallas. Unfortunately an injury cut his career short and for the last two months he has been a teaching pro at Holly Tree Country Club in Tyler, Texas.

"The thing that separated Nick from the others was, not only was he a great player, being a two-time All-American, but there was the connection we had back at Texas and the success we had there," Hultquist said. "My last three years we won the Big 12 every year and Nick was a huge part of that. He understands what it means to be at a top five program."

Early in his career at Texas, Crowell established himself as one of the top doubles players in the country. During his freshman season, he teamed up with Paul Martin to advanced to the quarterfinals of the doubles draw at the NCAA Tournament, earning him his first All-America honor.

That season he also earned the Big 12 Conference and ITA Region VI Freshman of the Year adwards. His rookie of the year accolade from the league would be the first of many for Crowell. Starting his sophomore year, he earned all-conference honors his last three seasons in singles and doubles.

Finishing his career just as he started it, Crowell captured his second All-America honor during senior season as he and playing partner Michael Blue advanced to the round of 16 at the NCAA Tournament. Earlier in the season, the two paired up to win the doubles tile at the ITA National Indoor Tournament.

"His success in doubles is really going to help us," Hultquist noted. "Our guys are going to have to come to practice ready to play every day. Guys like **Chris (Westerhof)** and **Jeff (Groslimond)**, who are a top doubles team in the nation, it's going to push them."

With nearly 100 doubles victories during his tenure with the Longhorns, Crowell ranks third in school history with 98 triumphs. His 29 doubles wins with Martin during 1997 still ranks in the top five. Sparked by a 35-win season in 1997, he ranks 15th on the all-time singles list.

"The team is looking really good this year," Crowell added. "They have the potential to be a top-20 team and hopefully I can adapt to the system and bring in a new excitement that can help. Hopefully I can bring a tradition of winning conference titles and making it to the Sweet 16 every year and teach these guys about what it takes to be a top team."

A native of Amarillo, Texas, and residing in Tyler, Texas before accepting the job at Florida State, Crowell is married to the former **Allison Flannigan**. He will hit the ground running as he assumes his new duties just in time for the Seminoles' Atlantic Coast Conference opener on Sunday (March 7) Maryland.

FLORIDA STATE MEN'S TENNIS OPENS ACC SLATE WITH 7-0 VICTORY OVER MARYLAND

COLLEGE PARK, Md. - Without a win away from home this season, the idea of starting the Atlantic Coast Conference season on the road didn't sound great to the Florida State University men's tennis team. Despite recent history, the Seminoles got their first road win of the year and opened the conference slate on a good note as they beat Maryland 7-0 on Sunday (March 7).

No. 42 Florida State won its third match in a row to improve to 7-4 on the season with a 1-0 ACC mark. Maryland falls to 0-2 in the league and 5-3 on the year. The Seminoles have won all 14 meetings with the Terrapins since joining the league in 1992. The Tribe has not lost a single point to UM since that inaugural meeting, a streak of 88-straight wins.

"It's a good win for us, we haven't won 7-0 all year," FSU head coach **Dwayne Hultquist** said. "It's good for us to start the ACC schedule with a victory and it's a good confidence booster for us going into Virginia. They're a top 25 teams and we're going to need to play well against them."

Playing to its strength, the Seminoles got on the board first when they won the doubles point. Florida State secured the doubles point when the No. 1 duo of **Jeff Groslimond** (Atlanta, Ga.) and **Chris Westerhof** (Durban, South Africa) prevailed 8-3 against Ian Bliss and Scott Peters. Completing the sweep was **Joe Bassett** (Monticello, Fla.) and **Chip Webb** (Chattanooga, Tenn.) when they triumphed 8-4 over the No. 3 pair of David Reichsfeld and Scott Fink.

"It was especially glad to see us win at number three doubles," Hultquist added. "We've worked hard with them this week and they reaped the rewards of their hard work. They've lost some close matches that they've played well in. It was good to see JP get his first dual match win."

Just as he has done the last two matches, Westerhof got the Seminoles going in singles as he won 6-2, 6-0 over David Reichsfeld. A pair of 6-2, 6-1 victories secured the team point for Florida State as Sucupira prevailed over Demers at number two and the third match went in favor of the Tribe's Groslimond over Peters.

Continuing the winning streak was Cloer with his 6-3, 6-1 triumph at No. 1 over Bliss. Collecting the first dual match victory of his career was **Joao Paolo Bounassar** (Maringa Parana, Brazil) as he came through with a 6-3, 7-5 win over John O' Rourke. Finishing out the match was Webb as he broke a four-match slide with a 6-2, 4-6, 1-0 triumph against Fink.

FSU continues its three-match road trip on Tuesday when it takes on number No. 23 Virginia at 1 p.m.

#1 ILLINOIS FOILS UPSET BID WITH 5-2 VICTORY OVER FLORIDA STATE MEN'S TENNIS

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. – Over the last two years, the top-ranked University of Illinois has dominated men's tennis, winning 46-straight dual matches and a national title. Win number 47 was probably closer than the Illini would have like as they got out of town with a 5-2 victory over Florida State University on Saturday (March 20).

Illinois stays a perfect 15-0 on the year while the #41 Seminoles fall to 9-6 overall with all half-dozen losses coming to ranked opponents. This was UI's closest match in more than a month as FSU is the first school since No. 7 Stanford lost 4-2 to take more than one point off the Illini. The list of eight-straight schools that Illinois has held to one point or less includes #4 Duke, #8 UCLA, #4 Georgia Tech, #35 Notre Dame and #39 Minnesota.

"I was pleased with how hard our guys fought today," FSU net boss **Dwayne Hultquist** said. "We played hard and we got Illinois in a position where they were starting to feel some pressure and I don't think they expected that coming in. Jonathas and Chris really stepped up their games today."

Both of Florida State's team points came during singles as FSU is the only the second team this season to win two of the top three singles matches, equaling only #21 Texas A&M.

Down 1-0 after doubles, freshman **Jonathas Sucupira** (Sao Paulo, Brazil) got the Seminoles their first point with an upset at No. 2. The rookie battled back after dropping the first set 6-1, to win sets two and three 6-0 and 6-2 to beat #29 Phil Stolt. Winning FSU's only first set was **Chris Westerhof** (Durban, South Africa) as he beat #87 Ryler DeHeart 6-3, 4-6, 6-4 to even the match at two points a piece.

Unfortunately the tide quickly turned against the Seminoles with Illinois winning at No. 1 and No. 5 to secure the team victory. In a back-and-fourth clash, fourth-ranked Brian Wilson outlasted #20 **Mat Cloer** (Brevard, NC) 6-2, 6-7 (2), 6-2. Wrapping up the match was No. 67 Chris Martin as he beat **Chip Webb** (Chattanooga, Tenn.) 7-6 (2), 6-3 at number five.

"This is the toughest team we've played all year and I think now we know that we can play with anyone in the country if we put the effort into it," Hultquist added. "I think we also proved to ourselves that at home we can beat anybody. The energy of the crowd was awesome and hopefully they're back for Duke tomorrow."

Following Sucupira's win at No. 2, UI took the lead back when GD Jones at number six beat **Joao Paolo Bounassar** (Maringa Parana, Brazil) 6-2, 6-4. Rounding out the singles play was the fourth match with Michael Calkins beating **Jeff Groslimond** (Atlanta, Ga.) 11-9 in the super tiebreaker to take the bout 6-2, 5-7, 1-0 (9).

The first point of the day went to Illinois after it won all three doubles. DeHeart and Pramod Dabir got the first win over Webb and **Joe Bassett** (Monticelio, Fla.) 8-1 at No. 3. In a battle of top 25 teams, the No. 3 pair of Stolt and Wilson beat No. 22 Groslimond and Westerhof in the first bout. Illinois' #33 team of Martin and Calkins needed a tiebreaker to beat Cloer and Sucupira 9-8 (3)

There's not rest for the Seminoles as they have to turn around on Sunday and take on #4 Duke at 1 p.m. on the courts at the Scott Speicher Tennis Center.

UVA MAKES EARLY CHARGE TO TAKE 4-3 DECISION OVER FLORIDA STATE MEN'S TENNIS

CHARLOTTESVILLE, Va. – A good ending and a good beginning was not enough for the Florida State University men's tennis team in its attempted to upend No. 19 Virginia. The Seminoles won the doubles point and the last two singles matches, but by the time singles was over, the Cavaliers had already prevailed 4-3.

The loss snaps a two-match winning streak for No. 45 Florida State as they fall to 7-5 overall with a 1-1 mark in the Atlantic Coast Conference. Virginia stays undefeated in the league at 2-0 while improving to 11-2 on the year. UVA also stopped a three-game losing streak to the Seminoles.

