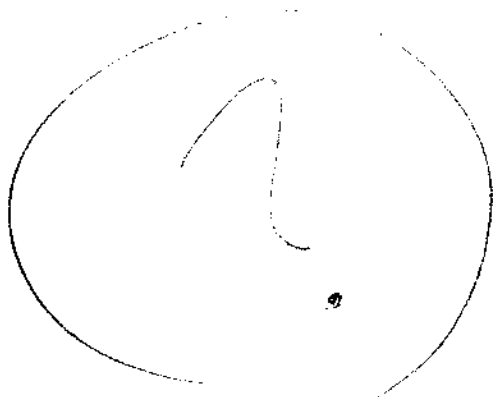

Jeromee held the lead until the bell, when Sink suddenly moved into second. But as he did that, Savage ran between both of them to take the lead. Liebenberg fell back for the first time as Sink made chase. And suddenly, Sid was by Savage, who was surprised at the ease with which Sink moved by and away from him. Sink sprinted all the way home from there, and Savage looked around for Liebenberg with 100 left, content to take second at that stage.

Sink's time is a new meet record and a new collegiate record and a new stadium record. It is the second-fastest ever by an American, behind Young's American record.

- I. Services provided to the coaches, athletes and committee.
 - A. Provide convenient and economical university lodging.
 - B. Provide university prepared meals at an economical price. On the days of competition, training meals should be provided 4-6 hours before competition and 1-1½ hours after competition.
 - C. The housing units should be within walking distance of the track, clinic area and meeting rooms.
 - D. The declaration of athletes' area and the coaches' meeting area shall be in the same building.
 - E. The rules committee meeting area should be in the same building as the coaches' meeting, or very conveniently placed near the coaches' meeting hall.
 - F. Detailed maps should be provided all coaches, athletes and committeemen. All facilities should be clearly marked if they are related to the N.C.A.A. Meet.
 - G. Complimentary tickets shall be provided to all present U.S.T.C.A. members and to all declared athletes.
 - H. A block of rooms shall be set aside for N.C.A.A. College division athletes who will not have an opportunity to make reservations via regular channels.
 - I. Make available a block of rooms for the rules committee members.
 - J. Provide a hospitality room for athletes with the possibility of showing films, (Olympics, previous N.C.A.A. Meets, etc.) and providing healthful drinks.
 - K. Provide a protest station in view of the coaches reserved seating section that will provide forms on which a coach may write a protest. This station should be manned by a minimum of two runners who will run the protest(s) to the referee. The forms should provide adequate carbon copies so that as protests are reviewed, the protesting coach can receive a copy of the action that was taken.
 - L. Cloth numbers for contestants.

II. Facilities for the competition

- A. Provide photostats or comparable descriptions of the specifications of the track, jumping events, throwing events and starting and finishing positions. The specifications should be made available five weeks prior to the championship.
- B. All facilities must meet N.C.A.A. standards (crossbars, pole vault standard, vaulting boxes of 105 degrees, toe boards, jumping surfaces, throwing surfaces, javelin should be hard surface, but grass will suffice, pole vault landing, high jump landing, shots, disci, starting blocks, hurdles, batons, starting gun and shells.

Sid Sink, 5-10, 142 senior. 22-year old math major from Bowling Green University. Finished in 8:30.9, second best American time ever.

"It was a great win for me. The time felt really great. I planned on staying with Liebenberg, that was my strategy. But then I dropped back to fourth in the middle, as I just wasn't feeling real good. It was the sixth lap when I regained my momentum, and pulled it out then. I'm looking forward to the three mile, but this was the one that really counted. I had a full day's rest yesterday and I'm ready to handle both races today."

Steve Savage, second placd finisher in steeplechase from Oregon at 8:33.9, the sixth best American time ever. 5-11, 148 senior from Oregon.

"I was so concerned about Liebenberg, I didn't think Sink was in on it. He surprised us both since he had run two trials on Thursday, that's why we were mainly concerned about him. He took out pretty fast, though. I was tired when I made my move. I may have gone too soon, but I had to give it a go. I knew the pace was quick. I made a mistake when ~~xxxxxx~~ I looked over my left shoulder, and at that point, he went by me on the right."

NOTE: While Sid Sink rested on Friday, he ran seven miles through the University of Washington Arboretum, a picturesque park located southeast of Husky Stadium.

