Partly by the sensational sprinting of Captain John Poston, the Florida State track team handed the University of Miami a 68-23-62-1-3 defeat on the windswept, sun-baked west campus oval yesterday.

Billed as the meet of the year here, it ran true to form, and was ~~the final event, as FSU's~~ mile-relay quartet of Jack Koonce, Woody Parker, Dick Mize and Poston swept to a convincing victory in 3:28.6.

Poston, pushed hard by Russell of Miami, passed the Miamian with a terrific spurt in the last 15 yards to win the century in :9.6. That was the middle-time of three official timers—the alternate had him in :9.4.

In the 220, Poston led all the way in the even better time of :20.8. Then he came back despite the heat to pound out a :50.2 anchor leg on the mile relay.

Only two sprinters in the United States turned in better times than Poston's in the 220 for the entire 1951 track season. They were George Rhoden, NCAA quarter-mile champion who clocked :20.7, and Andy Stanfield, IC-4A furlong champ at :20.6. And only three men across the nation bettered Poston's time for the hundred.

Coach Ken Miller, at the end of a very successful season, praised Poston highly and commented that he knows of no faster sprint times reported anywhere this spring.

A tail-wind aided the Jacksonville flyer in the 220 but he was hampered by gusts in the hundred. It was the last home appearance for the popular senior, whose previous low times were :9.8 and :21.5.

After Poston the rest seemed anti-climatic—everything, that is, except the mile relay.

The Seminoles led by 1½ points before the event. But after the second leg, on which veteran Dick Mize gained the lead on the last turn, Seminole fans could breathe a little easier.

There was only one other double winner besides Poston, Mason of the 'Canes, swept the high and low hurdles. FSU's Woody Parker remained undefeated in the quarter-mile, setting a track record in :50.7, and Joe Fraenossi went up to 12' 6" in the pole vault, one inch short of his FSU record.

Freshman Carlos Fraundorfer, team high-point man, was "held" to nine and one-third this time, as he won the shot put and placed in the broad jump, high jump and discus.