"Obviously we played well at number one and two at both singles and doubles," FSU head man **Dwayne Hultquist** said. "The team is really competing well, but we're just a little bit away from getting it all done. The key
match was at number five where Chris had a few set points. If he takes that set then he has a good chance to win
the match and that would have made the difference."

Getting the match off on the right foot was the Tribe's doubles play as they captured the first point of the evening. At number one, the Seminoles pulled off an upset when the No. 22 tandem of **Jeff Groslimond** (Atlanta, Ga.) and **Chris Westerhof** (Durban, South Africa) topped #17 Ryan Rizza and Nick Meythaler 8-2.

Clinching the point was the victory at number two as **Mat Cloer** (Brevard, N.C.) and **Jonathas Sucupira** (Sao Paulo, Brazil) prevailed 8-3 over Marko Miklo and Stephen Rozek. UVA took its only doubles match when Darrien Cohen and Doug Stewart won 8-0 over the Seminoles. **Chip Webb** (Chattanooga, Tenn.) and **Joe Bassett** (Monticello, Fla.) at number three.

Unfortunately that would be the only point Florida State would win until the match was already decided. "Stewart is the only guy that Mat lost to last year in the ACC and he's a top-20 player so it was good to see Mat come out and get a victory," Hultquist noted. "Jonathas is starting to really turn it on and play some excellent tennis."

The battle in the middle and the bottom of the line-up when Virginia's way as the Cavaliers took the four singles matches to pick up the team victory. At number three, Rizza prevailed 6-2, 6-2 over Groslimond and Miklo posted a 6-1, 6-3 triumph versus Webb. Ending a six-match winning streak was Westerhof as he fell 7-6 (4), 6-2 to Meythaler at number five. The deceive point came at number six where Cohen beat **Joao Paolo Bounassar** (Maringa Parana, Brazil) 6-3, 6-1.

Next up for Florida State is a non-conference match at #32 Miami on Friday at 6 p.m.

INSTATE BATTLE GOES TO THE SEMINOLES AS MEN'S TENNIS UPSETS MIAMI

CORAL GABLES, Fla. – So far this year it has been close, but no cigar for the Florida State University men's tennis team when it came to playing higher ranked teams. It their five losses to ranked opponents, the Seminoles had dropped four by a tally of 4-3, but the Tribe reversed the tables by beating No. 32 Miami by that identical score on Friday (March 12).

With the victory #45 Florida State improves to 8-5 on the season while posting its third victory over a ranked team. It is also the second-straight triumph over the Hurricanes, who lost for the first time this season, as the Seminoles have won three of the last four meetings.

"It was a good win for us," FSU net boss **Dwayne Hultquist** said. "They were undefeated coming in and they had beaten some good teams. Our guys are ready to get off the road and now we have six of our last eight at home and we should get some good crowds and our guys are going to be focused for some tough tennis."

Florida State took the momentum early as it won the doubles point. From there all the Seminoles had to do was split the six singles matches and they would walk away with the victory and they did just that.

A pair of 8-4 decisions in the first two doubles slots got the Tribe on the board first. The No. 22 tandem of **Jeff Groslimond** (Atlanta, Ga.) and **Chris Westerhof** (Durban, South Africa) triumphed at No. 1 over Paul Krebs and Colin Purcell. That same score gave **Mat Cloer** (Brevard, N.C.) and **Jonathas Sucupira** (Sao Paulo, Brazil) a win at No. 2 versus P.J. Passalacqua and Jeremiah Fuller. UM's only doubles win came at No. 3 where Eric Hechtman and John Hoyes beat **Chip Webb** (Chattanooga, Tenn.) and **Joe Bassett** (Monticello, Fla.).

The Seminoles got a free point to start singles as Passalacqua had to default in his No. 6 match against **J.P. Bounassar** (Maringa Parana, Brazil). Miami picked up a point when Purcell down Webb 6-1, 6-0 at No. 4. Answering for Florida State was Westerhof as he came out on the winning end a 6-2, 6-0 decision against Fuller. Closing out the match was Sucupira at No. 2 as he posted a 6-1, 6-4 triumph over Hoyes

"We were fortunate to get the default to start singles," Hultquist added. "I thought the key to the match was doubles and then Jonathas played really well in singles. He really took control of the match. Chris continued to play well and got off the court quickly."

With the team outcome already decided, Miami pulled within a point as it won the last two matches. Purcell prevailed 6-1, 6-0 over Westerhof and Hechtman upset #20 Cloer 6-4, 4-6, 1-0 (7).

Florida State returns home to the Scott Speicher Tennis Center for it next four matches starting Monday (March 15) in a 2 p.m. bout versus North Carolina State.

HOMESTAND HIGHLIGHTED BY NO. 1 ILLINOIS & NO. 10 DUKE

It's a weekend like no other in the history of Florida State University men's tennis. The middle of the #45 Seminoles' (8-5 overall / 1-1 ACC) four-match homestand in bold big letters is defending NCAA Champion and nationally ranked No. 1 Illinois on Saturday (March 20), followed the next day by tenth-ranked Duke. Both matches begin at 1 p.m. The four-match streak kicks off Monday (March 15) at 2 p.m. when the Tribe faces North Carolina State.

FSU TRIES TO END ILLINOIS' 46-MATCH WINNING STREAK

It's been nearly two years since Illinois last lost a dual match. On March 13 the Fighting Illini (14-0) set the NCAA record with their 46th-straight victory. Florida State takes on Illinois for the first time since 1979 and faces the defending national champion for the first time in school history. The Seminoles have won both of the previous two meetings with the Illini and are 27-20 against the Big Ten Conference after a win versus #46 Michigan on February 27.

SEMINOLES TRY TO SNAP LOSING STREAK TO #10 DUKE

As if taking on the top team in the land wasn't tough enough, Florida State comes right back on Sunday to take on tenth-rated Duke (11-4 overall / 1-0 ACC). Winners of nine of the 12 Atlantic Coast Conference Championships contested, Duke has taken the last ten contests with the Seminoles. FSU's only win against the Blue Devils came during the 1996 campaign. Duke won last year's only meeting 4-3 in Durham, N.C.

FSU LOOKS TO STAY UNBEATEN AGAINST THE WOLFPACK

While Duke may have FSU's number, the tables are turned for the Tribe when it comes to North Carolina State (4-6 / 1-1) Florida State has won all 12 matches against the Wolfpack, including last year's contest 6-1 in Raleigh, N.C. At home FSU has only dropped nine points in six matches.

RANKED PLAYERS ABOUND AT SCOTT SPEICHER TENNIS CENTER

With a pair of top ten teams coming to Tallahassee, there will naturally be an abundance of the best players in the country on hand. All told there will be seven ranked singles players and six rated doubles teams. One of each will be wearing Garnet and Gold as **Mat Cloer** (Brevard, N.C.) holds the No. 20 spot in singles, while **Chris Westerhof** (Duban, South Africa) and **Jeff Groslimond** (Atlanta, Ga.) are ranked 22nd in doubles.

On the opposite side of the net, Illinois brings in #4 Brian Wilson, #29 Phil Stolt, #67 Chris Martin and #87 Ryler Deheart in singles, as well as the No. 3 tandem of Stolt & Wilson and #33 Martin & Michael Calkins. Ranked Duke players include #7 Ludovic Walter and #11 Phillip King with #4 Jason Zimmerman & Walter and #42 Ryan Heinberg and Chris Brown ranked in doubles.

FSU SPLITS MATCHES AGAINST #19 VIRGINIA AND #32 MIAMI

The Tribe found itself on both sides of a 4-3 decision last week to ranked opponents. First the Seminoles dropped their first ACC match against Virginia, then turned the tables with a triumph against Miami.

SEMINOLE MEN'S TENNIS OPEN HOME STAND WITH 4-3 VICTORY OVER NORTH CAROLINA STATE

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. – With the toughest weekend of competition in school history just five days ahead, Florida State University men's tennis coach **Dwayne Hultquist** wants his team to be playing well going into the matches. On the other hand, he also didn't want them looking ahead. The Seminoles accomplished both of those goals as they beat North Carolina State 4-3 on Monday (March 15).

The victory improves No. 45 Florida State's record to 9-5 overall with a 2-1 ledger in the Atlantic Coast Conference. The Tribe also stays a perfect 13-0 versus the Wolfpack since joining the loop in 1992. North Carolina State falls to 1-2 in the league while dipping to 5-9 on the year.

"I warned the guys about overlooking NC State and told them that they were going to come ready to play," Hultquist said. "I thought they (NC State) did a great job of competing even though they were down five first sets. They came back and won two of them in three. Our guys got a good start, but they may have let up just a little bit."

