**GAINESVILLE** — Charlie Galloway, Florida State's outstanding track performer, yesterday won the Southern Decathlon championship held Wednesday and Thursday in conjunction with the Florida Relays.

The Atlanta, Ga., senior scored 6,829 points, bettering

his school record of 6820 set last season over the grueling 10-event competition.

Galloway had captured the Florida AAU Decathlon title and finished 10th in the NCAA during 1970. This summer he attended the NCAA Decathlon training school in Boulder, Colo., to prepare himself for the upcoming season.

Second to Galloway in the Southern with 6,715 points was Eugene Miller, Ashland (Ky.) College, who was third in the NCAA College Division last season.

Florida's Scott Hurley was third yesterday with 6,500 points, and Eric Thompson of Hiram College finished fourth.

Galloway was 90 points ahead of the field going into the final event and he clinched the crown with a victory in the 1500-meter event.

He set four personal records during the two-day competition. His times and distances for the events were:

100-meter, 11.3; Long jump, 22-1; shot put, 36-7 (personal record); high jump, 6-0; 400-

meter, 51.9; 110 meter high hurdles, 15.3; discus, 110 (personal record); pole vault, 13 (personal record); javelin, 160-5 (personal record); 1500 meter, 4:32.

Galloway's only winning event was the 1500 meter. He and the rest of his Seminole teammates will be competing in the Florida Relays today and Saturday.

The 100-yard dash is expected to be the fastest ever for this meet in the college division.

It's a safe assumption that the 9.5 seconds record will fall to someone in a field including Jim Green of Kentucky, Ivory Crocftt of Southern Illinois, Ray Robinson of Florida A&M, James Batie of Troy State and Herb Washington of Michigan State. All have done better.

They are among the stars of 54 colleges and 110 high schools entered in the invitational event. All will benefit from a new rubberized surface on the quarter mile running track plus approaches to the high jump, pole vault and javelin throw.

Close races are predicted as well in all the individual events—high and intermediate hurdles and two mile run—plus the numerous relays.

High hurdlers Bill High of Tennessee and Ron Draper of North Carolina Central have equalled the Florida Relays record of 14.6 seconds and Jeff Houser of Duke is close at 14.7.

Wayne Hartwick of Michigan State and Jerry Fannin of Florida have both beaten the Florida Relays 440-yard intermediate hurdles record of 51.8 seconds.

In the two mile run, Ken Misner of Florida State has an 8:43 time and is the defending champion.

The Florida Relays began today with competition by several international stars in the open division and the first all-women's event featuring Olympic Gold Medal Winner Madeline Manning of Tennessee State University.

## GAINESVILLE (AP) —

Two of Uncle Sam's 1972 Olympic hopes—high jumper Ron Jourdan and half-miler Juris Luzins—opened the year's first major outdoor track carnival with impressive record performances Friday.

Both competed in open division events of the 28th annual Florida Relays, which winds up with university and high school track and field competition Saturday.

Bushy-haired Jourdan, a University of Florida senior who has used up his undergraduate eligibility, high-jumped seven feet officially and then cleared 7-foot-3 in an exhibition.

"It was my personal best in competition or practice," Jourdan said. The higher jump didn't count officially because it took him five tries to make. He made an attempt at 7-foot-five but barely brushed the bar off the stand and happily settled for what he had.

Luzins, who looks his real-life role of a Marine lieutenant, ran a record-breaking half-mile in 1:50.7 seconds, his first outdoor competition in two years. He finished far ahead of second place Bob Kaczka of the University of South Carolina and beat the all-relays mark of 1:51.8 set two years ago by Bob Lang of Florida.

Jourdan and Luzins both are aiming for the 1972 Olympics. Luzins, a graduate of the College of William and Mary, said he also is pointing for the Pan-American games this year and hopes to get back to his personal best of 1:46.

James Wilkins, North Carolina State University freshman, ran the fastest mile of his life and his 4:07 was another open division record. It erased the 4:10 by John Baker of Maryland last year. Wilkins was one of the South's three fastest high school milers last year and is another Olympics prospect.

In the freshman and junior

college division of the relays, Bruce Collins of the University of Pennsylvania registered a double. He won the 120-yard high hurdles in record time of 14 seconds and was first in the 440 intermediate hurdles at 53.8.

