FSU record is broken

BATON ROUGE, La. — Freshman Warren Miller set a Florida State school record with a 1:11.0 time in the 600-yard run at the LSU-USTFF Classic here Saturday night.

In another meet at the Mason Dixon Games in Louis-

ville, Kentucky, Pharres Rolle finished second in the pole vault with a jump of 17 feet behind Dave Roberts.

Miller's time also qualified him for the NCAA finals, and was a fieldhouse record at LSU.

Tyrone Frederick won the 880 w i th a 1:54.5, and the Seminoles also placed first in the mile relay. The team of David Williams, Marvin Dixon, Vesco Bradley, and Miller won that event with a 3:17.1. It was also a fieldhouse record.

Earl Caruthers finished second in the 1,000 yard run with a 2:12.2 and Bradley was second in the 440 with a 48.8 timing.

Gary Bassa placed third in the 60-yard high hurdles with a 7.4, and Jesse Forbes finished fourth in the 60-yard dash with a 6.3.

Smith sets hurdle record; Miller qualifies for NCAA

Florida State speedster Danny Smith bolted to a new collegiate record in the 70-yard high hurdles Saturday at the Mason-Dixon Games in Louisville.

Smith's record time was 8.0, .1 faster than the old mark which he had matched along with four others. In setting the record, Smith finished ahead of Charlie Foster of North Carolina Central, who is considered best in the world in this event.

Seminole Pharres Rolle, FSU's only other representative in the Mason-Dixon Games, twisted to runner-up

honors in the pole vault with a jump of 17 feet.