The Seminoles first point of the day came courteous of a sweep in doubles. Opening up the match was the No. 2 team of **Mat Cloer** (Brevard, N.C.) and **Jonathas Sucupira** (Sao Paulo, Brazil) as they cruised to an 8-2 win over Val Banada and Dennis Myers. Then it was **Chris Westerhof** (Durban, South Africa) and **Jeff Groslimond** (Atlanta, Ga.) collecting their 22nd win of the year—moving them into a tie for seventh on the single-season charts—as they beat Will Shaw and Jon Davis 9-7. Down 6-3, the tandem of **Chip Webb** (Chattanooga, Tenn.) and **Joe Bassett** (Monticello, Fla.) won the last five games to beat Conor Taylor and Andre Iriarte 8-6.

"The thing I was most pleased with was Chip and Joe coming back from 6-3 down to win at number three doubles," Hultquist added. "I thought that gave us a lift. Jonathas is really on a roll right now and he also gives us a lift by getting of the court so quickly."

Over the last three weeks, no Seminole is playing better singles than Sucupira. The junior won his seventh match in a row as he beat Shaw 6-2, 6-2 at No. 2. The Wolfpack picked up their first point of the afternoon at number one when Taylor beat #20 Cloer 6-3, 6-4.

Within five minutes, the team match went from a one-point contest to a Florida State victory. First it was freshman **Joao Paolo Bounassar** (Maringa Parana, Brazil) at number six picking up a 7-5, 6-4 win against Myers. Then Groslimond sealed the team victory with his 7-6 (5), 6-3 triumph at No. 5 over Davis.

After the team point was decided, North Carolina State made it a one-point final as it took the remaining two matches. Banada rallied to beat Westerhof 2-6, 6-3, 6-4 at number three while Iriarte followed suit with a 1-6, 6-3, 6-4 win against Webb at number four.

Next up for the Seminoles is defending NCAA champion and nationally-ranked number one Illinois at 1 p.m. on Saturday (March 20). FSU follows that up with No. 10 Duke at the same time on Sunday.



FSU MEN'S TENNIS ENDS #4 DUKE'S 58-MATCH ACC WINNING STREAK WITH 4-3 VICTORY

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. – All season long the Florida State University men's tennis team has been on the brink of upsetting a top ten team. On Sunday (March 21), the Seminoles turned the corner as they rallied to win four of the six singles matches on their way to a 4-3 triumph over #4 Duke University.

With the victory, No. 41 Florida State improves to 10-6 overall and 3-1 in the Atlantic Coast Conference, while Duke drops to 11-5 on the year. FSU also hands the Blue Devils their first conference loss in nearly eight years. Duke had won 58-straight ACC dual matching dating back to 1996, which is also the last time Florida State beat the Blue Devils.

"All season long we've been right there knocking on the door and today we finally did it," FSU net boss **Dwayne Hultquist** said. "We were right there against Florida and Illinois and the difference is that we got a group of guys that just won't quit. We needed that experience of what it takes to beat at top ten team and today it paid off. The crowd was great again today and they gave us that emotional lift when we needed it."

After losing the doubles point, Florida State faced the tough uphill climb of having two win four of the six singles matches to gain the team victory. The Seminoles not only did just that, but pulled it off in grand style, taking the top four singles matches, including a pair of upsets over top 15 players.

With the Seminoles down 2-0 in the team tally after Duke had won at No. 5 singles, Florida State got its first point of the day when **Mat Cloer** (Brevard, N.C.) beat 11th-ranked Phillip King in a battle of the previous two ACC Players of the Year. The 20th-ranked Cloer got the upper hand as he beat King 6-4, 7-5 at number one after being down 5-3 in the second set.

Once again the Tribe had to respond to a two point deficit as the Blue Devils captured a point at No. 6 to put them one point away from victory. Giving Florida State its second point and pulling off his second upset of a top-30 player in as many days was rookie **Jonathas Sucupira** (Sao Paulo, Brazil) with his win at number two. The freshman beat #7 Ludovic Walter 6-3, 7-5 as he also rallied from being down 5-3 in the second stanza.

That left FSU down 3-2 with number four and three singles still left on the court and doubles playing partners **Jeff Groslimond** (Atlanta, Ga.) and **Chris Westerhof** (Durban, South Africa) to bring home the victory.

After Jonathan Stokke took the first set from Groslimond 6-3 at No. 5, the sophomore battled back to win the second stanza 6-4. Groslimond look to be in control of the third set from the start as he broke the first game and held serve twice to go up 3-1, but Stokke answered with a break of his own and held to go ahead 4-3. From there Groslimond held serve to tie at 4-4, took the lead by breaking Stokke and then served out for the match with a 6-4 win in the third set.

Now the match, and the entire focus of the Seminoles' second crowd of over 300 spectators, turned to number three singles. An early break gave Westerhof the first set 6-4 over Peter Rodrigues, but the Blue Devil answered with a victory in the second set (6-3) to push the contest to a rubber match. Battling cramps and a match that went almost three hours, both players held their first two serves. Up 3-2, Westerhof got the upper hand when he broke to go up 4-2. Two holds of serve and the Seminoles had their first victory over a top five program during Hultquist's five-year tenure as Westerhof won 6-3.

"Chris has been in a position a couple times this year where he could have won the match for us, but ended up losing so it was great to see him come through with a victory for us," Hultquist noted. "Mat and Jonathas really got us going with great wins over ranked players."

The Blue Devils' only two singles points came at number five and six as Jason Zimmerman posted a 6-4, 6-1 win over **Chip Webb** (Chattanooga, Tenn.) and Christopher Brown beat **Joao Paolo Bounassar** (Maringa Parana, Brazil) 6-4, 6-4.

Duke captured the first point of the afternoon when it swept all three doubles matches. The No.3 tandem of Rodrigues and Stephen Amritaj took down Webb and **Joe Bassett** (Monticello, Fla.) 8-4. A back and fourth match at number two went the way of Stokke and King 8-6 over Cloer and Sucupira. The only break of serve at number one went the way of Duke and it came in the final game as fourth-ranked Walter and Zimmerman prevailed 9-7 over No. 22 Groslimond and Westerhof.

"In the fall we went through intense training sessions and those paid off today," Hultquist added. "I have to give (strength and condition coach) Dave Plettl some credit for the win today."

After taking on #1 Illinois and #4 Duke on back-to-back days, the Seminoles have a week off before they return to competition, taking on #47 Wake Forest on Saturday (March 27) at the Scott Speicher Tennis Center.

PAIR OF RANKED WINS EARNS FSU'S JONATHAS SUCUPIRA ACC MEN'S TENNIS WEEKLY HONOR

GREENSBORO, N.C. – For the past month, the members of the Florida State University men's tennis team have known how well freshman **Jonathas Sucupira** has been playing. It's just now that they're letting the rest of the country in on the secret. After winning three singles matches, including two over top-30 players, Sucupira was named Atlantic Coast Conference Men's Tennis Player of the Week.

As a result of the three victories, which pushed his winning streak to nine matches, Sucupira (Sao Paulo, Brazil) entered the Intercollegiate Tennis Association poll for the first time in his career at No. 51. The three triumphs improved his record to 17-8, trying him with #19 **Mat Cloer** (Brevard, N.C.) for the most on the team this year. The rookie has not lost a singles match since February 20 when he fell to #22 William Barker or Rice.

"Jonathas has gone a whole month without losing a match so he has been getting it done for a while now," FSU head coach **Dwayne Hultquist** said. "He's being reward now for what he has done this last month. We're really proud of what he's done."

The week started with Sucupira beating North Carolina State's number two player Will Shaw 6-2, 6-2. Up next was a showdown with #29 Phil Stolt of Illinois and the three-set battle went FSU's way as Sucupira prevailed 1-6, 6-0, 6-2. His win, combined with another by **Chris Westerhof** (Durban, South Africa) at No. 3 made the Seminoles just the second team this year to win two of the top three singles matches against the top-ranked Illini.

The following day Sucupira's task was even tougher in more than one respect. For starters, he was facing #7 Ludovic Walter of Duke. There was also the added pressure of keeping the Seminoles in the dual match. The Blue Devils had won their third point of the day and needed to just one win of the remaining three matches to claim the team victory.

After taking the first set 6-3, Sucupira found himself in a hole down 5-3 in second set. The match looked to be on its way to a tiebreaker, but Sucupira broke Ludovic twice and held his serve two times to win the match. It was his third victory over a ranked opponent and the second against a top-ten player. Earlier in the year he beat Florida's ninth-ranked Janne Holmia.

