NCAA meet opens with UCLA picked for a sweep of titles

Track and field athletes and fans from across the nation have arrived in Eugene this week, looking for the things that make this area famous. Apparently, they'll get two for the price of one today when they attend the opening of the NCAA championships at Hayward Field.

First, they'll get track and field at one of the high shrines of the sport. But they'll also get wet, according to the National Weather Service, which has forecast a 90 percent chance of rain turning to showers today, with a high temperature in the low 60s.

According to a National Weather Service spokesman, the current weather pattern isn't likely to break until Sunday, the day after the



meet concludes. But the precipitation will be in the form of scattered showers, an Improvement over the steady rain forecast for overnight Tuesday.

"It would be a shame to see it rain for the next four days," Oregon men's Coach Bill Dellinger said Tuesday, "I think that will affect the attendance and certainly some of the performances."

The show must go on, however, and there are few places as heritage-rich as Hayward Fleld, which is sporting a new track and renovated east grandstand as the first salvos in a \$2 million refurbishing project.

The action gets under way at 1 p.m. today and concludes about 8:45 tonight. (A revised meet schedule is listed on page $5C_*$)

Only one final, the women's 10,000, will be contested today. The heptathion begins with the first four events, while qualifying will be conducted in eight men's events and eight women's events.

UCLA is a heavy favorite in the men's meet and a slight favorite in the women's meet, according to form charts compiled for The Register-Guard (also on page 5C).

The Bruin men were victorious in Baton Rouge, La., last year, piling up 31 points to runner-up Texas' 28, a record winning margin in an NCAA meet. Thirty-three of those points graduated, but UCLA has considerable depth in the sprints with Danny Everett, Henry Thomas and Mike Marsh, who tore up the Pac-10 meet two weeks ago with amazing times, and in the 400 hurdles with Kevin

Young The Bruins are expected to sweep both relays and brush aside team challenges from Southwest Conference powerhouses Texas and Artansas.

Oregon is aiming for a top-10 finish in the men's side of the meet, with horizontal jumper Latin Berry, thrower Jose deSouza, vaulter Jay Davis and hammer thrower Eric Finch expected to crack the scoring column. The Duck men, who have nine entrants overall (only three of them on the track), are hoping to improve upon last year's 14 points and 21st-place finish, the team's worst placing since 1850.

The other Oregon men who qualified are Eric Peterson in the 1,500. Seth Simonds in the 3,000 steepiechase, Brad Hudson in the 10,000, Scott McGee in the hammer throw and Jim Mours in the pole vault.

UCLA's women will be led by the incomparable Gall Devers, who is fevered to win the 100, 100 hurdles (in which she is co-American record holder) and long jump, as well as anchoring both releys if necessary. And it may be; The Register-Guard's form chart, compiled by Jack Pfeifer of The Baltimore Sun, has UCLA nipping Texas by a point, with five more teams — including Oregon and Washington — within six points of the Bruins.

"Last time 1 was the favorite (1985), I lost to Oregon in Texas," said UCLA women's Coach Bob Kersee. "Here we are favored over Texas in Oregon. Maybe poetic justice will be there for us."

Oregon will be within striking distance in the women's race, thanks largely to distance runners Annette Hand, Penny Graves and Liz Wilson, high jumper Camille Jampoisky and javelin thrower Jill Smith.

The Ducks have eight women qualified overall; the others are long jumper Julie Goodrich and javelin throwers Brooke Allen and Paula Berry.

"I haven't had time to be nervous," said Duck women's Coach Tom Heinonen on Tuesday, "but when I do think about it, I get scared. In a meet this tight, there's no telling what will happen. There's so many good athletes, it's impossible to predict the way you would a dual meet."

As always, the meet will be filled with the cream of America's rising tide of exceptional young athletes, plus a number of outstanding resident foreigners. The absence of some who have skipped this college season to prepare for the Summer Olympics will not have a devastating effect.

Apart from UCLA's stable of sprinters, top athletes include LSU freshman discus thrower John Nichols (205-1), thrice a breaker of the American junior record this spring, Mississippi State's Lorenzo Daniel (19.33) and Houston's Joe DeLoach (19.38), the first- and fourth-fastest 200-meter sprinters in U.S. collegiate history; Canadian Atlee Maborn of Cal, challenger to Daniel and DeLoach in the

200 and ranked fourth in the world in that event in '86; and long jumper Eric Metcalf of Texas, No. 8 on the all-time college list.

Also watch for Virginia freshman Paul Ereng, the letest in a long and distinguished line of Kenyans to compete in this country, who will be tavored in the 800; and Joe Falcon of Arkansas in the 1,500, probably America's brightest distance hope for the future.

The women's side of the meet is equally blessed. LSU brings 400 hurder Schownds Williams, one of only four Americans in this meet to take part in last summer's World Championships in Rome and the No. 3 all-time collegian in that event Another who was in Rome was LaVonna Martin, who will duel Devers here in the 100 hurdtes.

Also in the women's fleld are No. 5 all-time collegiate discuss thrower Lacy Barnes (204-1) of Fresno State; Villanova distance sensation Vicki Huber, who will run the 3,000 here and later this year will be a leading contender to make the U.S. Olympic team at that distance; Jennifer Ponath of Washington, the dominant shot thrower on the American college scene, who may lead a 1-2-3 Husky sweep of the event; and Sheita Rudson of Cai, the American record holder in the tripte jump.

Oregon fans may see the weather play right into the Ducks' bands, but the schedule could be even more influential. In several events, the number of athletes who had met the NCAA qualification standard was too small to require qualifying rounds or heats. And when final declarations were made Sunday night, the fields in some other events were again reduced.

As a result, eight more events have been reduced to finals only. For the men, these are the discus, triple jump, 5,000 and 4x400 relay. For the women, it will be finals only in the 3,000, shot put, 1,500 and 5,000.

Oregon's women distance runners will particularly benefit from that arrangement, since Graves and Hand are doubling in the 3,900 and 5,000 and will run twice each, rather than the four times that would have been necessitated by qualifying. And Wilson, who tackles the 10,000 tonight, can come back for the 5,000 on Saturday without having to go through qualifying for the latter event Thursday.

Speaking of the 10,000, it's the lone final in today's tineup, going off at 8.16 p.m. Sylvia Mosqueda of Cal State-Los Angeles, who recently led a large portion of the U.S. women's Olympic marathon trials, will be the favorite. But also in the race are Wisconsins Stephanie Herbst, an NCAA champion at both 5,000 and 10,000 in '86, and Cal's Kirsten O'Hara, a TAC runner-up at 10,000 in 1985. Herbst and O'Hara rank first and fourth, respectively, on the all-time U.S. collegiate its:

Oregon's Wilson, a sophomore, ran her first-ever 10,000 on the track just 11 days ago, floishing second in the Pac-10 meet.

Tickets 'moving briskly' but weather now a worry

General admission tickets for the NCAA track and field championships at Hayward Field went on sale Tuesday and were "moving briskly," according to Hunt Holsapple, University of Oregon Athletic Department ticket manager.

However, meet attendance will rely heavily on walk-up crowds, rather than advance purchases, a figure certain to be affected by weather conditions.

Hoisapple estimated Tuesday that 1,900 reserved-seat tickets had been purchased for today's opening session, 2,000 for Thursday, 4,000 for Friday and about 5,000 for the final day on Saturday.

Seating capacity at Hayward Field is 13,250, of which 9,675 are listed as reserved seats — 4,113 in the west grand-stand, 4,312 in the east grandstand, and 1,250 in the finish-line bleachers.

The athletic department ticket office at McArthur Court opens at 9 a.m. today; Hayward Field ticket offices open at 11 a.m. Reserved-seat ticket prices are \$9 each for sessions today and Thursday, and \$13 each for Friday and Saturday. General admission is \$7 for adults and \$6 for senior citizens and children (2 through high school, plus UO students) the first two days, and \$10 and \$8 on Friday and Saturday.

The attention of newcomers to Hayward Field, or those who haven't seen it since it was renovated, will undoubtedly focus on the new 400-meter oval, on the extra runways for the horizontal jumps and pole vauit, and on the hammer-throw ring, now located on the site of the old softball field.

throw ring, now located on the site of the old softball field, all elements of the \$2 million renovation project.

However, local track fans might notice a few small changes completed in time for the NCAA meet. The discus ring has been shifted a few feet, to accommodate the meet's big throwers, who were in danger of running out of real estate on the right (northeast) side of the sector. A temporary bleacher section has been installed on the southeast corner of the track, where the proposed new weight room is to be located.

Also, the southwest bleachers, near the finish line, have been shifted because the track reconfiguration left them out of alignment. According to Steve McBride, an athletic department official, they have been moved about five feet back from the fence and 15 to 20 feet to the southeast, offering a better view of the finish line and of the infield.