Marty Liquori:

"When I came out, I did not know how I was going to run. I saw the wind and decided that I wanted to make my move with the wind at my back. I decided to go at the 330 mark. I don't know the West Coast runners very well, but I know Wheeler from Duke, and think he'll be great, so going down the backstretch, I was thinking about him. With the weather this nice, and this field as good, I felt it would ~~xxx~~ have to be under four minutes. I was so badly boxed in sixtyh or seventh place, I didn't see Munson go 10 yards out in front until I got out to fourth place. He almost slipped away. I'd like to be out of the box by 600 yards togo. Today, I had to drop back and go around everybody. I was really working down the home stretch."

Willie Deckard, Southern Cal, ~~xxx~~ last place finisher, after slowing up in Heat No. 1 of semi-finals of 220:

"I was tired, I was tired. I can't figure out why. I just didn't pickup coming down the straightaway. It was the slowest 220 of my USC career. I was tired, I was just tired."

Ralph Mann:

"Three days running on this~~xxx~~ hard concrete track will take something out of you, and that wind down the stretch was something else again. I figured I wouldn't make it. After I caught Bolding on the third hurdle, I ~~xxxxxx~~ relaxed a little bit, and then made my move on the seventh hurdle. The wind really sapped my strength, but I'll take the time (49.6) and build from there. I'm looking forward to the AAU Meet in Eugene. As for lane three, I love it."

Edesel Garrison, second place finisher in 440:

"I knew I had it, I didn't even see him. One second he was there, the next second he was at the line. I told myself I had it. I was listening to the announcer, looking for Turner on the other side. I looked straight ahead and faltered, and there was the line. I could have beaten him, I know I could. I really wanted this one, because the team has been missing some sure points. I was really up for it. Then he stepped, two steps ~~fx~~ and there was the line. ~~xx~~ It really hurts me. I thought the quarter was mine."

John Smith, winner of 440 from UCLA:

45.3 is life-time best, 20-years old, 6-2, 183, junior majoring in Political Science, minoring in Afro-languages. From Los Angeles.

"The last time I raced against Edesel, I panicked. This time I let him go. I relaxed at the 330 he was two or three steps ahead of me. I just told myself relaxed, I swung my arms, I lifted my legs, and I just let loose. I wasn't going to be bothered about thinking about him, and just ran on in as fast as I could. My vision was a little blurry at the finish, and I almost missed the tape. I was really happy to win, it was quite a ~~xxxxxx~~ thrill.

1971 NCAA Track and Field Championships

Mark Winzenried from Monroeville, Wisc. 21-years old, 6-2, 170 senior, majoring in P.E. "I was worried about Philippe (Fordham) and also Rick Brown (Cal). No one really knew about anybody else. I wanted to start at a real slow pace but no one really wanted the lead, so I just stayed at an even pace, and I had a real good race. This is my best victory, although I had a thrilling second place finish ~~xxxxxxx~~ at the NCAA meet last year (won by Ken Swenson from Kansas State). I am going to Eugene for the AAU Meet."

Larry Black, winner of 220, 6-1, 173 sophomore, recreation major, from Miami, Fla.

"I was very anxious to run against Willie Deckard. He had been built up so much. Running against competition makes me run better. Brash and Daniels are both great sprinters. My start is not that good, so I felt if I could be even at the curve, then I could come ~~xxxxxxx~~ on on the straightaway. Although the 220 is my best race, I also consider myself a 440 man, too. The 440 builds me up for the 220 (lifetime best in 440 is 46.4). The outside lane did not bother me. In fact, I prefer it, because I don't have to cut down on my stride in the curve. I'm looking forward to Eugene."

Cary Feldmann, 20-year old junior from Bellingham, Wash., winner of javelin from University of Wash. Majoring in fisheries, 6-1, 195.

"If Mark had been throwing better, I would have lost. I tightened up I think it was salt depletion. It was encouraging to have people on my side here at home, but yet I felt some pressure, which is natural. My arm is a little sore. But basically I feel real good, and I'm looking forward to Eugene. This is the biggest victory that I've ever had."

Mark Murro, Arizona State, second place in javelin. 22-years old, 6-0, 235.

"I'm real disappointed, I thought I would do a lot better. I didn't sleep much last night. I really haven't had a very good year. I just can't put it all together. I'll see how I'll do in the AAU before deciding whether or not I'll go overseas this summer. The way I'm going now, I wouldn't go around the block. The conditions were good. The wind was from the side, and it didn't hurt anything."