"He plays a lot better when he plays with energy and I think people like to watch him," Hultquist noted. "We had great crowds on Saturday and Sunday and the stands were pretty full around his court. I think the fans like to watch someone who puts a lot of energy into their match and Jonathas certainly does that. He also impacts the guys around him and inspires the team."

Sucupira will defend his national ranking and look to extend his winning streak to double digits when the Seminoles, who moved up to No. 25 in the lastes ITA poll, play host to #48 Wake Forest on Saturday (March 27) at 1 p.m. on the Scott Speicher Tennis Center.

SEMINOLES DEFEND TOP-25 RANKING FOR FIRST TIME AGAINST DEACONS

The last time the Florida State University men's tennis team graced the top-25, fifth-year head coach Dwayne Hultquist was still working as an assistant at the University of Texas. All of that changed this week as the Seminoles jumped 16 spots to #25 in the latest Intercollegiate Tennis Association's poll. FSU (10-6 overall / 3-1 ACC) will defend its new ranking when it takes on Wake Forest on Saturday (March 27) at 1 p.m. at the Scott Speicher Tennis Center. The last time FSU was in the top-25 was 1995 when it ended the year at No. 24.

FSU GOES FOR TWO IN A ROW AGAINST WAKE FOREST

Prior to last season, the No. 48 Demon Deacons (8-6 overall / 1-2 ACC) had taken control of the series, winning four of the last five matches. The Seminoles stopped the bleeding when they beat WFU 4-3 in Winston Salem. Florida State still holds the overall advantage, 10-4, after winning the first nine matches following 1992's entry into the ACC. Home hasn't been so sweet for the Tribe as of late with the Deacons taking the last three contests in Tallahassee.

SHOCK AND AWE! FSU UPSETS #4 DUKE

It might be the greatest dual meet triumph in school history and is by far the best in during Dwayne Hultquist's five-year tenure. What is it? A 4-3 Florida State victory over #4 Duke on Sunday (March 21). The Seminoles won the top four singles matches on their way to upsetting the Blue Devils and ending Duke's 58match conference winning streak. The Blue Devils' run through the ACC began during the 1996 season, which was the last time FSU beat Duke.

TWO RANKED VICTORIES EARNS SUCUPIRA ACC POW HONORS

For the past month, Florida State has known how well freshman Jonathas Sucupira (Sao Paulo, Brazil) has been playing. It's just now that they're letting the rest of the country in on the secret. After winning three singles matches, including two over top-30 players, Sucupira was named ACC Player of the Week. On backto-back days, Sucupira beat #29 Phil Stolt of Illinois 1-6, 6-0, 6-2 and Duke's #7 Ludovic Walter 6-3, 7-5. As a result, Sucupira entered the ITA rankings at No. 51.

UPSET MOVES CLOER INTO ITA TOP-20 SINGLES RANKINGS

Since the dual match season began in January, Mat Cloer (Brevard, N.C.) has been working his way up the ITA rankings. Following a 6-4, 7-5 triumph against 11th-ranked Phillip King, the 2003 ACC Player of the Year earned the highest ranking of his career when he moved up one spot to No. 19.

SEMINOLES STAY PERFECT VS. NC STATE; DROP CLOSE ONE TO #1 ILLINOIS

FSU posted ACC victories at the start and end of last week by beating North Carolina State 4-3 on Monday. Since joining the ACC in 1992, the Seminoles have never dropped dual match to the Wolfpack with a perfect 13-0 record.

All FSU did for a get ready for Duke was take on defending national champion Illinois. The Seminoles had the nation's top-ranked team on the ropes before falling 5-2. Along with Jonathas Sucupira's win, Chris Westerhof (Durban, South Africa) upset #87 Ryler DeHeart at number three. FSU is just the second school this season to take two of the top three singles matches from UI.

WAKE FOREST STEALS 4-3 VICTORY FROM #25 FLORIDA STATE MEN'S TENNIS

TALLAHASSEE, **Fla.** - For the second time in seven days, the Florida State University men's tennis team was facing a ranked school from North Carolina with team victory hanging in the balance at number three and four singles. Unfortunately, the Seminoles couldn't repeat their upset performance against Duke as Wake Forest came away with a 4-3 victory on Saturday (March 27).

The loss drops Florida State to 11-6 on the year just four days after it ascended to the No. 25 position in the ITA rankings. FSU's Atlantic Coast Conference record dips to 3-2. The #48 Demon Deacons even both their overall and league records at 8-8 and 2-2 respectively.

For the first time in two weeks, the Seminoles started the afternoon by taking the doubles point. Getting the win at No. 3 was the tandem of Chip Webb (Chattanooga, Tenn.) and Joe Bassett (Monticello, Fla.) as they used four breaks to defeat David Loewenthal and Joe Bates 8-5.

Securing the opening point was Florida State's number two tandem of Mat Cloer (Brevard, N.C.) and Jonathas Sucupira (Sao Paulo, Brazil). After taking an early lead over Todd Paul and Derrick Spice, the Seminole tandem found itself down 5-4. From there they won four of the last four games to prevail 8-6. The same could be said for the No. 1 pairing of Jeff Groslimond (Atlanta, Ga.) and Chris Westerhof (Duban, South Africa) as they broke at seven all than held serve to win 9-7 over Brett Ross and Andrew Hamar.

The home team's advantage moved to 2-0 as 19th-ranked Cloer defeated #37 Spice 6-1, 6-3 in a match that lasted just over an hour. Wake Forest's first point of the afternoon came when Paul won 11 of the last 12 games to down #51 Sucupira 6-3, 6-1 at No. 2 singles. The Demon Deacons evened the match when Liron Straus cruised to a 6-2, 6-2 triumph over Joao Paolo Bounassar (Maringa Parana, Brazil).

Florida State found itself one point away from victory following Webb's match at No. 5. The junior cruised in the first set 6-2, then took control in the second set tiebreaker to win the bout 7-6 (3) over Hamar. That left No. 3 and 4 singles on the court with both matches going to a third set.

The rubber match was almost avoided at number three as Westerhof broke and then held serve to force a tiebreaker. But that's where Loewenthal gained his momentum, winning the breaker 11-9 before going on to take the third set 6-2 and tie the match at three points apiece.

Now all the attention turned to the third match between Groslimond and Ross. The Demon Deacon took the opening stanza 6-3, before Groslimond rallied for a 6-4 win in the second set to force a third. Up 4-1, the Atlanta native appeared to be in control of the match, but Ross broke serve and held on to send the match into a tiebreaker where he won 8-6 to win the set and the match for Wake Forest.

The Seminoles will take to their road for their next two matches. The two date swing begins Friday (April 2) with a 2:30 p.m. bout at Clemson.

Unfortunately, the Tribe could only muster one more point the rest of the afternoon. Junior **Chip Webb** (Chattanooga, Tenn.) won his second match of the row as he beat Damiisa Robinson 6-2, 4-6, 6-3 at number four.

GROSLIMOND AND WESTERHOF TIE DOUBLES MARK AS FSU MEN'S TENNIS FALLS 5-2 TO GA. TECH

ATLANTA, Ga. – If they had their choice, the Florida State University men's tennis doubles tandem of **Chris Westerhof** and **Jeff Groslimond** would rather they equal the single season record for victories during a team win, but instead they will have to hope that the record-breaker is part of an FSU triumph. Despite taking the doubles point, the Tribe lost 5-2 to Georgia Tech on Sunday (April 4).

Twenty-ninth-ranked Florida State drops it second match in a row as it falls to 10-8 overall and 3-3 in the Atlantic Coast Conference. The No. 40 Yellow Jackets improve to 13-6 on the year with a 5-3 ledger in the loop. The main story for the Seminoles was the 25th doubles win of the season by Groslimond (Atlanta, Ga.)

The main story for the Seminoles was the 25th doubles win of the season by Groslimond (Atlanta, Ga.) and Westerhof (Durban, South Africa). The duo ties the mark originally set by Jason White and Antonio Prieto in 1995 and equaled last year by Romain Jurd and Alex Herrera.

Equaling the record on this day wasn't going to be a walk in the park for the Seminole duo. They accomplished the feat by taking down the No. 11 team in the country, Georgia Tech's Scott Schnugg and Marko Rajevac. The Yellow Jackets were one of only two teams to beat Groslimond and Westerhof in the fall and they got their revenge on Sunday as they won 8-4.