Finally, NCAA officials have granted the request of Oregon officials and will not require erection of a judge's stand on the infield at the finish line. The old stand was removed prior to this season, greatly enhancing the view of the finish line from the east grandstand, but UO officials were concerned it would have to be re-installed for the NCAA meet to provide another angle for an additional photo-finish/timing device. Oregon already has such devices mounted high in the west grandstand.

Hotel and motel space in the Eugene-Springfield area is "for all intents and purposes" booked solid Thursday night and Friday night as a result of the meet, according to Carol Swaggerty, director of convention services for the Eugene-

Springfield Convention & Visitors Bureau. Generally, hotels and motels have been at 75 percent occupancy since Sunday.

The bureau has been operating a welcome booth at Mahlon Sweet Airport and at the Eugene Hilton, with information packets for arriving coaches and athletes, and the NCAA and UO have provided a complementary shuttle service from the airport, she said.

Swaggerty estimated the economic impact to the area from the athletes, coaches, officials and press corps to be more than \$800,000.

The most notable track athlete with college eligibility passing up this college season to focus on the Summer Olympics is 400 meters runner Butch Reynolds of Ohio State, third in the World Championships last year, in addition to winning the NCAA meet in that event. His brother, Jeff Reynolds, is a senior at Kansas State, where he is a two-

time Big Eight Conference champion in the 400. Lee McRae of Pittsburgh, 1986 champion in the men's 100, is also not competing at the college level this season to focus on the Olympics.

Other 1987 NCAA champions not competing this season, either to focus on the Olympic Trials or because of injury, are Floyd Heard of Texas A&M in the 200, Abdi Bile of George Mason in the 1,500, Dean Crowe of Boston University in the 5,000 and Dag Wennlund of Texas in the javelin. Heptathlete Jolanda Jones of Houston is also not competing.

Fourteen former NCAA champions are competing this week. Unless noted, their winning efforts came last year: Raymond Stewart, Texas Christian, 100; Joe Falcon, Arkansas, 10,000; Kevin Young, UCLA, 400 hurdles; Tom Smith, Illinois State, high jump; Eric Metcalf, Texas, long jump (1986); Kenny Harrison, Kansas State, triple jump (1986); Stefan Jonsson, Washington State, hammer. Returning women's champions are Suzy Favor, Wisconsin, 1,500; Vicki Huber, Villanova, 3,000; Stephanie Herbst, Wisconsin, 10,000 (1986); LaVonna Martin, Tennessee, 100 hurdles; Mazel Thomas, Abilene Christian, high jump; Sheila Hudson, Cal, triple jump; Laura Lavine, Washington State, discus.

Among the few competitors here who have scored in three previous NCAA meets is Oregon's Camille Jampolsky, who tied for seventh in the high jump in 1984 and was third in 1985, both efforts when she was Camille Harding and competed for Arizona. Last season, her first as a Duck, she finished second in the high jump.

Washington State, past home to such great distance stars as Gerry Lindgren, Henry Rono and Julius Korir, failed to qualify a single runner in any distance from 800 to 10,000 meters. The last time that happened was 1963, 25 years ago.



Trial by fire for qualifiers

GENTLY, BUT FIRMLY, UCLA men's track Coach Bob Larsen ushered intermediate hurdler Kevin Young out of the interview tent to warm down after his qualifying heat.

Young, who had won his heat convincingly, had automatically qualified for Friday's final, but Larsen, mindful of the coolish weather, wasn't about to relax his vigilance.

Not that any coach of any contending team could relax Wednesday as the NCAA track and field championships opened at Hayward Field. For coaches with a chance at some hardware, qualifying day is like an appointment with the Internal Revenue Service. It's like a trip to the dentist. It's like watching a mechanic push himself out from under your car and smile, and wondering whether the smile means good news for him or good news for you.

For coaches on qualifying day, good news is no news. At best, they can watch their key athletes qualify for the finals on Friday and Saturday. At worst, their championship hopes can disappear in a race or jump that has, at that moment, nary a point at stake.

UCLA men in good shape

"The first day is always nervewracking," said Bob Kersee, the UCLA women's coach. "Especially when you have things like the long jump, the discus, the 4-by-100 relay. So many things can happen in those. You have to get on the board (in the long jump), you have to not foul, you have to get the stick around the track. I needed to get this first day out

of the way. . . . Getting out of the first two days is tough." $\label{eq:continuous}$

For the most part, the favorites came, saw, and lived to compete another day Wednesday. It was a good day for the men from defending champion UCLA and Texas, the top two contenders for the men's title, and a fine day for Gail Devers and the UCLA women.

Yet, here and there, a team saw its hopes die aborning. It was not a happy day for the longshot Southern Cal women or, for that matter, for the Texas women, considered a top contender to UCLA before losing potential points in the high jump and, on a disqualification, in the 400 relay.

While qualifying rounds don't pack fans into the stands — 3,650 were announced Wednesday, under gray skies that, until the end of the evening, offered more bark than bite — they are a time of tension for coaches and challenge for athletes, who have little choice but to run their fastest.

Tactical race? Not in qualifying. In the men's 400 hurdles, for example, the heat winners plus the next four fastest hurdlers advanced to the finals. There were four heats, so only four hurdlers knew, as soon as they hit the finish line, that they were in. The rest had to wait, hoping their fastest was good enough.

"You have to go out there and blow it all out," said Terry Crawford, the Texas women's coach. "I think NCAA qualifying days are probably one of the toughest meets people go to. Often, the qualifying round ends up being more traumatic than the finals. No matter how well you end up in your heat, you end up waiting for the results of the other heats if you don't win.

"There's no tactics involved in qualifying rounds. It's just go out and run as fast as you can and hope someone in the other heat doesn't run faster."

CRAWFORD IS NOT a particular fan of this qualifying system, used in the NCAA meet since 1982. She believes the qualifying standards just to get to the NCAA meet are already rigorous enough and, in some cases, too rigorous — witness the women's 1,500, for example, one of the events that couldn't attract a big enough field to warrant a qualifying round.

Crawford favors a return to the system previously used by the NCAA, in which a specific number of top finishers in each heat were ensured a spot in the finals, thus enabling them to temper speed with tactics. "I think we're really wearing our athletes out." she said.

Oregon men's Coach Bill Dellinger, whose squad is not a factor in the team race this year, is among those who like the current system.

"It makes it more fair, really," Dellinger said.
"Everyone has to run fast. Otherwise, you could get into a slow heat and make it. Now, both heats are forced to run fast. It makes it a little tougher on the athletes, but I do think it's more fair."

STAN HUNTSMAN, THE Texas men's coach, held a team meeting to discuss how the Longhorns would approach qualifying. He warned his athletes that qualifying couldn't be taken lightly.

"We felt we had to be a little bit tougher than to just try to qualify," Huntsman said. "In the NCAA meet, you have to run the heats just like the finals. There are just too many good people. We were probably a little higher than we wanted to be, but you can't try to do it easy."

Huntsman watched Pablo Squella set a school record in the 800, and Kersee watched Janeene Vickers run a personal best just to make the finals in the intermediate hurdles. So it went.

"You're kind of on pins and needles through the qualifying rounds," Larsen said. "I think you're more focused and a little more relaxed when you get through them and into the finals."

He meant, if you get through them.

UCLA on track for a title sweep

A cold, sometimes wet and often windy afternoon at Hayward Field could do nothing to keep UCL. A from taking a strong first step toward a possible sweep of the NCAA track and field titles for men and women Wednesday before a crowd of only 3,650.

The Bruins prospered during a day that featured only one final, that in the women's 10,000 meters, where Sylvia Mosqueda of Cal State-Los Angeles produced a new collegiate record with a winning time of 32:28.57.

Qualifying races seldom produce remarkable times, but UCLA's Kevin Young highlighted an impressive day

by the UCLA men with a ctocking of 48.71 in the 400-meter intermediate hurdles, equating the fastest time in the world this year, which Young established in the Pac-10 Conference championships.

Other dominating performances for the Bruins included Henry Thomas in the 200, with a heat-winning time of 20.24, the second-fastest time of the day behind the 20.15 of Mississippi State's collegiate record-holder, Lurenzo Daniel; and a Thomas-anchored 38.79 in the 400-meter relay, one of five marks to better the previous Hayward Field record of 39.39.

"I'm really pleased," UCLA Coach Bob Larsen said. "Everybody looked sharp. It really helped to establish in the cold weather that we can run fast and feel good. It should give us a lot of confidence to get the job done in the rain. I felt like our momentum was building throughout the day."

Texas, projected to finish a distant second to the Bruins, had a good day itself. Highlights included Pablo Squella's 1:46.22 to win the fastest 800-meter heat, and strong qualifying performances by Eric Metcalf in the long jump and Winthrop Graham in the 400 hurdles.

But UCLA didn't leave any doors open.