1971 NCAA Track and Field Championships

Reynaldo Brown, 6-6, 195, 20 years old, sophomore.

"On the 7-3 jump, I made it on the first time. Running ~~ix~~ up to it, everything felt there. I saw myself go up and turning right over. I feel ~~more~~ relaxed at 7-3 than at ~~a~~ 7-4. It's ~~a~~ not psychologically, just more relaxing. On the try at 7-4, the first and third ones were close. On the ~~ixx~~ last try I hit the bar with both legs, but I felt pretty loose. The conditions were good. At times I was going into the wind, but it really doesn't make much difference."

Steve Prefontaine, Oregon, 20 yrs. old, 5-9, 143, Jr., major-Communications from Coos Bay, Oregon

"The people here didn't do what they should have done and what my coach told them they should have done the last time we competed here. They didn't water down the track. That was wrong because it was too hot of a track and very uncomfortable to run on. My feet are in very bad shape and are blistered. I got out of this nothing more than just a good hard workout. I wasn't very psyched up about this race. It didn't mean much to me and all I was thinking about was next week, next week next week. The victory rates way down on the list in my book."

Jim Bush, coach

"I'm so nervous, I don't even know how to spell my own name (he said as he autographed a program). These kids wanted it so bad. I can't believe it. It takes some of the sting out of the Mcallister loss. Our loss in the really affected me more than it did the kids. They ~~a~~ said, 'don't worry, we're going to win it.' USC had some bad breaks. Deckard not running well gave us a lift. We had to come through with tremendous performances in the triple jump and pole vault. I had already given SC 10 points in the 220. That makes twice in a month we've come from behind on this track. We've had so many good performances. The thing that I'm thrilled about is our win in the mile relay. It's our third in a row. Now I get to relax a little. This has been the most hectic week I've ever had. Our bus didn't show up when we were ready to leave Los Angeles. Then Mcallister was declared ineligible. I caught him just as he was getting on the bus, and told him we had to see Mr. Morgan (J.D., UCLA director of athletics). When he was told, it broke him up. If I have to, I'll buy him a championship watch out of my own money. Finn Bendixson did a tremendous job in getting third in both the Pac-8 and NCAA meet. The SC loss was probably the greatest thing to happen to this team (75-70 in dual meet in May at UCLA). It got us fired up. Our performance in the Pac-8 meet was actually better than in this one. Look all of the schools who had bad luck. We didn't have as much bad luck and maybe a little more desire than the others. I figured before we started the most we could make was 56 points. Then we lost the relay team."

1971 NCAA Track and Field Championships

Mohinder Gill, 24-year old senior who graduated last month, ~~xxx~~ 6-0, 153 from Punjab State, Indiana:

"I have an objection to the way my event was handled and have filed a protest with the officials. I asked the official to tell me whether it was a legal jump or nt, and he raised his thumb up, saying that it was legal (his final jump of 54-8 3/4). They then said that the wind gauge disallowed the legal ~~xxxxxxx~~ jump. I then protested, one wind gauge ~~xxx~~ is nt enough because the wind circulates in a rotating motion and it is impossible to get an accurate reading. I have ~~xxx~~ filed the protest. I am not concerned about winning the event, but I ~~w~~ am concerned about having a legal jump."

five

Gill has won ~~xxxx~~ previous NCAA triple jump titles, two outdoor College Division and two ~~ind~~ outdoor University Division, and one University Division indoor title. He reiterated, "I am 100 per cent confident that it was a legal jump, and that the officials are very wrong. This is a very bad thing."

Dave Roberts, Rice, winner of pole vault.

6-2, 175 sophomore from Conroe, Texas. Double major in anthropology and psychology.

"My previous lifetime best was 17-5 two weeks ago in Berkeley. I figured it would take in this neighborhood to win, and that there would be two or three guys at that height. At 17-6 1/2, I remembered that I came in pretty hard, and then relaxed, and then the next thing I remember, I was over. I felt good ever since I started clearing 17 feet, and I knew five and six was bound to come later. My third jump at 16 feet, I think I lost about five pounds of sweat worrying. There was a little bit of pressure there. I had to have my foot taped before going 17. I think I may have pinched a nerve, but it feels o.k. now. I think Jan Johnson and Steve Smith and Ernst from Washington State will be the toughest competition next week. Johnson is really hot right now."

