Hope for high finish

Lady Seminoles set for finals

The FSU Lady Seminole swim team winds up their season in a big way this weekend with the Association of Inter-Collegiate Women's Swimming Championships in Tempe, Arizona.

"The finals this year are in an outdoor pool," commented Head Women's Swimming Coach John Rangeley, "and the weather forecast is for snow. It could be an interesting and cold meet."

Florida State has qualified eight women for the championships and Rangeley is hoping for a possible Top Ten finish. "I'm keeping my fingers crossed. If we get a strong effort, we could finish high in the standings."



Susie Clark, top Seminole in the butterfly and the Individual Medley, could give FSU a shot at a good finish. "Susie's our most consistent swimmer," said Rangeley, "and she's a dynamite national competitor. We count on her in tough times."

Mary Montgomery and Jackie Walker are two others Rangeley will count on. Montgomery has the top time in the country in the 400 Individual Medley, also competing in the 200 freestyle.

Jackie Walker is another Lady Seminole who should score points. Walker has top times in the 400 and 200 freestyle, and has been another tough competitor in national competition.

In addition, FSU has qualified four relay teams and Rangeley is hoping to pick up points in three of them. Individualist in these include Katie Jones in the backstroke, Jan Neutsen in the breaststroke and Missy McInnis, Kathy McHarny, and Corkie Odum in the freestyle.

"This should be a great meet," said Rangeley. "You can throw all last year's times out the window if the weather is good. FSU is the only state university that doesn't give out swimming scholarships, so this meet means a lot to our girls."

O-State wins diving

TEMPE — Carrie Irish of Ohio State won both diving events and five records were set Saturday during final day of the Women's National Swimming and Diving Championships.

The University of Miami held off defending champion Arizona State to win the team title.

Miss Irish won the one-meter diving competition with 434.70 points with Peggy Anderson of Wisconsin finishing second at 412.95. She captured the three-meter diving crown with 442.15 points with Laurie Brunet of Arizona finishing second at 428.95.

Janet Leopold of Arizona was injured in the one-meter event when she hit the diving board on her first dive. She was treated and released at a local hospital.

Miami won the team event with 383

points. Arizona State was second at 369, followed by UCLA 220, Virginia Commonwealth 184, Arizona 160, Indian River Community College, Fla., 152, Monmouth College 112, Florida 95, Rutgers 95 and Florida State 82.

Arizona State set a record in winning the 400-yard medley relay in 3:57.906. Second place UCLA and Miami also broke the old mark of 4:07.20.

Dawn Frady of Miami won the 200-yard freestyle in the record time of 1:53.992.

The 50-yard backstroke title went to Linda Stimpson of Southern California with a record 26.764.

Peggy Tosdal of ASU won the 50-yard butterfly in a record 25.636 second.

Arizona State won the 200-yard freestyle relay in a record clocking of 1:38.555. ASU held the old record of 1:41.54.

Lady Seminoles tenth in swim

TEMPE, Ariz. — Florida State's women's swim team managed 10th place in the National Collegiate Swim Championships Saturday here, finishing well behind first-place Miami.

FSU's Susan Clark finished in the top 16 in five events to earn five All-America honors. She also was the top point-getter for the Lady Seminoles.

Miami scored 383 points, Arizona State 369, UCLA 220, Virginia Commonwealth 184, Arizona 160, Indian River 152, Monmouth 112, Washington 98, Rutgers 95, Florida 95, FSU 82.