As for host Oregon, the Ducks had mixed success. Jay Davis and Jim Mours qualified at the opening height of 16-7½ in the pole vault, and Seth Simonds advanced behind heat winner Karl Van Calcar of Oregon State in the steeplechase. But Latin Berry failed to qualify in the long jump with a mark of 25-0½, damaging Oregon's hope of a high finish.

The most notable casualty of the first day was Houston's Joe DeLoach, who came in with a time of 19.98 in the

200, but was a non-qualifying fifth in his heat with a 20.64 mark. Also, contender Pat Manson of Kansas failed to clear a height in the pole vault.

"It would be great to win consecutive championships," Young said after the intermediate hurdle trials. He could have been referring either to himself or his team.

"We feel the key is getting guys into the finals, because we know if they can get there, they'll produce," Young said.

Young includes himself in that number after qualifying in lane seven, one few runners prefer.

"I would like to break the school record (48.10) and I really want to run in the 47s," he said. "I feel I can do it if the weather holds up. The track is fast and the lanes are nice and wide.

"I like being outside because: your come out of the turns ahead of everyone, else) I cused to have this thing for the middle of the track; but in my best times, it seems I'm always out in tune seven."

The UCLA women, narrawindawing over the likes of Texas and others including foregon, also had a solid first day. The Bruins were paced, as usual, by brilliant Gail Deversal who led the long jump qualifying with a mark: 01-21-10-1/4 and anchored the Bruins' sprint relay team-to-a winning mark of 43,71.

"As long as Gail keeps going wa're in good shape," Bruin Coach Bob Kerses saids:"If we get through tomorrow as we'll as we got through today, we won't be able to complain."

Not so with No. 1 challenger Texas, which watched star freshman Carlette Guidry struggle to

qualify in the 200 with a mark of 23,35, then fail to qualify in the long jump with a mark of 20-1¼. On top of that, the Longhorns' sprint relay team was disqualified when Guidry passed out of the exchange zone.

"My goal is to win an NCAA championship, individually and collectively," Devers said. "I've never won an event in four years at UCLA."

Oregon is one of the teams that would like to deny UCLA a title this year. The Ducks advanced Camille Jampolsky with a 5-9% high jump and Julie Goodrich with a 20-4% long jump. The Ducks' only setback was Liz Wilson's expected failure to score in the 10,000.

In the only other final contested on the first day, Southern Cal's Wendy Brown took the lead in the heptathlon with 3,466 points.

OSU's track demise pushes Van Calcar in steeplechase

The purpose of qualifying races is exactly that, to qualify.

But that wasn't enough for Oregon State's Karl Van Calcar, who wanted to win his qualifying heat in the 3,000-meter steeplechase, and did so with the fastest time of the day — 8:40.15.

"I wanted to win the heat because I figured it would be a good confidence builder," Van Calcar said. "I'm not putting the final down as an easy race, but I'd definitely call myself one of the favorites. I feel winning the heat will give me a little bit of an edge because the other runners will be aware of me."

Van Calcar, with a season best of 8:30.13, is the favorite as he competes in his first NCAA meet in three years. He was ninh as a freshman in 1984, then was fourth in 1985 before redshirting in 1986 and then missed the meet a year ago due to an injury.

Now, Van Calcar is not only in the meet, he has the chance to be the final OSU NCAA winner ever. The Beavers have announced the termination of their program following this season.

"I felt support out there," Van Calcar said. "People know this is the last year for Oregon State, and I feel they are pulling for me. I'm anxious to see what I can do in the final. I'd like to run under 8:30."

Van Calcar said he views the termination of the OSU program as motivating and frustrating at the same time.

"It almost gets me down more than it gets me up," he said. "It's definitely extra incentive to go out and show (athletic director) Lynn Snyder screwed up, but I try not to think about it too much because it's upsetting."

There is every reason to look forward to the 400-intermediate hurdle final, and a battle between Kevin Young of UCLA and Winthrop Graham of Texas. Young ran the fastest time in qualifying (48.71) and Graham was second (50.19), and both won their heats convincingly.

Young won last year after finishing second in 1986, and he did it by beating Graham, 48.99 to 49.46


"He beat me at the Pan-Am games," Young said of Graham. "The key is not letting him get an early edge on me. But I've also got to remember he's very strong coming home and not let him suitick me."

Graham feets the end of the race will be decisive.

"He can run 12 or 13 steps (between hurdles) and I'll run 13 or 15," Graham said. "I have to not panic and wait for the home stretch when he has to shorten his stride. I'm looking forward to it because last year I wasn't as experienced as him because it was my first NCAA. I might have panicked then, but I won't now."

Another event which should produce a lot of excitement is the long jump, where Tyrus Jefferson of Arkansas went 26-7% to edge out Kenny Harrison of Kansas State at 26-7. Eric Metcail of Texas, the 1986 winner, is in the hunt after a qualifying mark of 26-4%.

Jefferson predicts big things for the final.

"I honestly believe it could take 27-7 to win it." he said. "There are too many good guys out there, and they get psyched up jumping against each other. It's going to be a great competition."

While Texas may not have enough firepower to challenge UCLA, it definitely has some his-point potential, in addition to Graham and Metcali, 800meter star Pablo Squella of the Longhorns led qualifying in that event with a time of 1:46.22.

"I didn't know it was that fast," said Squelle, who was third in 1986. "I just wanted to keep myself in the race. With 300 to go I felt very strong, so I decided to wait until the last 100 to attack."

Squella shot past Paul Ereng of Virginia, one of the favorites, as the top five runners all ran faster than anyone in the other two heats.

Squella said he feets capable of running in the 1:45s and hopes someone sets a fast pace.

"It won't be me, though," he said with a laugh.

Lorenzo Daniel of Mississippi State was eighth in this meet each of the past two years, but he looks to be a tot better than that after posting a wind-aided 20.15 to lead qualifying after coming into the meet with a collegisise record of 19.93.

It is the opinion of those who will challenge Danlel that his chances this year won't be determined by the draw for lane assignments. The sprinters are all happy about Hayward Field's new metric track and wider turns. In the pest, runners in the inside lanes were at a distinct disadvantage.

"If there is any disadvantage to being inside now, it is psychological," noted Cal's Atlee Mahorn

"This track is fair and it feels great to run on," added UCLA's Henry Thomas.

Mosqueda has time for a record

Sylvia Mosqueda of Cai State-Los Angeles said she had no idea how fast she was running, but she got what she wanted and more in the only final event contested on the first day of the NCAA track and field championships at Hayward Field on Wednesday.

Not only did she win the 10,000 meters, her primary goal, but she did it in collegiate and meet record time — 32:28.57.

Although UCLA didn't put any points in the bank, the Bruins also got what they wanted on the first day, not missing a beat in qualifying.

Texas, the team seen as most likely to challenge UCLA in the team race, however, stumbled in a couple of spots, badly damaging the Longhorns' title hopes. Freshman Carlette Guidry, the indoor long jump champion, leaped only 20-1½ and falled to qualify in the long jump, and the Longhorns' 400 relay team was disqualified for an illegal exchange from Guidry to anchor Tamela Saldana.

The individual spotlight on the first day, however, had to be on Mosqueda, the 21-year-old native of Los Angeles.

"It's pretty exciting," she said of her NCAA victory and record. "My coach told me about the record, but I was kind of nervous about it. Basically, I was trying to go out for the win."

Known for going out fast, as she did in leading the first 17 miles in the Olympic marathon trials, she said she didn't even notice the running time on the scoreboard and was unaware of her pace.

"I kept seeing the counter (on the scoreboard), and that's all," she said. "I was delirious about what was going on. I didn't know my splits."

And in the end, it didn't matter as she had enough of a lead and enough left to protect it.

"That I got the record was news to me," she said after emerging from drug testing in McArthur Court.

And it was news, too, to Stephanie Herbst of Wisconsin, who set the record of 32:32.75 two years ago and who finished second in the race in 32:44.16.

"She has a tendency to do that," Herbst said of Mosqueda. "With all due respect, she starts fast and fades. I was hoping she would come back. I

really intended to win."

Herbst made her move with 1½ laps to go, passing California's Kirsten O'Hara, but she had left far too much ground, more than 100 meters, between herself and Mosqueda at that point.

"I'm just glad I was in the race when it (the record) was broken," she said. "And I'm glad I came back."

Herbst had quit running competitively after her record sophomore year.

"I thought I did all I could accomplish," she said. "I didn't think I had any place to go and the Olympics were two years away."

She kept in shape by running long distances in her layoff, and she kept up her grades to make sure she would graduate on time next year.

"My main goal was never the Olympic Trials," she said. "My main goal was to run here."

And she was satisfied with her time, considering the circumstances.

O'Hara, the TAC runner-up at 10,000 in 1985, also was pleased with her third-place time, 32:52.86.