UCLA's Ducky Drake, Honorary Referee

Elvin C. Drake, 68 now, has devoted his life to track and field.

He first was a runner in high school at Fort Morgan, Colo., shortly after the first world war. He left the Rockies for Southern California, ran for UCLA, and was captain of the Bruins' track team in 1926.

He's been at Westwood ever since, and was either assistant or head track coach at UCLA for 35 years.

The track coaches of the National Collegiate Athletic Association are proud to honor "Ducky," as he is known, and make him Honorary Referee of the 50th championship meet.

When Ducky graduated from high school in Fort Morgan, in 1920, the NCAA track-and-field championships had not yet begun. They started the next year in Chicago. The University of Illinois won the meet by scoring 20 points.

He continued his trekking westward (he had been born in Friend, Nebraska, before going to Colorado) by coming to that land filled with sunshine and orange groves and movie stars (then), Los Angeles.

He worked for a few years, then entered UCLA—before its campus even was in Westwood. Track coach Harry Trotter used him in a lot of races in 1925, '26 and '27—in the half-mile, mile, on the mile-relay team and in the few distance races Americans ran then.

A Santa Monica girl, Ethelyn Curtis, fetched him as a husband, and by 1929 Ducky was back at UCLA, now starting its new campus and with Ducky as its new assistant track coach.

On top of that job, Ducky became both cross-country and freshman-track coaches in 1935. And in 1942, he was named the school's head trainer, a job he still holds.

He took over as head track coach in 1947, and stayed there for 17 years. His Bruins won the NCAA championship in 1956 after just losing to USC in Los Angeles the year before.

Eight of his athletes went on to compete in Olympic Games. Two of them—Cy Young in the javelin in 1952 and Rafer Johnson in the decathlon in 1960—won Gold Medals.

To win his Olympic championship, Rafer had to beat a freshman from UCLA and the Republic of China, C. K. Yang.

He's spent most of his life in track, and he'll be here this weekend to see another meet.

A brief prospectus

Individuals

Karl Salb, Marty Liquori and Ralph Mann are after their third NCAA outdoor track-and-field championships. In the 50 years of this meet, only 25 collegians have accomplished that.

Salb, a shot-putter from Kansas, leads the country's collegiate throwers this year at 66-10. Three others have previously swept three shot titles: Dallas Long of USC in 1960-1-2, Al Blozis of Georgetown in 1940-1-2, and Harlow Rothert of Stanford, 1928-29-30.

No intermediate-hurdler ever has won three championships; that's what Brigham Young's Ralph Mann is trying to accomplish. (To be fair to the old-timers, however, it was not held annually until 1959.) Ralph set the world record of 48.8 in this meet a year ago and leads the country this season at 50.2 (he shares that with Mike Cronholm of Rice).

Liquori, Villanova's miler, upset Jim Ryun to win this championship two years ago as a sophomore, then repeated easily last year. He ran his lifetime best, 3:54.6, this spring. Three milers have won three titles: Dyrol Burleson, Oregon, 1960-1-2; Don Gehrmann, Wisconsin, 1948-49-50, and Wes Delaney, Villanova, 1956-7-8.

But look at the great milers who did not win three: Glen Cunningham of Kansas, 1932 and 1933; Archie San Romani, Emporia State, 1935 and 1936; Wes Santee, Kansas, 1953; Bill Dellinger, Oregon, 1954; Jim Bailey, Oregon, 1955; Jim Grelle, Oregon, 1959, and Kansas' Ryun, who won only in 1967.

Aside from Salb, Liquori and Mann, there are six other defending champions here, and one 1969 winner. The 1969 champ is Curtis Mills of Texas A & M, who ran a world-record 44.7 to win the 440 that year, then was third last year.

The other defending champs are Eddie Hart, California, 100; Steve Prefontaine, Oregon, three-mile; Sid Sink, Bowling Green, steeplechase; Arnie Robinson, San Diego State, long jump; Mohinder Gill, Cal Poly-San Luis Obispo, triple jump, and Pat Matzdorf, Wisconsin, high jump.

A quick look at the events:

100—Willie Deckard of USC and Jim Green of Kentucky have run 9.2 this spring. And those who have run 9.2s previously in their careers are Ivory Crockett, Southern Illinois; Mel Gray, Missouri, and Mike Goodrich, Indiana. On the basis of his record, JC-transfer Deckard is a slight favorite. Returning champ (Hart) and runnerup (Isaac Curtis, also Cal) have been hurt this season.