The Seminoles picked up the first point of the afternoon when the tandem of **Mat Cloer** (Brevard, N.C.) and **Jonathas Sucupira** (Sao Paulo, Brazil) took down West Nott and Jason Pieters 8-4 at No. 2 doubles. FSU almost got the sweep, but Jose Luis Muguruza and Joao Menano got the best of **Chip Webb** (Chattanooga, Tenn.) and **Joe Bassett** (Monticello, Fla.) 9-7 at the third doubles.

With the exception of number two singles, the remaining five singles matches were very close with four of the five going to three sets. Unfortunately, only one of those outcomes went Florida State's way. At No. 2 singles, Sucupira had to retire in the second set because of injury.

The Seminoles' lone win in singles came at the top spot. No. 19 Cloer, the defending ACC Player of the Year, ran his record to 6-1 in league play and collected his 68th-career singles win as he beat #65 Schnugg 6-7, 6-4, 6-2. His win with Sucupira in doubles moved him to third all time with 49 triumphs.

Cloer's victory put Florida State up by a point, but Georgia Tech evened the match when Pieters took down Westerhof 6-3, 7-5 at number three. That left three matches on the court and all three went to a third set with Georgia Tech coming out on top in all of them.

At number four, Nott took down the hometown player as he beat Groslimond 3-6, 6-1, 6-2. Another tight match went against FSU at number five as Webb fell 3-6, 6-2, 7-5 to Zachary Rath. The last match of the day also went to the home team as Menano beat **Joao Paolo Bounassar** (Maringa Parana, Brazil) 6-3, 2-6, 6-0.

Florida State wraps up conference action, the regular season and the home portion of its schedule next weekend. The Seminoles play their last ACC match when they take on No. 18 North Carolina on Saturday (April 10) at 5 p.m., followed by a 2 p.m. bout with Notre Dame two days later.

After a pair of losses to Clemson and #40 Georgia Tech, the Florida State University men's tennis team needs some home cooking before next week's Atlantic Coast Conference Tournament. The 33rd-ranked Seminoles (10-9 overall / 3-4 ACC) will wrap up the 2004 regular season this weekend when they play host to #14 North Carolina on Saturday (April 10) at 5 p.m. before a 2 p.m. bout Monday (April 12) versus #35 Notre Dame.

TWO-FOR-ONE HAS NOT BEEN A GOOD OFFER FROM THE TAR HEELS

Besides the last matches of the regular season, Saturday and Monday will be the last time seniors **Joe Bassett** (Monticello, Fla.) and **Jared Owen** (Vero Beach, Fla.) play competitively at the Scott Speicher Tennis Center. Troubled with injuries the last couple of years, both have bounced back for their final campaign to help the Seminoles on and off the court.

CLOER POST 20 VICTORIES FOR SECOND YEAR IN A ROW

Prior to 2004, in 56-year history of the men's program, there had only been three players post at least 20 wins in back-to-back season. Now **Mat Cloer** (Brevard, N.C.) can add his name to that list. The junior won his 20th match of the year when he beat #65 Scott Schnugg of Georgia Tech. With 49 victories over the last two seasons, Cloer needs nine more to equal **Stephen Noteboom's** mark of 58 wins. Cloer joins Noteboom (1990-91), **Hernan Luque** (1982-83) and **Paul Haarhuis** (1987-88) as the only players to post 20 wins in back-to-back seasons.

GROSLIMOND AND WESTERHOF NEED ONE MORE WIN TO OWN DOUBLES MARK

A silver lining to the Seminoles' two losses last weekend was the feat **Jeff Groslimond** (Atlanta, Ga.) and **Chris Westerhof** (Durban, South Africa) at number one doubles. The duo won a pair of matches at Clemson and Georgia Tech to equal the single-season record at 25 wins. Groslimond has 47 doubles wins for his career, the most by any Seminole in their first two seasons, passing the record of 46 by **Cary Sochin**.

CONFERENCE SEASON ENDS FOR FSU MEN'S TENNIS WITH 5-2 LOSS TO #14 NORTH CAROLINA

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. – As it demonstrated with a victory over number four Duke, when the Florida State University men's tennis is healthy, it can play when the best teams in the country. But for the last four matches the Seminoles have been without a main part of their line-up and it cost them again as they fell 5-2 to 14th-ranked North Carolina on Saturday (April 10).

With the loss, the No. 33 Seminoles drop their fourth match in a row as they fall to an even 10-10 on the season with a 3-5 mark in the Atlantic Coast Conference. The victory gives the Tar Heels at least a share of the regular season ACC title as they finish at 7-1 and 20-4 overall.

"It was a hard-fought match," FSU net boss **Dwayne Hultquist** said. "They're a very good team that is right on the edge of the top ten. Even though we are banged up, we were right there with them. I'm disappointed about the loss, but happy with how we competed."

Down 2-0 in the team match after **Joe Bassett** (Monticello, Fla.) lost 7-6 (4), 6-0 at number five to Geoff Boy, the Seminoles got their first point of the day at number two. Moved up to the second position due to an injury to **Jonathas Sucupira** (Sao Paulo, Brazil), **Chris Westerhof** (Durban, South Africa) bounced back from a 6-3 loss in the first set to beat Andy Metzler 6-2.

An upset at number one singles put North Carolina one point away from clinching the team victory. Thirty-second-ranked Nick Monroe rallied to win 12 of the last 14 games as he beat #18 **Mat Cloer** (Brevard, N.C.) 4-6, 6-1, 6-1. That left FSU needing to win all three of the remaining singles matches in order to take the match.

Getting the Seminoles back within a point was **Jeff Groslimond** (Atlanta, Ga.) as he scored a victory at number three. After winning the first set 7-6 (5), the sophomore held at 4-4 then broke to win 6-4 over Derek Porter. North Carolina ended any shot at an upset as Brad Pomeroy came back from down a set to win 3-6, 6-2, 6-3 over **Joao Paolo Bounassar** (Maringa Parana, Brazil). Rounding out the match was a 4-6, 6-2, 6-3 win by Raian Luchini over **Chip Webb** (Chattanooga, Tenn.) at number four.

"Before he was injured, Jonathas had won nine matches in a row, including a pair over top 15 players so he was becoming someone we counted on each match," Hultquist added. "He's also helped us in doubles so it hurts to not have him out there."

North Carolina started the afternoon by winning the doubles point. The thirteenth-ranked tandem of Monroe and Boyd took down 19th-ranked Groslimond and Westerhof. The Tar Heels secured the first point when Jonathan Janda and Luchici beat Webb and Bassett 9-7. Florida State got its only win in doubles when Cloer and Sucupira took down Metzler and Pomeroy 9-8 (5) at number two.

Florida State closes out the regular season on Monday (April 12) when it plays host to #35 Notre Dame in a 2 p.m. bout at the Scott Speicher Tennis Center.

GROSLIMOND AND WESTERHOF BREAK DOUBLES RECORD IN 6-1 LOSS TO NOTRE DAME

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. – Celebrating a milestone is always that much better when it comes in a team victory. Unfortunately, Monday's (April 12) match with Notre Dame will be bittersweet for Florida State University men's tennis players **Jeff Groslimond** and **Chris Westerhof**. The duo broke the school's single-season doubles record, but it was not enough as the Seminoles lost to the Fighting Irish 6-1.

No. 33 Florida State goes into Friday's Atlantic Coast Conference tournament on a five-match losing streak as the Tribe's overall record dips to 10-11. Thirty-fifth-ranked Notre Dame improves to 13-8.

In the final match of the regular season, Groslimond (Atlanta, Ga.) and Westerhof (Durban, South Africa) needed just one more win to break the three-way tie atop the list. The duo produced the Seminoles lone win in doubles as they beat Luis Haddock and Matthew Scott 9-7. The FSU tandem won in dramatic fashion as it battled back from 7-4 deficit to win the match.

"They've been playing good all year," FSU net boss **Dwayne Hultquist** said of the duo. "This is an excellent accomplishment for them. They can get better. I don't think they have peaked yet."

However, the win by the sophomore tandem came after the Fighting Irish had already secured the doubles point. Paul Hidaka and Ryan Keckley beat **Joe Bassett** (Monticello, Fla.) and **Chip Webb** (Chattanooga, Tenn.) 8-6 at number three and Brent D'Amico and Eric Langenkamp prevailed 8-5 at No. 2 over **Mat Cloer** (Brevard, N.C.) and **Jonathas Sucupira** (Sao Paulo, Brazil).

Being the last one on the court was a theme for Westerhof on Monday as he produced Florida State's lone point of the afternoon after the team match had been settled. The sophomore won his 18th match of the year – tripling his singles' production from last year – by beating Scott 6-2, 3-6, 7-5.

"Chris is playing excellent right now," Hultquist added. "He's doing the things we've asked him to do and they are working for him. He's really finishing around the net. It's tough to play hard after the team has lost, but I'm proud of him for coming through with a win."