"Sylvia didn't surprise me," O'Hara said. "Stephanie and I were trying to help each other, I thought she (Herbst) was my ticket (to a fast time and third place)."

O'Hara added that she was just happy to be able to run.

"Last week I didn't think I'd be able to be here," O'Hara said. "I thought I had a stress fracture after the Pac-10. I had a bone scan and nothing showed. The pain might be tendinitis, and I decided to go for it."

Janet Smith of North Carolina State finished fourth, just ahead of Elspeth Turner of Alabama.

While Devers didn't have to go all out in her qualifying, she did enough to qualify in the long jump (21-10¾ in her lone attempt) and brought her team from third place to victory in the 4x100 relay.


"I came out wanting to qualify as early as possible," Devers said. "In the relay, I didn't know how far back we were."





Just like the '70s, UCLA is relying on quartermilers

UCLA's drive toward a second straight NCAA men's track and field championship has a familiar look to it.

As Danny Everett and teammate Steve Lews advanced with the two fastest times in 400-meter qualifying before a crowd of 4,491 at Hayward Field on Thursday, it brought back memories of quartermiters John Smith and Wayne Collett leading the Bruins to the 1971 title, which turned out to be the first of three straight for Coach Jim Bush.

The style of UCLA's assault is not only a throwback because the 400 is again the cornerstone of the Bruin program, but because Smith is right in the middle of it. The man who set a world record at Hayward Field with a 440-yard time of 44.5 in the 1971 AAU Championships is now a

UCLA assistant coach in charge of the gifted athletes who look like they will not only deliver a title this year, but possibly next year as well.

"Four years ago, when I took over the program, I felt quartermiters were the key to being a dominant team at the dual, conference and national level," UCLA head coach Bob Larsen said. "I started looking for the right person to put it together, and after talking to several people, John seemed like the perfect guy. He hadd" coached, but he had a natural bent for teaching and he likes to spend time with the young guys.

"He's a natural."

Smith, who does some acting in Los Angeles in addition to his coaching duties, pleases Larsen because of his emphasis on technique and long-term development. He pleases his athletes because he coaches them from the perspective of having been a great athlete himself, and knowing what it takes for great athletes to succeed.

The amazing thing about UCLA's performance is that the Bruins are heavy favorties despite limiting their star athletes to a single event, plus relays, to save them for the upcoming Olympic Trials.

The lineup that is expected to lead the Bruins to the title today and Saturday is led by Everett and Lewis, who had the top two times in winning their 400 heats. Henry Thomas and Kevin Young, who won their heats in the 200 and intermediate hurdles Wednesday; both the short and long retay units; and Mike Marsh, who advanced in the 100.

"We're satisfied with the way things have gone the first two days," Larsen said. "We should feel very much like a team

going into the final two days."

"Everyone should be feeling good about himself," Smith added.

UCLA is also favored, but not as solidly, in the women's competition. There, however, the Bruins find themselves counting very heavily on one athlete. Gail Devers led qualifying in the 100 meters, the 100 hurdles, the iong lump and helped the UCLA sprint relay team into the final. If need be, she will run on the 1,600-meter relay unit in the final.

"Everett just runs and walks off the track," Smith said. "I used to gasp for oxygen when I ran, but he just runs and walks off. Only God knows how he can do that. Danny is teaching all of us to run within ourselves and not break apart. I think I'm learning as much from him as he is from me."

Everett ran the fastest 200-400 double in history with his clockings of 20.23 and 44.34 in the Pac-10 meet.

He says he actually prefers to run the 200, but will concentrate on the 400 at least through this year.

"I'm going to come out and just run in the final," Everett said. "If Steve and I run like we did in the Pac-10 (44.65 for Lewis) . . . we'd like to have the meet clinched and then go for sub-three minutes in the 1,600 relay. We believe we can do it."

Asked if the weather might literally dampen that dream, Everett sald:

"The only thing the weather does is make you warm up more."

Lewis is excited about his first race at this level.

"This meet means a lot to me," he said. "It's a steoping-stone to the Trials, but I want to do well here. Doing well in races is as much mental as anything. mental and technique. I've dropped two seconds since high school, and I don't think I'm through vet."

Smith would tell Lewis, and his older runners, that they are just beginning.

"The main thing I stress to my athletes is not to get hung up on trying to run races too fast too soon," he said. "I'm trying to teach them fundamentals and knowledge. and to realize that being successful is putting good seasons back-to-back."

If that is true of programs as much as individuals, the Bruins seem headed for a plateau of success that hasn't been seen since the early 1970s - when John Smith was running instead of coaching.

Falcon not the one 1,500 runner who didn't advance

There was some polite grumbling about the weather and the running of a few heats, but qualifying went pretty much to form on the track for men in the NCAA championshins at Hayward Field on Thursday.



Brown 'not tired . . . I'm ready to compete'

In the midst of Thursday afternoon's torreptial downpour, Wendy Brown came laboring down the final straightaway, soaked and baggard, seemingly in severe need of oxygen.

She somehow managed to cross the finish line, dead last in the 800 meters, more than six seconds behind her nearest competitor. Then, a blt later, she summoned the energy to accept her award as the NCAA Track and Field Championships hepthation winner with 5,701 points.

What was most perplexing about the Southern Cal athlete's performance was not the source from which she derived her strength, but her perception of the en-

Sheltered finally from the elements, she sat in the confines of a tent on the south side of Hayward Field, still covered with what was either rain or sweat or both. Then she announced to anyone within earshot:

"I'm not tired at all. I'm ready to compete tomor- returned to the track for the 800.

Now let's backtrack a bit. The Wendy Brown who contended she wasn't tired was the same Wendy Brown who early Wednesday afternoon had run the heptathion 100 hurdles, tied for first to the heptathion high jump, then took a "respite" from her heptathion routine to qualify for the finals of today's lone jump. That done, she got second in the heptathlon shot put. Then she took fifth in the heptathion 200.

Brown's Wednesday chores were complete. Leading Boise State's Crystal Young by 79 points, she arose Thursday, and in the early afternoon, proceeded to win the heptathion long jump at 20-314. That basically clinched it, but she wasn't done. She won the next-to-last heptathlon event, the javelin, with a toss of 141-0.

Then it was time for the triple jump - which had nothing to do with the hepthation - and Brown qualifled for Saturday's finals in that, too, at 42-94, merely the best mark of the day. Fifteen minutes later, she

"It's not usually enough time," Brown said. "But it was enough today. I wasn't going for a fast time. I just wanted to run a sice, easy race and I knew I just had to finish it to win."

After all, by then she had a virtually insumountable lead of 271 points. But the exhausting 800 was at once apticlimatic and climatic, signalling her first NCAA title in four years.

"I was hoping I wasn't gonna go through four years without a title," she said, clutching a bouquet of yellow roses, the only animate object that didn't mind the rain. "It means a lot."

If anyone in the meet can relate to Brown's tireless masochism, it's Brown's crosstown rival. To no one's shock. UCLA's Gail Devers picked up precisely where she left the day before. After a perfect Wednesday, America's most promising sprinter/hurdler turned in

the best times in Thursday's 100 and 100 hurdles, clocking 11.16 in the former and 13.01 in the latter.

Other noteworthy women's qualifying performances Thursday included:

- . A 51.75 clocking in the 400 by Rochelle Stevens of Morgan State.
- A 52.12 by Arizona State freshman Maicel Malone in the same event.
- · A 3:31.60 in the trials of the 4x400 relay by Malone and her Sun Devil teammates.

But white Arizona State, Texas, Alabama, Louislana State and Nebraska enhanced their positions after Thursday's qualifying, and while Cal State-Los Angeles and USC are in a misleading tie for first with 10 points. the Bruins remain the favorite, and the reason is hardly a mystery.

As Texas Coach Terry Crawford so succincily explained: "There's gonna be five or six teams that could go into any of the top six places . . . but as long as Devers is healthy, it's UCLA all the way."

Here and gone oulckly in the NCAA track and field championships at Hayward Field was Delon "Prime Time" Sanders, a sprinter from Florida State who was unable to reach the flnais of the 100-meter dash.

Sanders wasn't any ordinary sprinter, and not only because of the heavy gold chains around his neck or his two Playboy bunny gold pierced earrings. If you haven't heard his name before, rest assured that you will during footbalt season, when the Semipoles promote the cornerback/punt returner as a Heisman Trophy candidate, or during the 1989 National Football League draft, in which he is projected as a first-round draft choice.

"He's a great athlete." Gil Brandt, chief talent scout for the Dallas Cowboys, said recently. In fact, Brandt compares the Florida State defensive back to Mel Renfro, the former Oregon star who had a long NFL career with the Cow-

"He probably has as much athletic ability as any senior in the coming draft," Brandt said. "If he doesn't let things get in his way, he'll be a very wealthy young man a year from now."