220—Deckard leads the world this season at 20.2 and is the favorite. There are four 1970 placewinners back, but they'll be challenged by newcomers George Daniels(Colorado), Robert Mitchell(Houston) and Dennis Schultz(Oklahoma State).

440—A super field, with eight runners who have run in the 45s in their careers. They're led by Wayne Collett (45.3) and John Smith (45.5) of UCLA and Edesel Garrison (45.4) of USC. Collett was intermediate-hurdles runnerup last year and fourth in the 220 two years ago. Also here are Roger Colglazier of Abilene Christian(45.9 in 1970), Clyde McPherson of Adelphi(45.9 in 1970), Tommie Turner of Murray State(45.5 in 1969 and 1970, 46.0 this year), Dave Morton of Texas(45.9) and world-record holder Mills(45.9).

880—Mark Winzenreid, 1:47.5 this season and career bests of 1:46.6 for 880 yards and 1:45.6 for 800 meters, is the favorite. Two boys in the 1:48s this season have withdrawn, leaving only five others in that range so far this spring. But you can't discount California freshman Rick Brown, Pac-8 champion at 1:49.1.

Mile—Liquori is a big favorite. The second-best collegiate mile time this season belongs to Oregon's Prefontaine(3:57.4), who isn't running this race. There are four other sub-4 entries: Lee LaBadie, Illinois, 3:58.8; Jerome Howe, Kansas State, 3:59.4; Larry Rose, Oklahoma State, 3:59.5, and Duncan MacDonald, Stanford, 3:59.6 last year.

Three-mile—Prefontaine won it last year as a freshman and is a big favorite to repeat. This spring he ran the second-fastest three-mile in history by an American: 13:01.2. Next-fastest is 13:12.2 for Garry Bjorklund of Minnesota, last year's runner-up, but he may concentrate on the six-mile. Can "Pre" break the stadium record?

Six-mile—Bjorklund, also just a sophomore, broke the collegiate record this season (27:24.6) and he may be challenged only by Air Force's John W. Jones III. Only other entrant under 28 minutes is John Bednarski of Texas-El Paso, who ran 27:59.8 in his native England two years ago.

Steeplechase—A tremendous field. Western Michigan's Jerome Liebenberg, last year's runnerup, broke the collegiate record this year with 8:32.2, second-fastest ever by an American. But he lost two weeks ago to defending champion Sink, who has run 8:40.1. Also with 8:40.1 is Steve Savage of Oregon, runnerup two years ago and third last year. Ducks as well have freshman Todd Lathers, at a brilliant 8:40.4. And there's Jim Johnson of Washington (8:40.9) and Don Timm of Minnesota (8:43.0) in this tremendous field.

High hurdles—Depends partly on condition of injured athletes Paul Gibson of Texas-El Paso (defending champ, 13.4) and Marcus Walker of Colorado (returning runnerup, 13.7 1971, 13.3 1970). Bill High of Tennessee, runnerup two years ago as a freshman, is favorite in their absence with two 13.5s this spring. Threats are Jeff Howser, Duke, and Lance Babb, USC.

Intermediate hurdles—Mann is back, which says a lot. But there are also five others under 51.0 this year, and they could make a race of it. Jim Wharton, Idaho State, fourth the past two seasons, has been withdrawn.

Shot put—Salb has slight edge on teammate Steve Wilhelm (66-3) and UTEP's duo, Vince Monari (65-1½) and Fred DeBernardi (64-3½). Others may have trouble breaking that group.

Discus—Battle between DeBernardi (201-8) and USC's Joe Antunovich (198-10).

Javelin—Two-man battle between Washington's Cary Feldmann (268-1) and Arizona State's Mark Murro (272-1). Murro won the title in 1969 and set an American record of 300-0 before injuring his ankle last spring.

Hammer—All Kent State, thanks to collegiate-record holder Al Schoterman (224-6) and freshman Jacques Accambray (217-0). Frenchman Accambray has a lifetime best of 223-10½.

High jump—Fourteen jumpers have made 7 feet, led by defending champ Pat Matzdorf of Wisconsin (7-2) and Cal Poly's Reynaldo Brown (7-2, lifetime 7-3¼). It should take 7-0, maybe even higher, just to place.