Just as been the case this year, several close matches went against the Seminoles that could have turned the tide. Down a set, #18 Cloer rallied to take the second stanza before falling in the third set to #93 Haddock 6-1, 2-6, 6-4. Groslimond got the advantage earlier, but couldn't put Stephen Bass away as he prevailed 1-6, 6-1, 6-3 at number three.

Down 5-2 in the second set, **Joao Paolo Bounassar** (Maringa Parana, Brazil) made a late charge in his number six match, but it was not enough as Keckley held on for a 6-4, 6-4. At number four, Webb dropped the first set tiebreaker before falling to D'Amico 7-5 (1), 6-0. Barry King got the best of Bassett 6-2, 6-1 at number five.

"We're pretty banged up right and some of the guys have had to suck and play through some minor injuries, but it's that time of the year," Hultquist noted. "Some people don't realize how physical tennis can be. Playing on hard courts is basically like playing on concrete and it can be hard on your joints and back."

With the regular season concluded, the Seminole now turn their attention to the ACC Championships. Seeded sixth, FSU opens the league summit on Friday (April 16) against Virginia, the No. 2 seed, at 3 p.m.

FLORIDA STATE'S MAT CLOER REPEATS AS ATLANTIC COAST CONFERENCE PLAYER OF THE YEAR

GREENSBORO, N.C. – This season **Mat Cloer's** name became synonymous with the best players in the history of Florida State University men's tennis. Now he's adding his name to an elite list of illustrious players in the Atlantic Coast Conference. The junior became just the third player in conference history to repeat with the league's top award as he was named ACC Player of the Year on Thursday (April 15).

During the 2003 season, Cloer (Brevard, N.C.) was the first player in FSU lore to earn ACC Player of the Year honors. He joins Virginia's Brian Vahaly (2000-01) and David Caldwell (1994-96) of North Carolina to repeat as the loop's top player.

"It's a big honor, but I've got lot more that I want to accomplish," Cloer said. "It's great to get this award, but I'm looking forward to winning more things. I was happy I won the award last year, but I knew that I was going to have to work that much harder this year because everyone is going to be gunning for me."

During the 2004 campaign Cloer has made his mark on a national level with several wins over some of the nation's best players. He started his third season off with a bang by beating second-ranked Bo Hodge of Georgia. Overall he has nine victories over ranked players, including three versus the top 15. Cloer currently sits 18th in the Intercollegiate Tennis Association rankings.

"I learned that I have to bring my best game to the court every day," Cloer added. "No matter who I was playing, I knew that I was always going to have to be ready. Any number one player in the ACC is going to be a great player and I have to be ready for every match."

In only his third season in Tallahassee, Cloer has made his way up the Florida State career charts. He currently ranks third with 50 doubles victories and ninth at 69 singles triumphs. His total win tally of 119 places his ninth in Seminole lore.

On April 4, Cloer beat Georgia Tech's Scott Schugg for his 20th victory of the season; making him just the sixth player to post at least 20 wins during their FSU career. The junior joined **Paul Haarhuis** and **Stephen Noteboom** as the only Seminoles to accomplish the feat in back-to-back seasons. The last two seasons Cloer has amassed 49 victories, tying him with Haarhuis for the second most in back-to-back season. Noteboom holds the mark at 58 wins during 1990-91.

"It's hard anytime when you come back from a great season to duplicate the feat, but I think Mat has gotten better this year," FSU head coach **Dwayne Hultquist** said. "A lot of guys have had a good year and come back the next and not work as hard, but Mat has continued to work on his game. As much as he has improved this year, there are still some things he can do to get better so hopefully he make another jump next year."

The two-time Player of the Year and the 44th-ranked Seminoles open up play in the ACC Tournament on Friday (April 16) when they take on No. 10 Virginia at 3 p.m. in Raleigh, N.C.

FSU MEN'S TENNIS PLAYERS MAT CLOER AND JONATHAS SUCUPIRA NAMED ALL-ACC

GREENSBORO, N.C. – Since taking over the program five years ago, Florida State University men's tennis coach **Dwayne Hultquist** has continued to raise the level of the program. The first symbol of this was the Seminoles' victory over fourth-ranked Duke. The latest accomplishment by the Tribe is earning a pair of All-Atlantic Coast Conference selection.

For the first time since 1995, Florida State has had more than one player representing the school on the All-Atlantic Coast Conference team as **Mat Cloer** (Brevard, N.C.) and **Jonathas Sucupira** are among the 18 players named on Thursday (April 15). Nine years ago the Seminoles placed a school-record four players on the All-ACC team.

"This shows the improvement that we've made over the last few years and that future looks very good for us," Hultquist said. "Having two players selected for the All-ACC team shows that we're pretty good up top," "We were this close to getting two more on there. **Jeff (Groslimond)** and **Chris (Westerhof)** are one of the top three doubles teams in the conference."

Thursday was already a big day for Cloer as he earned his second ACC Player of the Year honor. He is just the third player in conference history to earn the award more than once. The junior was an automatic selection for the All-ACC team as the winner of the league's first flight. Cloer posted a 6-2 record at number one singles during the league schedule, tying him with Duke's Phillip King. Breaking the tie was Cloer's 6-4, 7-5 win over No. 11 King during the Seminoles' upset of the fourth-ranked Blue Devils.

During the 2004 campaign, Cloer has made his mark on a national level with several wins over some of the nation's best players. He started his third season off with a bang by beating second-ranked Bo Hodge of Georgia. Overall he has nine victories over ranked players, including three versus the top 15. Cloer currently sits 18th in the Intercollegiate Tennis Association rankings.

"With Mat you know you have an opportunity to win at number one no matter who you play," Hultquist added. "He's beaten some guys in the top ten and can play with anyone. A lot of teams feel like they are going to lose at one and make up for down lower, but we feel that we can win at the top."

On April 4, Cloer beat Georgia Tech's Scott Schugg for his 20th victory of the season, making him just the sixth player to post at least 20 wins during their FSU career. The junior joined **Paul Haarhuis** and **Stephen Noteboom** as the only Seminoles to accomplish the feat in back-to-back years. He owns an overall record of 20-11 with a 14-7 mark during the dual match season.

While the Seminoles were expected this kind of production out of Cloer, the team got a big boost from Sucupira this season. Besides his 17 wins, Sucupira brings a ton of energy to the Florida State line-up. He is the first FSU freshman to earn all-conference honors since Ken McKenzie picked up the award from the ACC in 1992.

"Jonathas has had a tremendous impact on the team this year," Hultquist noted. "Before he got hurt he had won nine matches in a row, including a pair over top 15 players. At that state he was our best point. He brings a lot of energy and I think that is something we have lacked the last few matches since he has been out."

As soon as the dual match season opened up, Sucupira stepped up right away at the number two position. He immediately established himself as one of the top rookies in the country when he upset ninth-ranked Janne Holmia of Florida, the 2003 ITA Player of the Year.

That was just the first of many wins Sucupira produced over ranked opponents. On back-to-back afternoon's he beat No. 29 Phil Stolt of Illinois 1-6, 6-0, 6-2 then topped that by taking down seventh-ranked Ludovic Walter of Duke 6-3, 7-5. For his efforts, Sucupira was named ACC Player of the Week.

"He plays a lot better when he plays with energy and I think people like to watch him," Hultquist noted. "I think the fans like to watch someone who puts a lot of energy into their match and Jonathas certainly does that. He also impacts the guys around him and inspires the team."

Overall Sucupira has a 17-9 mark with a 12-5 ledger during the dual match season. Within conference play, he posted a 4-1 record for the third-best winning percentage among league rookies. Even though they were recognized for their singles play, Cloer and Sucupira have become a solid doubles team at the number two position, posting a 14-6 dual match mark with a 6-1 conference record.

With the regular season complete, the 44th-ranked Seminoles now turn their attention to the ACC Tournament. Seeded seventh, Florida State opens the league summit on Friday (April 16) against tenth-ranked Virginia, the number two seed, at 3 p.m. in Raleigh, N.C.

FLORIDA STATE MEN'S TENNIS ELIMINATED FROM ACC CHAMPIONSHIPS 4-1 BY #10 VIRGINIA

RALEIGH, N.C. – Going into the Atlantic Coast Conference Championships, Florida State University men's tennis head coach **Dwayne Hultquist** knew that his Seminoles would need a healthy line-up if they were going to hang with tenth-ranked Virginia. Unfortunately, the Seminoles were without a key component and it cost them as they dropped a 4-1 decision to the Cavaliers during the quarterfinals on Friday (April 16).