To put Sanders' talents in perspective, he is 6-feet, 190 pounds, and was a quarterback and defensive back in high school. His favorite sport is basketball, in which he describes himself as a shooting guard, emphasis on shooting. and nearly convinced FSU basketball Coach Pat Kennedy to let him play last season.

As a freshman and a sophomore he played on the Florida State baseball team, which played in the College World Series, but he decided to try track this season, for the first time, and was named the athlete of the meet in the Metro Conference championships, winning the 100 and 200 and participating on the winning 400-meter relay tream.



AS IF IT, too, can't get excited about qualifying rounds, the sun finally put in an appearance Friday in the NCAA track and field championships at Hayward Field.

It left with no promises to return today. You can only hope.

At least, with some minimal cooperation from the weather, some wonderful performances in the finals on the track, and some unbridled enthusiasm in the grandstands, the events at Hayward Field finally began to feel like a track meet.

A track meet of the quality and atmosphere that this community has witnessed before, and has invested \$2 million in hopes of seeing again.

Which is not to say that Friday was a day for the ages, one to rank with the final day of the 1978 championships, when the javelin throwers took a victory lap before more than 14,000, or with the day Jon Anderson, the mayor's son, made the 1972 Olympic team in the 10,000 meters. It wasn't,

that the athletes who competed Friday cared not a whit about how many people were in the stands in 1984; they just knew that those who were there Friday were encouraging, and responsive, and made them feel appreciated.

Villanova's Vicki Huber, who set a collegiate record winning the 3,000, described her victory lap as "incredible," the applause was so warm. By then, her nerves had calmed — the crowd in the west grandstand had cheered her finishing kick so strongly that it scared the bejeebers out of her; she had assumed, wrongly, that someone was gaining on her.

All this can take some getting used to. Amber Welty of Idaho State, the winner of the high jump, was first distracted by the crowd's rhythmic clapping. Overall, though, the atmosphere was so inviting that John Smith, the UCLA sprints coach who set a world 440 record at Hayward Field in 1971, said he kept wanting to go warm up.

TWO CONCLUSIONS emerged Friday.

First, Hayward Field's newly configured track, a big hit with athletes and coaches, is fast, and will, under the proper conditions, produce the kind of marks commensurate with the quality of the runners it hosts.

Though the sun was shining Friday, the weather conditions were hardly ideal — it certainly wasn't as warm as a sprinter might like, and the wind came up just in time for the women's 3,000. Yet UCLA's Kevin Young blazed in the 400-meter hurdles, winning by the largest margin ever in an NCAA meet, clocking 47.85 and setting a meet and a Hayward Field record, eclipsing the old house standard, 47.90, established by the peerless Edwin Moses in 1980.

Another Hayward Field record, as well as a collegiate and NCAA met record, fell in the men's 200 — 19.87 by Lorenzo Daniel of Mississippi State. While the 200 and 400 events are the kind that Hayward Field was reconfigured to enhance — wider turns, shorter straightaway — the track also accommodated Huber's stellar performance in the 3,000, a clocking of 8:47.35, a collegiate record.

"We want to be able to say we've got a really fast track in every event," said Tom Heinonen, the Oregon women's coach. "We've got that."

HAYWARD ALSO HAS something more, if we compare attendance figures to past years and find them wanting, at least we must recognize that to the athletes who come here to compete, Eugene track fans are still beyond the norm. Their enthusiasm is appreciated for its warmth, as well as for its uniqueness and fairness.

Before the 3,000, Villanova women's Coach "Uncle" Marty Stern warned Huber that at the beginning the crowd would certainly be pulling for the hometown runners, Oregon's Annette Hand and Penny Graves. "But I did tell Vicki this," he said, "that once you take the lead and open it up, and they see that Graves and Hand don't have a chance to win, they're going to turn their allegiance to you, because they appreciate good athletes.

"That's what happened. In Philadelphia, they start out cheering, and then they boo you. In Eugene, they start out cheering for the home ballclub, and then cheer for the people who are winning."

Huber said that cheering helped. So did athletes in other events. Stern understood.

"Every athlete, every human, loves people to be behind them," he said. "It's something special, I told her, to come here, because these people are really knowledgeable, and they know that you're running fast. They know you're running one of the best times in the world.

"If you hear them, it means you're doing something really good."

Oregon State claims its last NCAA win

Had you stepped through a gate into Hayward Field at about 7 p.m. Friday, you would have sworn a University of Oregon runner had just done something special.

Instead, the man taking a victory lap drenched in the warm applause of 7,320 was dressed in the orange, white and black of Oregon State. The archrival school from just up the road had produced the last of its 13 national track and field champions in the form of Karl Van Calcar, whose 3,000-meter steeplechase win sparked a wave of emotion undoubtedly never before directed at a Beaver thinciad in Eugene.

When there's a death in the family, the Civil War takes a holiday, and Van Calcar's win was the emotional

highlight of the third day of the NCAA track and field championships precisely because it was OSU's last. The Beaver program, a sacrificial lamb for an athletic department in dire financial straits, comes to a bitter end today with the appearance of hammer thrower John Thomas, who is not expected to win.

Van Calcar was expected to win Friday, and he did so handily, leading all the way and clocking 8:32.35 in windy conditions. His nearest pursuer, Brigham Young's Ted Mecham, was more than six seconds back.

No one could stay with Van Caicar. Washington's Dan Betl, third in last year's NCAA meet, tried to keep up for a couple of laps and ended up 11th. Arkansas' Richard Cooper took Bell's spot for a brief time, but Van Caicar was just getting started by then.

"I wanted a quicker time, but the win took care of that," Van Calcar said. "I wanted to set a fast pace,"

Asked at what point in the season he knew he'd be the favorite, he said:
"After I saw that there was nobody returning this year except Bell, I thought I'd have a good chance at it. I knew right after the first steeplechase (March 19)."

The win was the crowning glory in Van Calcar's five-year OSU career. The senior from Edmonds, Wash, finally hit the jackpot after making alsoran NCAA appearances in his sophomore and junior years and suffering debilitating injuries that knocked out

This gives me a good feeling, but I wish it wasn't the end of the track program," said Van Calcar, wearing his trademark camouflage jacket. "I have no regrets about going to school there. It's fun to go out and win for a small school, a school that's not expected to do that well. It gives you more recognition."

For his big moment, Van Calcar wasn't about to lose any recognition. In the crowd were his parents, both sisters, his grandfather, an aunt and uncle and about half the OSU distance

Probably because it delighted him so to win a title for Oregon State, Van Calcar expressed, in equal strength, displeasure with the school's decision to drop track and replace it with soccer.

"They screwed up," Van Calcar said. "Here we've got three people (including women's high jumper Kim Fenton) in the meet and two of them (Van Calcar and Thomas) will be All-Americans right at the last when they cut the program. That's kind of screwed.

"I can't believe they're doing it. They're going to give an extra \$100,000 to the football program and what it'll cost to start up soccer. The max they're going to save is \$40,000 or \$50,000 and they're \$1 million in debt. It makes no sense."

Van Calcar is an individualist who's not afraid to speak his mind, a trait that no doubt comes from working without a coach. OSU graduate assistant Neil Webber and assistant coach Doug Hicks give some attention to Van Calcar, but his class schedule normally prevents him from joining the team's workouts.

Now, he'll have a chance to correct that. Van Calcar will receive his degree in electrical engineering Sunday. then it's back home to Edmonds to work with his high school coach, Tom Campbell. The U.S. Olympic Trials loom in mid-July, but first Van Calcar would like to run a 5,000 at The Prefontaine Classic at Hayward on July 2.

"I think I might be able to get in." he quipped.

Villanova's Huber wins celebrated 3,000

East met West under an azure sky on a perfect Friday evening. At last, there was no rain, no wind, no numbing cold to spoil perhaps the most anticipated race of the NCAA Track and Field Championships.

Nothing would stand in the way of what would be a classic 3,000-meter confrontation between Villanova's Vicki Huber, who traveled all the way from Philodelphia's Main Line, and Oregon's Annette Hand, who is never more at home on Hayward Field's starting line.

The race began, and characteristically, Hand, so familiar with this track and what has become almost her rightful place at the head of the pack, strode into the lead. She remained there for maybe 1,200 meters, but with Ruber hanging perilously on her shoulder the entire way.

Then, almost instantaneously, Huber was gone, like an East Coast commuter train leaving the station while the tardy passenger, watching helplessity, gets left behind. Hand was that passenger. Huber extended the throttle to its fullest and extended her lead from five meters to 10 meters to 20 meters to 75 meters, easing to her final destination in a collegiate record 8:47.38.

"I wasn't going for a fast time," Huber said after her second consecutive NCAA 3,000 title bettered the 1985 record set by Wisconsin's Cathy Branta by more than two seconds. "I was just going for the win."