One university division event was run off, with Tulane winning the 4-mile relay in non-record time of 16 minutes, 58 seconds.

A special women's race lost most of its lustre when Olympic gold medal winner Madeline Manning of Tennessee State

failed to appear. Terry Crawford of Knoxville Tennessee Track Club won the half mile in 2:09.7.

Eight-year-old Barry Bishop of Hamlet, N. C., won a special mile for his age group in 6:05.44 a time which amazed the crowd except for his father, Charles Bishop, assistant track coach at Pembroke State University.

Florida State and Florida A&M universities will be among the colleges competing today, while Leon and Godby Highs will be represented in the high school division.



**GAINESVILLE (AP)** — Jim Green surprised everyone, including himself, with a record shattering victory in the battle of super sprinters and anchored Kentucky's winning 440 relay team to cement the outstanding performer award of the 28th annual Florida Relays Saturday.

Green was named best of more than 1,500 university and open division entrants in the two-day outdoor track carnival. As such he received the Kerney-Raybun award.

The top performer in the companion high school division was Mark Brown of Science

Hill in Johnson City, Tenn., who ran the best mile this year by any prepper in the nation at 4 minutes 8.5 seconds. Four new records were set and three others tied in the university division.

In winning the 100-yard dash in record time of 9.4 seconds, Green whipped Ivory Crockett of Southern Illinois, who later found solace in helping his team win the mile relay.

Green's time of 9.4 seconds broke the old Relays record of 9.5 set in 1956 by Dave Sime of Duke and since tied three times.

Crockett, failing to call up his usual finishing burst, came in third.

Ray Robinson, Florida A&M freshman, was second and that was the first taste of defeat in his life at the 100-yard distance.

"It was my fastest early season time since I was a freshman," Green said. "I was kind of surprised since this is my first outdoor meet this year."

He won the national collegiate 60-yard dash this winter and with his victory here was encouraged over his new philosophy of "telling myself, 'If I am the best, then I'd better get out there and prove it.'"

Crockett was shaken up in an auto accident Friday evening, but said that had nothing to do with his comparatively slow 9.7 time.

"The only thing hurt about me was my pride," Crockett said.

Several Florida State players turned in big performances in the meet Saturday.

Ken Misner was second in the two-mile run with an 8:50.2 clocking; Jim Buck was second in the javelin with a throw of 231-6; George Frank fourth in the discus with 164-10; and John Fuss fifth in the 440 intermediate hurdles in 53.2.

The FSU relay teams did well also with the distance medley team finishing second in 9:51.3, the 440 team third in 41.4, the mile team third in 3:14.4 and the shuttle hurdle team third in 58.3.

Godby High's Zadok Coxwell finished third in his heat of the mile run with a 4:29.3 showing.

Another star of the outdoor track carnival was Jeff Howser of Duke, who almost didn't run the 120-yard high hurdles and ended up winning it.

"I pulled a hamstring muscle last week and didn't know if I could run," he said. "I warmed up and it started feeling better so I went ahead.

He tied the Relays record of 13.6 seconds set by Richmond Flowers of Tennessee in 1967.

Michigan State had to substitute in its shuttle hurdle relay foursome and still won in record time of 56.7 seconds, which bettered Tennessee's 56.9 of 1969.

Sophomore Rich Jacques

Sophomore Rich Jacques stepped in for Don Dougherty who didn't make the trip south, and joined Wayne Hartwick, Dave Martin and John Morrison in the Spartans' record performance.

Anchoring a record breaking distance medley relay by Duke, freshman Bob Wheeler ran a 4:01.6 mile. His tremendous performance gave the Duke quartet a 9:41.9 record that beat the 9:46.4 by Yale two years ago.

In a special open division steeple chase of 3,000 meters over hurdles and water hazards, Barry Brown of the New York Athletic Club set a record at 8:49.4. The old record holder, Jack Bachelor of Florida Track Club, finished fourth. He had set the old mark of 8:55.8 in 1969.

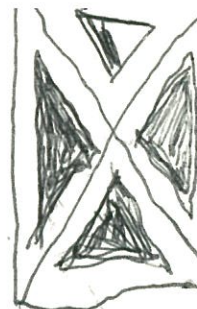