For the last two week, FSU has been without the services of **Jonathas Sucupira** (Sao Paulo, Brazil) in singles. The rookie was named to the All-ACC squad on Thursday and rated 67th in the national rankings.

"I'm proud with how hard we fought," Hultquist said. "Obviously I'm disappointed in the loss, but our effort was pretty good, we're just a little shorthanded. We practiced Jonathas the last two days and it looked like he might be able to play, but he just didn't go today. If he's in the line-up the match goes down to the wire."

With the NCAA Tournament still looming, No. 44 FSU waits with a 10-12 record. Virginia, who advances to the semifinals with a 20-3 record, beats the Seminoles for the second time this year. This was the third meeting between the two schools in the league summit with each team winning one contest before UVA broke the tie.

At the beginning of the match it looked like Florida State might have the upper hand coming out of the doubles matches. The No.2 duo of **Mat Cloer** (Brevard, N.C.) and **Jarrod Owen** (Vero Beach, Fla.) rolled to an 8-3 victory over Darrin Cohen and Doug Stewart. The Cavaliers evened things up when Stephen Rozek and Marko Miklo beat **Chip Webb** (Chattanooga, Tenn.) and **Joe Bassett** (Monticello, Fla.) 8-4 at number two.

That brought the doubles point down to the number one match between 19th-ranked **Jeff Groslimond** (Atlanta, Ga.) and **Chris Westerhof** (Durban, South Africa) and UVA's No. 31 tandem of Rylan Rizza and Nick Meythaler. The Seminole were up a break in the match, but the Cavaliers evened it and forced a tiebreaker where they prevailed 7-4 to win the match and the point.

UVA extended its lead when Cohen took down **Joao Paolo Bounassar** (Maringa Parana, Brazil) 6-3, 6-1 at number six singles. Florida State got its only point of the afternoon when Webb prevailed 6-1, 6-1 over Rozek during the number four match.

Virginia ended FSU's chances at a championship when Rizza beat Westerhof 6-2, 6-4 at number two and the number five match when 6-3, 6-1 in favor of Meythaler over Owen. Two matches that were going in the Seminoles' favor were not finished after the team outcome had been decided. 2004 ACC Player of the Year and 18th-ranked Cloer was up a set against #21 Stewart and Groslimond had taken a set off Miklo at No. 3.

"Mat and Jarrod did a good job considering that this was the first time they played together all year," Hultquist added. "Chip played his best match of the year and that's what you need in this kind of a tournament. He's been gaining more confidence lately and has been playing much better towards the end of the year."

Florida State is trying to advance the NCAA Championships (May 15-16) for the second season in a row after a three year absence.

FSU MEN'S TENNIS BACK IN NCAA TOURNAMENT AGAINST 20TH-RANKED ARIZONA

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. – Prior to last season, it had been four years since the Florida State University men's tennis team had appeared in the NCAA Tournament. Now the Seminoles are making their second trip in a row to the Big Dance as they face No. 20 Arizona in Gainesville, Fla., on May 15.

"We're excited to be in the tournament and hopefully if we are healthy we can make a run," FSU net boss **Dwayne Hultquist** said. "Arizona is a really good team. I know their coach really well. He's done a good job there for a long time and is a very classy individual."

Hosted by the seventh-seeded Florida, the regional also features Central Florida. The eighth-ranked Gators will take on the No. 71Golden Knights at 9 a.m. on May 15 with the No. 47 Florida State and Arizona match to follow at 1 p.m. The winner of the two matches will meet at noon on Sunday.

This will be the first time that the Seminoles and Wildcats have met. FSU's only encounter with a PAC-10 team has come in two losses to Arizona State. Fifth in the conference, Arizona comes into the tournament with a 14-8 record. The Wildcats are led by the No. 24 doubles team of Colin O'Grady and Roger Matalonga.

"I think we have one of the toughest regions," Hultquist commented. "Central Florida should be ranked in the 40's if it wasn't for injuries and Florida is one of the best teams in the country. We had a good match with Florida earlier in the year so we have a good feel for them, but all of our focus is on Arizona."

Despite having an overall record of 10-12, Florida State advanced to the NCAA Tournament based on the strength of its schedule. Sixteen of the Seminoles' 22 matches came against ranked teams with seven opponents currently ranked in top 25 by the Intercollegiate Tennis Association. Of Florida State's 12 losses, only one came to a team outside the top 40.

"Like us there were a lot of teams that didn't have a winning record, but had a strong strength of schedule and that may be why teams like us, Oregon and Cal got in and other didn't," Hultquist noted. "It's only going to make you better when you compete against the best teams in the country. You learn that you have to put it all on the line every time out"

Two months ago FSU appeared to be a lock for the NCAA Tournament after a 4-3 victory over sixth-ranked Duke on March 21. One of the best victories in school history came on the heels of a 5-2 loss to defending NCAA Champion Illinois. The impressive outings moved Florida State up to No. 25 in the national rankings.

However, during the next match at Wake Forest, the Seminoles' number two singles player **Jonathas Sucupira** (Sao Paulo, Brazil)—who had ascended to the No. 51 spot in the national rankings—suffered an injury and was out of the line-up the remainder of the season. The result was a six-match losing streak, including a 4-1 loss to Virginia in the ACC Tournament.

"Jonathas really makes us a lot better," Hultquist noted. "He's a guy that plays with a lot of energy and that's something we've missed with him out of the line-up. We look forward to having him back."

Leading Florida State is ACC Player of the Year **Mat Cloer** (Brevard, NC). Currently ranked 27th in the country, the junior is only the third player in conference history to win the league's top award two years in a row. The Seminoles also have one of the top doubles teams in the nation, the sophomore tandem of **Jeff Groslimond** (Atlanta, Ga.) and **Chris Westerhof** (Durban, South Africa). The duo's 26 wins in 2004 set the school's single-season record for victories.

During the Seminoles' first trip to the NCAA Tournament under Hultquist in 2003, the Tribe went 1-1 in the Gainesville Regional. Florida State started with a 4-2 victory over Miami before falling to the host Gators. Last year's trip to the national summit was the first for the Seminoles since 1998 when they ended a five-year run under head coach **David Barron**.

MAT CLOER SELECTED FOR SECOND-STRAIGHT NCAA MEN'S TENNIS SINGLES CHAMPIONSHIPS

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind. - No matter the outcome is of next week's match between Florida State University and the University of Arizona in the opening round of the NCAA men's tennis tournament, the Seminoles know they will have at least one representative in Tulsa, Okla. at the end of the month

The 2004 Atlantic Coast Conference Player of the Year Mat Cloer (Brevard, N.C.) has been selected for the singles draw of the NCAA Championships, May 26-31. Florida State may have another entry as the tandem of <u>Jeff Groslimond</u> (Atlanta, Ga.) and <u>Chris Westerhof</u> (Durban, South Africa) are alternates in the doubles draw.

"Last year I didn't appreciate being at the NCAA Tournament, but this year I feel very fortunate to be there," Cloer said. "It's an honor and I didn't look at it like that last year. I think that I'm playing better than I did last year so I look forward to improving on my performance from a year ago."

This is the junior's second trip to the national summit in as many years. Last year his first trip ended quickly as he fell 6-4, 6-2, to Tulsa's Alejandro Tejerina in the first round. Cloer is the first Seminole to ever get an invitation to the NCAA Tournament more than once.

Currently ranked 27th in the latest Intercollegiate Tennis Association poll, Cloer has three victories over the top 16 seeds in the tournament. He boasts an overall record of 20-11 with nine of those wins coming against ranked players. The 20 wins this year make Cloer just the third player in school history to post at least 20 wins in back-to-back seasons.

"We're excited for Mat," FSU net boss <u>Dwayne Hultquist</u> said. "We knew he would get in, but I'm a little disappointed that he didn't get seeded. He's got three wins over seeded players and only one loss. The important thing is that he's in and now it's up to him to make a good run at it and see how far he can go. Right now, though, the important thing is that he focuses on the team match and then we'll go from there."

After nearly a month layoff, Cloer and the entire No. 47 Florida State team will take on the 20th-ranked Wildcats on May 15 at 1 p.m. in Gainesville, Fla. A victory over Arizona would put the Seminoles in Sunday's noon bout against the winner of the Florida-Central Florida contest.

TOUGH SCHEDULE PROVES TO BE BENEFICIAL TO FLORIDA STATE

Florida State men's tennis coach **Dwayne Hultquist** firmly believes that the best way to prepare his team is to play the top teams in the nation. The approach proved beneficial as the strength of the Seminoles' schedule may have been a deciding factor in the Tribe reaching the NCAA Tournament.