And in fairness to Hand, her second-place time of 8:59.15, though it was overshadowed, was remarkable in its own right. In her first loss to a collegian this season — Mary Sianey and Claudette Groenendaal are the only other runners to have beaten her — the Oregon senior finished with a lifetime best by three-quarters of a second.

As if the event even needed any more thrills, the most captivating part of it all may have been the gutty display by Penny Graves, almost unnoticed for the first third of the race. Then she worked her way past Rice's Pam Klassen into fourth place and staged another of her classic Hayward Field battles on the hell ian.

This time, the drama revolved around third place rather than first. This time, Rita Delnoye of Texas-El Paso was the victim of Graves' reientless kick. Buoyed the rhythmic ciapping resounding from the west grandstand, she took third easily, finishing in 9:09.72.

After Huber crossed the line with the fans supporting her as if she'd been wearing green and gold rather than navy and white, the emotion was unleased in torrents. The Villanova juntor extended a hand to Hand, as well as the other finishers. Hand and Graves embraced, savoring the next-to-last race of their collegiate careers; they'll do it all over again today when they run the 5,000 with teammate Lix Wilson at 3 p.m.

Then Huber took a solitary, satisfying victory lap while Hand and Graves accompanied each other with a 400-meter celebration of their own. Later, they all held hands on the awards stand.

"It was prefty predictable," said Oregon Coach Tom Heinonen, clearly satisfied with the 14 points the Ducks secured in the race. "Huber's abviously an Olympic contender who's goans put the screws to the post-collegians. Annette can run a tot faster, and Penny Just ran a great, tactical race."

And entering the final day of competition, the Ducks are in fourth place in the team standings—tied, appropriately enough, with their friends from Pennsylvania. Villanova also has 17 points, with LSU (35), UCLA (32) and Nebraska (24) in the first three soots.

Earlier Friday afternoon, Camille Jampotsky, who took second at last year's NCAAs and was picked by some to again place as high as second in the high jump, finished a disappointing sixth to score Oregon's other three points. And Julie Goodrich, who on Wednesday barely qualified for the finals of the long jump, this time barely missed escaping the preliminaries, finishing ninth while the top eight advanced to the championship round.

For the Ducks' other two seniors (as well as sophonore Jill Smith, who competes in the Javelia finals at 12:15 p.m. today), their careers remain latect, at least until this afternoon. But while Hand is one of the favorites in the 5,000 and Graves could also score significant points there, they'll be hard pressed to duplicate the dramathey and Vickl Huber helped author on Friday.

"I felt like it was the right time to do it," Huber said of her strategic move on Rand. "When you pass, you have to pess with authority, so when I made my move, I knew that it had to be my one move of the race."

It was, and Hand was acutely aware of it, knowing full well that one, she couldn't catch Huber and two, she shouldn't have even tried, considering an even longer race awaited her less than 24 hours later.

"It would have been nicer to have somebody to run with, but it's hard when they're that far out in front of you," said Hand, who will seek her first NCAA title today. There was nothing I could do."

Not so for Graves. Like her teammate, she knew it was fruitless to try to catch Huber. And she recognized that catching Hand was equally hopeless. So wisely, Graves simply went for the six rounts.

"I came in with the third fastest time and that's what I wanted to come out with," she said. "The other two were too far out in frost, so it was a matter of just keeping my pace, and the crowd kept me going. It went just how I wanted."

Mississippi State's Lorenzo Daniel showed a lot of promise as a freshman, when he placed third in the NCAA 200 meters.

But that promise only heightened the trustration which followed when Daniel placed eighth each of the next two years.

"I was sick with an eye infection as a sophomore," Daniel recalled, "so I didn't feel that bad about it.

The strategy paid off as Daniel ran away from a talented field to become the fifth-fastest 200-meter performer ever with a clocking of 19.87. Aftee Mahorn of California set a Canadian record with a time of 20.20 but finished a distant second as Daniel also broke his own collegiate record.

"No. 5 all-time," Daniel repeated when informed of his accomplishent, "I guess I'm pleased about that. I really wasn't concerned about the time. The only thing on my mind was winning."

Daniel took control of the race early, coming off the turn in front and leading comfortably the rest of the way.

"The turn won it for me," Daniel said. "I came out of the turn and I knew I had a lead of two steps on everyone. Then I was able to relax."

So awesome was Daniel that Mahorn didn't even fee! badly about losing.

"I got out well and ran a good race," he said.
"I thought I was capable of 20.20, and that's what I ran, so I had a good run. He'd run 19.93 coming in, so I had to think it was possible he'd run forter."

Mahorn said his goal is to peak for the Canadian Olympic Trials in August. But Daniel doesn't think his fast time means he's peaking.

"I'm a lot stronger this year and I'm not worried about peaking," he sald. "I feel confident about the Trials myself."

Paul Erang, a 20-year-old freshman from Kenya, used his sprinter's speed to come from far behing and win the 800.

"I wasn't as exhausted as I was in the heats,"
Erang said. "I wanted to stay back and then come
back at the end."

Erang came back all right. Trailing the pace setter, Mark Everett of Florida, by as much as 30 meters with 300 meters to run, he came from dead last over the final 200 meters to win in 1:46.76.

"It's what I was aiming at," Erang said of the title. "It was the first time I've run in a big meet and only my eighth 800 meters."

Erang had been mainly a 200- and 400-meter runner before he was discovered by Virginia Coach Fred Hardy. He had bests of 20.9 in the 200, and 45.6 in the 400.

"The 400 is pretty painful, but so is the 800,"

Two other foreign athletes — Maude Ado of Texzas Southern by way of Nigeria, and Pable Squella of Texas by way of Chile — finished second and third, respectively.

"I knew he was behind me, but I didn't know how fast he was," Squella said of Erang. "He passed me so fast. I'd say he has a great future."

Freshman Kelly Riley of Arkansas State required three attempts to negotiate opening height in the pole vault, then won the event by clearing 18-3½, on his final try. The win was doubly satisfying after be falled to place in the NCAA Indoor meet last winter.

"I jumped 17 feet in high school," Riley said.
"When I went to college, I wanted to get eight
NCAA plaques. But I only placed seventh indoors,
and to get a plaque you have to be in the top six.
One miss cost me indoors. From not placing to go
to national champion is a great accomplishment
for me."

Riley said he had some technical adjustments to make in the beginning.

"I was running really good and it's a fast runway," he said. "Once I got everything worked out at the first height, I was all right."

Olympics or football for Metcalf?

Eric Metcalf of Texas got his redemption Friday in the long jump at the NCAA track and field championships at Hayward Field.

But in the process, he also created a dilemma for himsoil

Metcalf sourced 27-2 on his fifth attempt to take the long jump title for the second time in three years and to whet his applitte for more this summer.

That may sound good, but it isn't all that easy for Metcalf, who still considers playing running back for the Longhorns as his No. 1 priority.

"Before two weeks ago, I wasn't going to the Olympic Triats," he said, "Now, I don't know. I'm thinking about them again. I'm jumping well, and with a little luck I may jump further and be in it (at the Trials)."

No one certainly should count Metcalf out until after his final attempt in any competition.

He won his first title as a freshman two years ago on his final attempt, he got beat in the final round last year, and this year he guaranteed bimself another victory in the final round.

"It was very scary the whole time," he said, "The wind had shifted and it was getting chilly, and I didn't think

anyone would get over 25. But I really wanted it. I didn't want to quit the series."

Metcalf had gone 28-7, 26-7 and 28-8 $\frac{1}{2}$ in the trials and then 26-9 $\frac{1}{2}$, 27-2.

Kenny Harrison of Kansas State finished second at 28-73/4, the same mark as Llewelyn Starks of Northwestern State in third place.

Kenneth Petersen of Northeast Louisiana surpassed the Olympic standard of 248-4 in the javelin with his winning throw of 251-2, but he'll bave to throw more than eight feet farther than that to earn a trip to Seoul.

Petersen, a citizen of Denmark, said his country's Otympic committee has set 250 feet as his special qualifying standard.

"They gave me four chruces to make it," he said. "They want to be sure they make a good choice. Maybe it's justified."

Although he missed here on the second of his four designated tries at the standard, he said he was happy with his result.

"I'm in good shape, and I still have a couple more chances (in Europe) to make the Olympics," he said. "In the beginning, I wanted to throw 260 right off the bat, and I didn't throw far. After that, I've decided to forget about it, and try to win."

And it was the win here that gave him pleasure enough.

"I knew I was in good shape from qualifying," he said.
"This (the climate in Eugene) is exactly the same as at some I was prepared for it and I thought it was to my advantage."

Petersen, who placed second in last year's meet in his first year at Northeast Louisiana, got off his winning throw an his second affering.

"It was pretty good technically," he said.