Long jump—Robinson is back to defend his title, but he's never jumped as far as USC's Henry Hines (26-8½) and UCLA frosh James McAlister (26-6½), the world leaders this spring. Also over 26 are Danny Brabham of Baylor and Pac-8 champion Bouncy Moore of Oregon. Jerry Proctor of Redlands, 1969 champion, has been injured and may not compete.

Pole vault—Who ever knows what the pole-vaulters will do? The field has six 17-footers. Dave Roberts of Rice has been the most consistent this year and he leads the pack with 17-5. UCLA freshman Francois Tracanelli did 17-8½ last season. And there are three of local interest: Kirk Bryde of Washington (17-4), Jack Ernst of Washington State (17-0) and Casey Carrigan of Stanford (17-4¾ for Orting, Wash., High School in 1969).

Triple jump—It's all West Coast: defending champ Gill at 55-1¼, plus the Pac-8 mob—James Butts, UCLA, windy 54-2½; Bob Reader, Oregon State, 53-10½; Jim Fraser, Cal, 53-¼; Henry Hines, USC, 52-8, and Denny Rogers, UCLA 52-6½.

440 relay—USC has the best time (39.3) and is the favorite; Deckard is a tough man to catch, or hold off. Colorado ran an early-season 39.6 but has not done much since. Only other team under 40 is UCLA (39.7), only college team to beat SC this year.

Mile relay—Finish of this race has been identical past two seasons: UCLA first, Rice second, Tennessee third. All have good teams this season, UCLA the best (3:05.2). Other toughies are Abilene Christian, Murray State, Adelphi and Oregon.

Teams

No one can predict who will win the championship of this meet. The best method is to look for "dependable points." USC and UCLA seem to have more of those than others, and so they seem to be co-favorites.

USC has sprinter Deckard, who could break the tape first three times—that means 30 big points, more than the Trojans scored throughout last year's meet. They also have discus man Antunovich, jumper Hines, two vaulters, a 7-foot high-jumper, Garrison in the 440, Babb in the high hurdles.

UCLA has Smith and Collett, in the 440 and mile relay, and they're gonna score. Then come McAlister in the long jump, Tracanelli in the vault, sprinters entered in three spots in the 100 and one in the 220, their two triple-jumpers plus Finn Bendixen in the 1j, two high-jumpers and the 440 relay.

Others with a chance to score well:

Texas-El Paso: defending champ Gibson, weightmen DeBernardi and Monari, vaulter Paul Heglar, sprinter Harrington Jackson, half-miler Greg Jones, intermediate-hurdler Ron Rondeau. A lot of potential.

Oregon: Ducks have their usual distance runners—Prefontaine in the three-mile, three milers under 4:02.5, Savage and Lathers in the steeplechase. Also Moore, a super competitor, in the long jump; 7-footer Marty Hill, a Seattle boy, in the high jump; sprinter Al Hearvey, shot-putter Pete Shmock, and a couple relay teams.

Tennessee: Vols are without their defending champ, moustachioed javelin-thrower Bill Skinner. But they have high-jumper Tony Wilson (7-1½), hurdler High, frosh sprinter Darwin Bond, half-miler Danny Zoeller, and two good relays.

Brigham Young: lots of good freshmen field-event talent, plus Mann and a couple of distance runners.

Others with good potential—Rice, Texas, Minnesota, Washington, California, Kansas.

Last weekend the duo represented Florida State in the NCAA Championships in Seattle, Washington, and the previous week they competed, along with freshman Joel Garren, in the National Federation Track Meet in Wichita, Kansas.

In the NCAA meet, Misner placed seventh in the six-mile run, despite the fact that his time was faster than the previous national record. Misner's time was 27:55.2, while the winning time of Gary Bjorklund of Minnesota was 27:48.8. Equally disappointing to Misner was the fact that in order to be selected on the All-America track team for 1971, a runner had to finish fourth or better in the NCAA meet.

Jackson failed to make the finals of the pole vault, as he cleared 15-6 in qualifying and then failed to make 16 feet. Dave Roberts of Rice was the winner with a vault of 17-6½.

At the National Federation Meet, Misner ran a best-ever time of 13:39 in the three-mile event but had to settle for third place behind winner Sid Sink of Bowling Green.

Jackson finished in a tie for fourth place in the pole vault, clearing 15-6, while Garren ran a fast 47.3 in the 440-yard dash but failed to place.