GATORS AND GOLDEN KNIGHTS ROUND OUT REGIONAL

If the Seminoles get past the Wildcats, one of two instate schools will be waiting for Florida State. Playing in the 9 a.m. match on Saturday will be eighthranked Florida and No. 71 Central Florida. FSU may have another entry as **Jeff Groslimond** (Atlanta, Ga.) and **Chris Westerhof** (Durban, South Africa) are alternates in the doubles draw.

IT'S DEJA VU ALL OVER AGAIN AS SEMINOLES HEAD TO GAINESVILLE AGAIN

It seems like the Tribe has been in this postseason situation before. When Florida State ended its five-year drought from the NCAA Tournament last year, it was rewarded with a trip down to the road to play in the rival Gators' backyard. The Seminoles won their opening match 4-2 over Miami before dropping a 4-0 decision to Florida. The win over the Hurricanes was Florida State's first in the NCAA Tournament since beating South Carolina 4-2 during the 1996 campaign.

MAT CLOER REPEATS AS ACC PLAYER OF THE YEAR

This season **Mat Cloer's** name became synonymous with the best players in the history of Florida State. Now he's adding his name to an elite list of illustrious players in the ACC. The junior became just the third player in conference history to repeat with the league's top award as he was named ACC Player of the Year. He joins Virginia's Brian Vahaly (2000-01) and David Caldwell (1994-96) of North Carolina to repeat as the loop's top player. Currently 27th, Cloer has reached as high as 18th in the ITA rankings.

CLOER AND SUCUPIRA EARN ALL-ACC HONORS

Since taking over the program five years ago, Dwayne Hultquist has continued to raise the level of the program. The first symbol of this was the Seminoles' victory over fourth-ranked Duke. SEASON ENDS FOR FSU MEN'S TENNIS IN 4-3 LOSS TO #20 ARIZONA IN NCAA TOURNAMENT

GAINESVILLE, Fla. – With a team consisting mostly of underclassmen, the young Florida State University men's tennis team is still learning is how to close out matches. The good news is that the lessons learned in 2004 will be carried over into next season as the Seminoles return six of eight players. Unfortunately next year is all it has as Florida State dropped a 4-3 decision to #20 in the first round of the NCAA Tournament.

Arizona improves to 15-8 and moves on to face host Florida in the second round. The Seminoles end the year with a seven-match winning steak and conclude the season at 10-13.

If the afternoon was a sprint rather than a marathon, it may have been the Seminoles that were moving on to face the Gators. Several times during both singles and doubles Florida State was up at least one break, only to have to barely hold on to win or see the Wildcats surpass the Seminoles.

With the match all square at three points apiece, all eyes turned to court number one. Arizona's Roger Matalonga took the first set off **Mat Cloer** (Brevard, N.C) 7-5 and rallied from a 4-1 deficit in the second to tie the set at five before 27th-ranked Cloer went on to win 7-5.

After a break to start the third, Matalonga was up a 3-2 before Cloer answered with a break of his own. The Wildcat responded with another break to go up 4-3, but during the change over he took too much time tending to cramping muscles and Cloer was awarded a game to tie the match at four. Unfortunately Cloer couldn't take advantage of the fatigued Matalonga as he committed three unforced errors to give No. 77 Matalonga the fifth game before the Wildcat won the final game, set and match for Arizona.

"You fight the whole match and you get it to the point where you think that you've won because the other guy is hurt and then you let up. Mat's level of play dropped off and allowed (Matalonga) to win."

Early in doubles matches it appeared as if Florida State would make quick work of the first point, but Arizona battled back to win the first marker. Even though the Wildcats were down either 5-0 or 4-1 in all three matches, they rallied to win at numbers one at two.

Jumping out to a quick 5-0 start, the Seminole duo of Joe Bassett (Monticello, Fla.) and Chip Webb (Chattanooga, Tenn.) held on to beat Tom Lloyd and Paul Warkentin 8-5. The same couldn't be said for the other FSU doubles teams as No. 39 Jeff Groslimond (Atlanta, Ga.) and Chris Westerhof (Durban, South Africa) went up 4-1 only to let the #24 Wildcat duo of Roger Matalonga and Colin O'Grady win the last seven games for a 8-4 victory. At number two Cloer and Jarrod Owen (Vero Beach) could only manage to win one game as Whi Kim and Daniel Andrus took seven of the last eight en route to an 8-5 triumph. "Mat's a great player," Hultquist added.

"He's the two-time ACC Player of the Year so you don't expect that from a guy of his caliber. Mat's won a lot of big matches for us before, but today just didn't work out for him. We kind of had the doubles point won too, we were up and all three, but Arizona came back and showed that they have the capability to win a lot of close matches."

Arizona found itself up 2-0 in the match when Lloyd won in straight sets over Webb 7-5, 6-4 at No. 5. Lloyd picked up two breaks in three of the last four games of the first set then rallied from down 4-2 to win the second. The first Seminole point came at number four where Groslimond was down 4-3 in both sets, only to win three-straight games each time as he prevailed 6-4, 6-4 over Andrus.

Another victim of a Wildcat rally was Owen at number six singles. After dropping the first set 6-2 to Warkentin, the senior was up 5-2 in the second stanza. Warkentin won four of the last five games to force a tiebreaker where he prevailed 7-3 to win the match and put Arizona one point away from eliminating FSU.

Just like it did against sixth-ranked Duke, Florida State started to mount a comeback with its back to the wall. After cruising to a 6-1 victory in the first set, Westerhof lost the second set of his No. 3 match 6-3 to O'Grady The sophomore held serve to tie the third stanza at five before breaking O'Grady then holding to win 7-5.

One of the big reasons for the Seminoles down turn over the last month of the season was the absence of **Jonathas Sucupira** (Sao Paulo, Brazil) in the singles line-up. The 105th-ranked player in the nation show how valuable he is by beating Whi Kim 7-5, 4-6, 6-1 at number two to tie the match at three points apiece.

"If you look at this year we've played everyone close," Hultquist added.

"We played Illinois and Florida down to the wire even though we're a little thin this year in singles. That's certainly going to change next year with the guys that we're bringing in."

Florida State brings back almost its entire roster from a team that reached as high as 25 in the national rankings after knocking off number six Duke and mad its second-straight appearance in the NCAA Tournament. Even though the team is out of the national summit, there will be at least one FSU representative in Tulsa, Okla., as Cloer will be take part in the NCAA singles draw.

FSU MEN'S TENNIS MAT CLOER ADVANCES DURING ROUND ONE OF NCAA TOURNAMENT

TULSA, Okla. – All season long, Florida State University men's tennis player **Mat Cloer** has been accomplishing feats that haven't been done by a Seminole in some time. The 2004 Atlantic Coast Conference Player of the Year can add to that list ending Florida State's drought in winning a singles match at the NCAA Tournament.

After an early exit in the first round of the 2003 national summit, the junior redeemed himself on Wednesday (May 26) when he beat 37th-ranked Romain Ambert of Mississippi State 7-5, 6-3. Cloer (Brevard, N.C.) moves on to the round of 32 to face the winner of the match between No. 60 Chris Lam of UCLA or SMU's #26 Johan Brunstrom in Thursday's second round.

"That's a good win for Mat, Ambert has been a good player for a long time and he was a guy that could have been a potential seed," FSU net boss **Dwayne Hultquist** said. "Mat was coming off a difficult loss and it showed a lot of him to come back and beat a difficult opponent. Every match he plays here is going to be really tough. There are no easy matches in the NCAA Tournament."

Cloer was coming off one of the toughest losses in his college career, a three-set defeat to Arizona's Some Guy during the first round of the team competition in which Cloer appeared to have the match won. That match may have been weighing on Cloer as he found himself down 4-1 in the first set. From there the junior won six of the next seven games, including a break at 5-5, to take the first set.

During the second set, Cloer had his return of serve working as he broke Ambert four-straight times on his way the 6-3 victory and the match. In fact, the only time that the Bulldog held his serve was in his very first service game. From there, Cloer broke at one-all, two-all, three-all and 5-3 to claim victory.

"I got a little flustered, I was rushing everything and just beating myself," Cloer said. "After I got that first set under my belt my confidence totally rose and I played much better in the second set. I got a monkey off my back, that's for sure. I hadn't won a dual match at the NCAA Tournament and now that I've got one under my belt hopefully I can win about five more."

It had been two seasons since Florida State had a player win a match in the singles draw at the NCAA Tournament. During his only trip to the tournament, **Xavier Luscan** beat Southern California's Andrew Park. Luscan's appearance in 2002, combined with Cloer's back-to-back trips marks the first time in school history that Florida State has had player in the singles draw in three consecutive seasons.
