A Championship Preview

Arizona could steal the show at the 1992 NCAA Women's Golf Championships.

Not only does the Grand Canyon State claim residence on the NCAA Championships in Tempe, but it also has the host school Arizona State participating, the University of Arizona in the field as the top-ranked team and Arizona sophomore Annika Sorenstam coming back as the defending individual champion and No. 1 player in the nation.

Stealing the show will be a tall order considering the caliber of players on display at this year's championship, the 11th in NCAA history and the 51st intercollegiate championship for women's golf. The route for victory will be equally demanding at Arizona State's Karsten Golf Course, a par-72, 6,101-yard Scottish links and stadium course designed by Pete Dye, coupled with Arizona's summer heat.

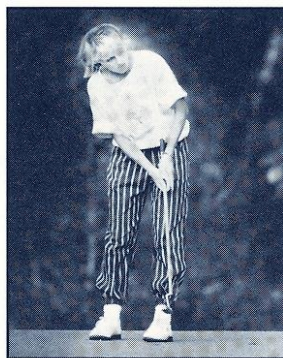
The nation's 102 top golfers will test their talents at Karsten for a 72-hole tournament over four days which includes the nation's top 17 teams as well as another 17 individuals representing Division I, II and III institutions.

Arizona, looking to become the only team besides Florida to have two NCAA championships, perhaps comes into the tournament as the team to beat. The top-ranked Wildcats, rolling into the tourney off a Pacific-10 Conference Championship at Karsten, are one of five Pac-10 teams participating at NAAs. Arizona is headed by Sorenstam, a sophomore who edged UCLA's Christy Erb, a senior, at last year's NAAs, by a stroke for medalist honors with a four-round tally of 290. Arizona has claimed the most recent two individual champions with Sorenstam and 1990 winner Susan Slaughtner.

Besides Sorenstam, the dominant

top player in the nation this season, the Wildcats also have the third-, seventh- and 17th-ranked players in the nation with sophomore Leta Lindley, junior Debbie Parks and freshman Ulrika Johansson.

UCLA is the defending champion and comes into Tempe as a top-10 team. The Bruins won their first women's golf championship at Ohio State's Scarlet Course last year after a playoff with San Jose State. UCLA has three of the top 30 players in the nation, including Erb at No. 14.

The Spartans, just edged out for the title last year by a stroke, come back strong again for 1992. San Jose State, ranked second in the country, also has some of the nation's elite golfers with three in the top 20. Junior Tracy Hanson highlights the Spartan package at the No. 2 spot in the nation. Sophomore Lisa Walton, ranked ninth, and sophomore Nicole Horner, a sophomore, have also helped to keep San Jose State strong after fielding a top-notch team in 1991.

The Far West also has Pac-10 schools Stanford, USC and Arizona State. The Cardinal holds two players in the top 13 with seniors Audrey Wooding and Adele Moore. The Sun Devils, aided by home advantage, are led by junior Tricia Konz, freshman Wendy Ward and senior Kim Millies.

Outside the Far West region with six teams at this year's NAAs, the South is the most represented with four teams — Georgia, Florida State, Miami (Fla)

and Furman. In addition to Georgia freshman sensation Vicki Goetze at the No. 4 spot in NCAA player rankings, the South lays claim to some of the better high-echelon talent in individual selections. Carri Wood, a junior from Mississippi State at No. 5, is one of 10 Division I individual selections. Also from the South, the 15th-

and 16th-ranked players, senior Susan Veasey of South Florida and Liz Earley of Central Florida, are represented.

Led by Goetze's rise, Georgia has made its presence known and has three other top-50 players to help its chances. Florida State and Miami (Fla.) each have two players in the top 50 to challenge while Furman has one.

The Mideast had three teams selected for the tournament with North Carolina, Duke and Kentucky all making it after top-20 seasons. The Blue Devils have a solid trio with freshman Stephanie Sparks, senior Lisa Brandetsas and junior Kim Cayce. The Tar Heels have put two, Kimberly Ranel Byham and Debbie Hari Doniger, in the top 50 this season while the Wildcats are led by Tonya Gill.

Highlighted by Oklahoma State, the West also sends three teams to Tempe. The Cowboys are paced by sophomore Stephanie Martin, who has played more rounds of golf this season than any other player ranked in the top 20. Martin is rated sixth while teammate Arantxa Sison, a freshman, is at No. 20.

Texas and Southern Methodist also come from the West region. The Longhorns have Jenny Turner, a talented junior ranked 24th in the nation, while the Mustangs count on the performance of senior Barbara Blackwell, who is tabbed at No. 12.

The lone remaining team, Indiana, hails from the Midwest.

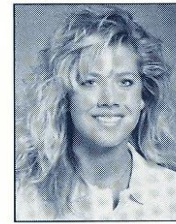

Women's Golf Championship History

In 1992, Arizona State University will host its second Women's Golf National Championship, its first since 1960 and first at the Karsten Golf Course at ASU.

Since Alabama's Eleanor Dudley paced her way to victory in the very first national collegiate championship back in 1941 at Ohio State, the event has gone through numerous changes and alterations. There have been more than just variations in sites and numbers of participants, mainly in the area of governance.

The very first championship was organized and conducted by the faculty of the Women's Division of the Physical Education Department of the Ohio State University, headed by Gladys E. Palmer.

The championship was not contested again until 1946 due to the United State's involvement in World War II. The tournament remained in Columbus until 1953, when North Carolina began hosting the event. At that time the tournament was governed by the Tripartite Committee on Golf, which later came under control of the national Joint Committee on Extramural Sports for College Women.

In 1967, the Commission on Intercollegiate Athletics was formed under the Division of Women and Girl's Sports, which governed the tournament until 1971. The 1971-72 sports season saw the formation of the Association for Intercollegiate Athletics for Women (AIAW), which hosted the tournament from 1973 until it was disbanded in 1982. Ironically, Ohio State – which had hosted the very first national championship – hosted the final AIAW event.

The NCAA began sponsoring a national golf championship in 1982, providing two championships that season. Tulsa gained a place in the history books by winning the final AIAW event, as well as the first NCAA championship – both in the

same season.

Team championships have been contested since 1973, with only Tulsa, Arizona State, Miami (Fla.), Florida and San Jose State having been able to capture more than one title. No ind-

ividual has ever repeated as champion.

The tournament field has grown steadily over the years, beginning with 38 participants and growing to over 100 contestants in the current championship.