It should not have come as a surprise when Washington State's Laura Lavine won the women's discus with her sixth and final throw. She's made a career out of late heroics.

Last year, Lavine won the Pac-10 meet on her final throw, then won the NCAA meet on her fifth throw. Two weeks ago in Low Angeles, she won the Pac-10 again, this time with her fifth throw. Now the NCAA again, with no room left to managerer.

"When the guy (announcer) said, 'For her tast throw,' I just said 100 percent, 100 percent 100 percent and I just threw it," Lavine said. "I kept thinking, you know, that I've been in this position before."

Lavine, like more than a few athletes, is a little superstitious. She began eating M&Ms before competition a few years ago because she noticed a correlation between consumption and performance, but here she got a little paranotid.

"I didn't eat as many because I thought I might get drug tested and come up with a sugar content or something," she said.

Another foreign runner, Mary Onyall of Texas Southern, who is from Nigeria, won the women's 200. Her winning mark was 22.70, wind-aided. Though Onyall was the leading refurnce from the 1987 meet, in which she finished third, she wasn't certain shout her chances here.

She was sixth in the World Championships last year, and is the African women's record-holder at 100 and 200 meters, but she missed several weeks during the season because of an injury, then came to Eugene suffering from a chest cold, which didn't get any better, with the rain and cool temperatures.

Yet when the runners came off the turn and into the homestretch, Onyali was in the lead. "I was shocked when I came out of the curve so good," she said. She sensed Pauline Davis of Alabama, the runner-up, moving up, but was never passed.

On Friday morning, Amber Weity used a scissors to cut some of her flaming red mane so the hair would stay out of her eyes later on.

No one else could do better than 6-1½, but after clearing that height on her first jump, she went 6-2½, then 6-3½, also on her first attempts. Her winning jump was a PR, surpessing her previous best of 6-2.

"A miss can put you down so fast, and I was really surprised their no one else cleared that height," said Welty, who has yet to lose outdoors this year. "I'm really overwhelmed. I didn't think I was the best, but I'm really excited to win."

She also had the crowd excited with her fist-pumping, hand-clapping motivational factics. Once Jampolsky was eliminated, the Hayward Field fans adopted the effusive reduced.

AN EXCELLENT VINTAGE, this class of athletes who competed in the NCAA track and field championships at Hayward Field.

Robust. Spirited. Precocious. Certain to get better with age, but pretty heady right now.

Paste a blue label on the entire crate from UCLA, men and women. Danny Everett and Steve Lewis in the 400. Kevin Young in the hurdles. Gail Devers everywhere. Those talents, alone, would make this a harvest to savor.

But remember the products of some other track and field vineyards — Joe DeLoach of Houston, Vicki Huber of Villanova, Joe Falcon of Arkansas.

"This is the best field I can remember in recent years," said Garry Hill, managing editor of Track & Field News, who has seen 15 or so NCAA meets. "The track showcases their talent, and sometimes the enthusiasm of the crowd makes you think things are better than they really are, but it's definitely a vintage year."

Hill was not alone in that assessment. Bob Larsen, coach of the winning UCLA men, said the quality and

depth of athletes in the sprints and hurdles "compares with some of the great fields we've had," and also described the talent as strong in field events such as the long jump, triple jump and high jump.

Bob Kersee, the UCLA women's coach, described the women's talent as "very good. I have not been this excited since 1984 and the Olympic Games. The

quality of women athletes is getting better across the board. It's just excellent."

During the NCAA championships, the competitors set four college records, established nine NCAA meet records, and tied another.

And they broke in Hayward Field's new 400-meter

configuration with seven field cords and tied one more. On Friday, Young broke a Hayward Field mark in the 400-meter hurdles, set by Edwin Moses, that had stood since 1980. On Saturday, Arizona State's Lynda Tolbert set an NCAA meet and Hayward Field record in the 100-meter hurdles; the old Hayward mark, set by Stephanie Hightower, had also stood since 1980.

A glance at the last two NCAA meets hosted at Hayward Field shows that athletes who excel at this level are good enough to have some staying power. "Anybody who can dominate an individual event at the NCAAs has it going in the direction where they could be one of those long-lasting, prominent people that we see," Larsen said. "Only a handful of people can continue on at the very highest of levels; hopefully, we see some come from here."

In the 1984 NCAA meet here, the dominant performers were athletes like Joaquim Cruz, Mike Conley, Danny Harris, Antonio McKay, Kirk Baptiste and Claudette Groenendaal, all elite post-collegians now. Go back to the men's NCAA meet here in '78, and you find another elite group: Greg Foster, Renaldo Nehemiah, Mike Tully, Sydney Maree, Willie Banks, Henry Marsh, Henry Rono, Rudy Chapa, many of whom still compete.

TO PREDICT WHICH of this year's college class will be around four years from now, in the Summer Olympics in Barcelona, or even 10 years from now, is virtually impossible, Hill said. There are so many variables — injury, younger athletes developing, financial support, goals and drive.

"The sport is so volatile," said Tom Jordan, director of the Prefontaine Classic. And yet, Jordan said, there were athletes in this NCAA meet who offer tremendous promise, including Everett, Young, Devers and Huber, who has "shown the most talent I've seen on the track since Mary Slaney at that age."

More so than in 1978, top track athletes now can think about competing for five, even 10 years after coilege, though it's tougher in the sprints, Harvey Glance notwithstanding, because the competitive lifespan is shorter than in the distances, and in the field events, because of lack of financial backing.

"I think we're in a new era," Jordan said. "Up to four or five years ago, people simply did not compete for 10 years. It was not that they were incapable of it, it was just that there was no incentive to. In fact, there was a disincentive, because they couldn't make a living at it." Now, some can.


FOR SOME OF the youngsters who competed here this weekend, the future could be sooner than you might think.

"I've been picking Danny Everett to win the Seoul 400 since he was a freshman in 1986," Hill said. He believes Young, the UCLA hurdler, might win a medal at Seoul, if only he can make the U.S. team—he has to beat out either Moses, Harris or Andre Phillips. Lorenzo Daniel, the 200 winner from Mississippi State, and DeLoach are names to watch as they take on older, more experienced post-collegiate runners during the Olympic Trials.

On the women's side, Hill is "amazed" at Huber's prowess. He expects to see her on the starting line in the 3,000 meters at Seoul. The same holds true for Devers — "a special, special talent" — though her Olympic fortunes could turn on whether she pursues the 100-meter hurdles or the open 100 in the Trials.

In any case, we haven't heard the last of Devers, Huber, Everett, Young & Co., athletes who helped make 1988 a very good year.

DeLoach bombs 100 after 200 bomb out

If Joe DeLoach couldn't withstand a little adversity, he wouldn't be running for the University of Houston.

This week's setback was DeLoach's failure to qualify for the NCAA 200 final, which he was favored to win. But DeLoach made up for that Saturday, winning the 100-meter title with the fastest time in the world this year.

DeLoach ran 10.03 to equal the NCAA meet record.

"I wanted to prove to myself I could be competitive in the 100 as well as the 200," DeLoach said. "There has been a lot of doubt about my ability in the 100, and I came here determined to be victorious in that event."

That determination was doubled after DeLoach failed to qualify in the 200.

"I was shocked but I didn't lose my confidence because I knew what happened," DeLoach said. "I didn't take the cooter weather into account and consequently I didn't warm up enough.

"When the race started, I could tell I wasn't warmed up, so I didn't push it because I didn't want to get hurt. But I knew I could do well in the 100, and I spent a lot more time warming up even though it was warmer today than for the 200."

DeLoach's fortunes at the NCAA meet are nothing out of the ordinary for a young man whose college career has been shrouded in controversy.

"The biggest battle I've had in track and field has not been a physical battle," said DeLoach, who turns 21 today.

It all started three years ago when DeLoach was the third-ranked prep sprinter in the United States and was being recruited by the University of Houston.

Olympic gold medalist Carl Lewis visited DeLoach at his home in Bay City, Texas, and the NCAA determined that Houston had violated the rule prohibiting such contact by a representative of the university's interests. The NCAA ruled DeLoach could never run for the Cougars, although following a

university appeal the NCAA agreed to allow DeLoach to attend Houston if he sat out a year and gave up a year's eligibility.

"That sort of bruised my mentality as far as track and field is concerned," he said. "It took away some confidence from me by not being able to go to a team situation."

DeLoach seems to have regained that confidence, though. He believes he is capable of making the U.S. Olympic team in either the 100 or 200.

"I would like to try to qualify (for the U.S. Olympic team) in both events," he said. "I think I could qualify in both of them, but the best sprinters in the world are in this country and it's going to take some mean times to do it."

But DeLoach feels he can produce, and in winning the 100 he upset defending champion Raymond Stewart of Texas Christian, who was timed in 10 10

"I have a lot of strength and faith in myself," DeLoach said.

'The first 300 I dictated the rhythm of the race and Steve just came along behind me," Everett said. "But I didn't feel comfortable today, and I knew I didn't feel comfortable when I woke up this morning. Maybe it was because of the weather, but I just kind of struggled in.'

"The difference between Danny and me is experience and technique," Lewis said. "He's worked with John (Smith) more years than I have. But I'm happy. The sky is the limit for me, and I didn't expect to accomplish as much as I have this year.'

Lewis also felt he proved something.

"They took my junior world record (44.65) away because they didn't have drug testing at the Pac-10 meet," Lewis said. "So I wanted to prove to everyone that I could run under 45-flat. I feel like I'll get that record back."

Larsen is hopeful Lewis will still get the record off his Pac-10 performance. He said Lewis' drugtest results from the NCAA would be submitted in the hope of getting the mark accepted.

'They both ran very well, but I don't think either felt fresh," Larsen said. "Danny started out fast and couldn't keep it up, then Steve caught up but couldn't hold it.'

The 1-2 in the 400 didn't excite Larsen as much as the sub-three minute relay.

"We'll all have to celebrate a little tonight," he said. "That was really frosting on the cake."

LSU's 'lagniappe' a surprise

Down in Cajun country, they have a word for it: lagniappe.

"It's Cajun for serendipity," explained Louisiana State women's track and field Coach Loren Seagraves. "You know, a little bit extra."

And that's what Seagrave's LSU women gave on the final day of the NCAA track and field championships Saturday at Hayward Field — a little bit extra right across the board in overcoming pre-meet favorite UCLA for their second team title in as many years.

The Fighting Tigers scored in 10 events, five on Friday and five on Saturday, their final eight points for second place in the 4x400 relay clinching the title.

"Last year, a lot of people expected us to win going in, but I don't think anybody expected us to win this time," Seagrave said. "It was just a thing where everybody pulled together and everything fell into place. It was totally unexpected (after losing seven All-Americans last year), and it's just a tremendous feeling. I think we maxed out plus."

Seagrave said he was glad in retrospect that his team had a meet here earlier in the year and that it had arrived here a week ago Wednesday, seven days before the first day of competition.

He also was grateful that 40 LSU track fans made the trip to cheer on the team, and that someone had flown in 200 pounds of crayfish for some Cajun cooking.

And he was thankful even to those who overlooked his team, and cast them in the role of underdog.

Although the points in the final relay sewed up the title, Seagrave preferred to point to a couple other performances as instrumental to the team triumph.

Like the third place in the 100 meters by freshman Esther Jones, following her sixth in the 200 on Friday.

Like the second place in the 800 Friday by junior Sylvia Brydson, who was not even mentioned among the 11 top contenders in The Reg-siter-Guard form chart.

Like the third place in the javelin by Cheryl - Coker of Carleton Place, Canada, who had not scored in her previous NCAA appearances.

They all played major roles, and they all believed they could do it, even though the experts didn't look at them seriously until after they scored 35 points Friday.

"I never did think we were out of it," Coker said. "I knew I had it (a big throw) in there, and it was just a matter of doing it. I'm just glad it came out today."

For Jones, 19, the youngster of the group from Milwaukee, Wis., it was all a new experience, and it was hard to describe.

"We didn't think we could win, and we didn't think we could lose, either," she said. "Gail Devers (of UCLA) is a world-class athlete, but I didn't feel intimidated. I just figured to run my race."

Of all of the Tigers, though, the most important was Schowonda Williams, a senior 13-time All-American coming into the meet.

She was the team's lone individual champion, winning the 400-meter hurdles Friday, and then finishing fifth in the 100 and anchoring the relay to second place in the deciding 4x400 relay.

"I knew we had to be within three points of them," Williams said about the relay. "But I was confident we could pull off a victory."

Going into the final event, LSU had 53 points to 48 for UCLA. Should the Bruins win the relay, the Tigers had only to place third to win.

Opai Cunningham grabbed a lead for the

Tigers on the first leg, but Devers pulled the Bruins ahead on the second leg. Brydson pulled the Tigers from third place to second on the third leg, and the rest was left to Williams.

Williams had Tamika Foster of Arizona State ahead of her, and UCLA freshman Janeene Vickers behind her most of the way. Williams passed Foster down the stretch, but then Vickers caught her just before the tape to give UCLA the victory in 3:29.82.

The Bruins had won the race, but the Tigers had won the title.

"Coming in, I thought UCLA was going to win," she said. "But to win takes more than one person. Event after event we got more confident. And then going into today, we knew we could pull it off.

"Really, I thought we were like the weather," she added. "The better it got, the more points we got. We did a lot of training on this track, and I think it was a great 10 days."

"It did turn out right," Seagrave said of his decision to bring his team out early. "It was a big factor. But what we didn't anticipate was the way the community would respond to us. They were great."

And so were the Tigers.

Wind nullifies record on Hudson's U.S. best

Shella Hudson, disappointed in the long jump, when she failed to qualify, found happiness Saturday in the triple jump at the NCAA track and field championships.

Did she ever.

The junior from Cal won her second consecutive NCAA triple jump championship with a wind-aided jump of 45-8. Though not a legal record because of that wind, it was the longest jump of any kind by an American woman.

"I knew it was a good one," said Hudson, the American record-holder at 45-2½. She was mindful of several things on the jump — getting good speed on the runway, getting good elevation on her hop, and putting some distance between herself and Southern Cal's Wendy Brown, with whom she was tied.

Brown finished second, at 44-5½, while her Southern Cal teammate, senior Yvette Bates — runner-up in the last two NCAA meets — was third at 44-2¾.

"I didn't want to leave here without a championship title," Hudson said. "I felt I had to do everything I could to just jump as far as I can. . . . That was the main thing. I had to keep my title."

Her winning effort highlighted a great day for women from Pac-10 Conference schools. In the team race, UC-LA, Oregon and Arizona State finished two-three-four. And of the nine women's events decided Saturday, including the 1,600 relay, seven were won by athletes from Pac-10 schools.

Chased by the Southern Cal teammates Saturday, Hudson had to perform.

"I felt pressure the whole time," she said. "I was trying to keep my head. The triple jump is always real competitive. . . . I tried to relax as much as I could."

Hudson said the victory was helped by the fans, who adopted her effort with rhythmic clapping. "I love the fans here," she said.

Her victory erased some of the sting of not qualifying in the long jump in Wednesday's trials.

"After that," she said, "I wanted to jump better than I ever had before."

She did. However, the long jump remains her hope of getting to the Summer Olympics in Seoul; for women, the triple jump is not an Olympic event.

"I think that's everybody's loss," she said.

Lost in shuffle was meet-record high jump

There was a day when the men's high jump was a major attraction in United States track and field.

American Charlie Dumas was the first man over seven feet, John Thomas was a world record holder, Dick Fosbury revolutionized the event with the flop and Dwight Stones brought attention to it with his boyish personality and stylish technique.

In the last five years, however, there's been a real depression in American high jumping. The world record is two inches higher than the American record, and the event has almost gone back stage at most meets in the U.S.

And it appeared that way again Saturday at the NCAA championships at Hayward Field.

There was little fanfare when Tom Smith, a 20-year-old junior from Illinois State, cleared 7-73/4 for his second NCAA title.

The mark was lost in a barrage of

records on the track, and Smith went almost unnoticed in the press interview tent.

Few knew that Smith's mark broke the old meet record of 7-71/4 by four jumpers or that it equaled the stadium record by Zhu Jianhua of China set in 1984.

The lack attention didn't bother Smith, however. He's used to it.

"It was a great thritl to win," he said. "I was thinking I could be competitive, and I was hoping I could win. With 12 jumpers over 7.5, I knew it would take a high jump, and I did it."

Although Smith had difficulty with a tailwind early in the competition, he cleared 7-5 on his third attempt and 7-6 on his second. After making 7-7¾ to win the event, he had the bar raised to 7-9 and had a couple of close misses at that.

Hollis Conway, 21, of Southwestern Louisiana, finished second at 7-6, while Troy Kemp of Boise State and Brian, Marshall of Stanford cleared 7-5 to finish third and fourth, respectively. Where does that put Smith in the national picture and in the movement to revive the event in this country?

"I think I'm right in there," he said.
"Jimmy Howard is the most consistent at 7-8, but Jerome Carter and Thomas McCants went 7-91/4 this year (for the new American record)."

As for himself, he says he's taking it more seriously, and his results are reflecting that new dedication.

"I set a national high school record

of 7-5, but I entered Illinois State on a basketbail scholarship," he said. "Track was second priority. Now, it seems to me, my future may be more realistically in the high jump than in basketbail.

"Trying to make the Olympic team is now more important to me than being a starter on the basketball team four years at Illinois State," he added.

Which is good news for an event that used to be an American favorite.
